

Announcement of changes in the staff of the Dalhousie Law School was made yesterday at the University Office. Professor H. E. Read, who has been teaching in the School for the past eight years, has been granted a year's leave of absence. The Law School has been honoured by the award of the second ranking fellowship at Harvard Law School to Professor Read for the coming session. He will undertake at Harvard special work in the field of private international law which will qualify him for the degree of Doctor of Juridical Science.

Mr. John Willis, of London, England, has been appointed to the Law School staff for the next academic year and he will give the courses which Professor Read has been teaching. Mr. Willis attended Winchester School and he then proceeded to New College, Oxford, where he had a distinguished record, obtaining a first class in Classical Moderations and a first class in the Honour School of Jurisprudence. After teaching classics for a year at Harrow, he was awarded a Commonwealth Fund Fellowship at the Harvard Law School where he spent two years taking courses which he will teach at Dalhousie. He has recently had published a book, "The Parliamentary Powers of the Departments", in the Harvard Studies in Administrative Law.

Professor John T. MacQuarrie, who has been a member of the School staff for three years, has resigned and he has gone into active practice in New Glasgow with his brother Mr. J. H. MacQuarrie.

Mr. George H. Crouse has been appointed to the teaching staff in Law for the coming academic year. Mr. Crouse graduated from Dalhousie in 1929 in Arts with High Honours in History and Political Science, and, after a notable record in the Law School, he received the degree of Bachelor of Laws in 1932. Last year he was awarded a Langdell Scholarship at Harvard Law School where he has been engaged in post-graduate work during the past session.
