Dear Mrs. Borgese:

Thank you for your letter of June 22. I have been scrambling around trying to find a copy of your Caribbean study and think I have now located one. While I appreciate your suggestion of concentrating on one region given time constraints, I think we will go ahead with a functional approach since our hope is to stimulate "cross-breeding" among regions as well as promote regional centers for marine science and technology, environmental and fishery assessment and monitoring. I would be very interested in seeing your re-write of the COFI role in an eventual LOS agreement since I am sure this would be most useful in the NEPTUNE. I am sure you have other plans for your recommendations, but let me stress that this NEPTUNE will not attempt to be comprehensive (indeed, cannot attempt to be in so short a time frame), but will rather sprinkle ideas with references for follow-up for those who are interested. Our hope is to begin a dialogue with this one issue of NEPTUNE in August/ September which will be continued at the next LOS session with more information, feedback, clarification, etc. We are now aiming to publish about the third week of the session, so I would appreciate knowing if you are interested in contributing something as soon as possible. We would need it no later than August 10. In order to include as much material as possible, we are asking that articles be stripped to the bare essentials, say, 500 words. Thank you as always for your help.

Dear Mrs. Borgese:

Although I know you must be super busy with plans for the next Pacem in Maribus, I would like to request your attention for the duration of this letter to consider an idea which I'd like to put into effect. I would appreciate any comments, or suggestions you might have as to possible sources of interest and/or funding.

As with yourself, the New International Economic Order aspects of the Law of the Sea have always seemed so naturally obvious to me that I am continually surprised that many people and institutions working on NIEO questions ignore LOS completely. Now that the end of the treaty-making process draws closer, it is important to secure not only the most advantageous compromises still available for equitable long-term development and resource management in the deep seabed area, but also to ensure that the least costly and most relevant expertise will be available to developing countries as they begin to implement their new coastal economic zone rights and responsibilities.

Identifying common needs, capabilities and priorities among the developing countries will increase their ability to define the best bargaining strategies vis-a-vis the industrial nations for appropriate research, assistance, training and technologies, as well as for better market access for their marine products. Had the powerful group of land-locked and geographically disadvantaged states been able to articulate and consolidate their needs and demands back in 1974, the outcome of the present Conference might well have been different.

While I share the view that the common heritage of mankind has been hacked away at by coastal states, I think it is now time to work with what we've got. I agree with Mr. Mario Ruivo of Portugal on a possible two-stage approach toward achieving equitable and effective global ocean management. He commented that the first step may be establishing expansive coastal state claims to the benefit of coastal developing nations, but that as coastal zone management evolves, regional and global solutions will organically emerge. Groundwork identifying 1) common regional problems and interests in the marine area and 2) recommendations for alternative ways to deal with these needs, could evoke some specific demands and counter-proposals which would hasten the acceptance of sound management principles and institutions.

The following is an outline form of a proposal for a publication to be disseminated at the next session of the Law of the Sea Conference, or if impossible by that time, at the following session in 1977. It is based on concentrated interviewing and utilization of existing expertise, rather than on lengthy research. At this point it is better to dig in than to attempt to be comprehensive. Besides, I'm an activist,

I hope all goes well with your plans. I will value your comments.




