Dear Mr. Raddall:

When Frances was in on September 27th I examined her mouth and took upper and lower impressions so that I might have a record of the case.

After studying the model I feel that it would be wise to undertake orthodontic treatment. I think one should attempt to widen both upper and lower arches with the hope of bringing the upper canines into a more favourable position, improving the alignment in the front of the mouth, and reducing the deep vertical overbite.

If treatment is undertaken Frances would have to be here the better part of a week in order to have the appliances made and placed, after which I would have to see her for a single appointment about every six weeks. It is difficult to determine the actual length of treatment as individual cases react so differently but I think one should be prepared for at least a year and a half. For a case such as this I usually send out an account every three months, the first one for \$100.00 and subsequent accounts for \$50.00 each.

If you decide to go ahead with treatment I will be glad to arrange a series of appointments for Frances. Before starting it would be necessary to have a full dental x-ray. Perhaps Dr. Smith could take the x-ray and send it along to me before Frances comes to town.

I enjoyed seeing you this summer. Expect golf is about over for the season.

Dear Mr. Raddall:
