


In *The Bald Soprano*, Mr and Mrs Smith eat fish and chips, answer the doorbell, swap anecdotes with the Fire Chief, and occasionally visit the lavatory. In *Jacques*, a young man refuses to participate in such social routines, but what will he make of his new fiancée Roberta, who has three noses and lives in a castle in which the only word ever used is 'cat'? In these absurdist comedies, Eugène Ionesco stares through the looking glass at the everyday world until he glimpses the insanity of 'normal' life.


By Stephen Sondheim Directed by Heinar Piller November 23-27, 2010 Sir James Dunn Theatre

Jean Giraudoux's magical tale turns notions of madness upside down and asks how 'sane' society can be saved from itself.

Margery sees Old London Town with new eyes. A young wife from the country, she is entranced by the fashionable city folk. William Wycherley's uproarious 1676 farce takes us on a darkly comic journey through the sins of the city as they are unsettled by the perspective of the country.
