DALHOUSIE has a new Director of Alumni Affairs. To be correct, Dalhousie has a Director of Alumni Affairs.

### Faculty of Commerce is Active

-Dallhousie, we all falt

The Faculty of Commerce at Dalhousie University and the Society of Industrial and Cost Accountants of Canada jointly held another seminar in the series on Executive Development on October 21, 22, and 23. The subject chosen for the three days of intensive study and instruction for the group of business men who attended was "Cost Reduction and Cost Control."

Leading the seminar were C Reginald Cook, Treasurer and Director of Johnson & Johnson Limited in Montreal, and George E. Terris, Vice-President of the Management Consulting firm of Payne-Ross Limited in Toronto.

These seminars have become an annual, autumn feature at the Dalhousie campus during the past several years and draw delegates from throughout the Maritime provinces and as far away as Montreal. Their object is to supplement the formal university and accounting training of experienced business executives who are facing the same problems by providing the opportunity for them to meet together to compare techniques and methods and to be instructed by acknowledged experts.

C. J. Webb, President of the Society of Industrial and Cost Accountants of Nova Scotia said that these seminars were indicative of the continuous extension of university facilities and services to meet the increasing educational needs evolving from growth and progress in the Canadian business community.

A message from The President of Dalhousie University Dr. A. E. Kerr

The following is a portion of an address of welcome given by Dr. Kerr to the Freshman Class at a special convocation held October 6, 1959, in the Arts and Administration Building:

Let me congratulate you on the fact that you have been admitted to membership in a university community. This makes you one

of the privileged people of your gen-eration, and I hope you will not take your good fortune for granted. You are all here of course because you willed to come, but it should be noted that a number of other conditions had to exist before you could come. In different circumstances many young people of your age, who are not here but who have the ability to benefit from a university education would have been here with you. At the end of the Second World War the opportunity was given to members of the Armed Forces to undertake university studies and many who ordinarily would never have seen the inside of a university became students and gave an excellent account of themselves. Appraisals have been made from time to time of the number of potential students whose formal education ends

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with high school, and on every estimate the proportion is disturbingly large. But in your case the necessary circumstances obtained, and you have taken your place in this small and highly favoured company of university men and women.

According to figures presented a few years ago to the National Conference of Canadian Universities only six per cent of the youth of **Canada** of the appropriate age were then registered in any college or university. As a matter of interest the corresponding figure in the United States at the same time was above thirty per cent and in the United Kingdom it was a mere three point seven five. To make

these comparisons really fair it would be necessary to allow for a number of facts to which I cannot take time at present to divert. Suffice it to say that the statistics without some exposition and analysis might be quite misleading. But the figure of six per cent for Canada at that time-and I have no reason to think that it has changed significantly since the report was made to us-involves no comparison with any other country where the educational systems may be different from our own: it is simply an analysis of the figures compiled by our authoritative Canadian Bureau of Statistics in The plain fact then is that out of any group of approxi-Ottawa. mately fifteen young people of university age in Canada only one actually reaches university and reaps the resulting advantages. Now you whom we welcome this morning belong to that very enviable minority. You have been admitted to privileges that all but a few of your Canadian contempories have to forego. You can avail vourselves of splendid academic facilities that have been provided largely by endowments created by the benefactors of the University. by foundations that are responsible for the use of trust funds and by Governments that can make appropriations from the taxes paid by the people. It is literally true, to quote the familiar words of Holy Scripture, that others "have laboured and you have entered into their labours." You can stay here just as long as your financial resources permit and you remain on friendly terms with the Committee on Studies of your faculty, and you can finally obtain the degree upon which you have set your heart. We entertain the hope that you will all appreciate the special privileges that you are per-mitted to enjoy, and that you will subscribe to the familiar sentiment noblesse oblige.

### GRATIFYING RESPONSE

Due to the generosity of many supporters, the Dalhousie Alumni Football Fund ended the year with a total of \$1286 collected. ## Only Half Way There!!

The Dalhousie Alumni Fund was established in 1955 with a goal of \$100,000 to be raised in five years. With only one year to go, the Fund stands at approximately \$50,000, or half way. The Executive still feels, however, that Dalhousians will not let the Fund fail, and are making a determined effort to achieve the goal. Letters have been sent out to our 8,000 alumni, along with two post-dated cheques for \$10 apiece, a blank cheque for those who prefer some other method of contributing, and a return envelope for convenience. A healthy response to this appeal is necessary if the Alumni Association is to honour its pledge to the University.

Investigation shows that we Dalhousians are not nearly as effective in our support of the University as are other Alumni Organizations. We seem prone to sit back and let a few members make very generous contributions, instead of many members making moderate donations. Only 25 per cent of our number respond to an appeal, while other universities regularly receive contributions from as many as 70 per cent of their alumni. It is not an enviable record, but one which can be improved if everyone will do his part.

### New X-Ray Microscopy Development

Dr. R. L. de C. H. Saunders, M.D., Ch.B. (Edin.), F.R.S. (E. & S. A.), F.R.S.A., (Dr. D. G. J. Campbell Memorial Professor of Anatomy) Dalhousie University, and L. Van der Zwan, B.Sc. (Dal.), graduate student in Physics at Dalhousie University, presented a paper entitled, "X-ray Projection Microscopy—Applications in Biology and Medicine" to the Institute of Radio Engineers' Canadian Convention, Toronto, on October 7, 8 and 9.

Dr. Saunders pointed out that five methods of obtaining enlarged images of microscopic objects with x-ray have been developed. The best results obtained so far have been with the X-ray Projection Microscope developed at the Cavendish Laboratory, Cambridge University, which is the type of instrument recently installed at Dalhousie University, and the first of its kind in Canada. It is capable of providing a resolution of 0.1 microns (1 micron equals 1/1000 of a millimeter). THE ALUMNI NEWS

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MEN'S RESIDENCE CORNERSTINE LAID

The Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe, P.C., LL.D., first 'hancellor of Dalhousie University, declared the stone to be "well and trulylaid" at a special Convocation held on October 28th, 1959. The cornersone laying marked another step in the progress on the new \$1,500,000 Mn's Residence, scheduled for completion in the summer of 1960. Work s currently progressing on the third floor of the structure which will contain 158 rooms when compieted. The Dalhousie Alumni Association has pedged \$100,000 toward the cost of the residence.

## Chancellor Howe Lays Cornerstone of Men's Residence

A special convocation was held on Wednesday, October 28, at Dalhousie University to mark the unveiling of a portrait of the Right Honourable C. D. Howe, PC., LL.D., Chancellor of Dalhousie University and the laying of the cornerstone of the new Dalhousie Men's Residence.

At 11.30 a.m. the portrait of Chancellor Howe was unveiled by the Honourable Mr. Justice John Doull in the Board and Senate Room of the University. A gift of the Sir James Dunn Foundation, the portrait is the work of Robin Watt and was completed this year.

At 12 noon, before approximately 750 invited guests, students and alumni, Chancellor Howe layed the cornerstone. Enclosed in the box were; a copy of the Bible, a copy of the programme for the ceremony, a drawing of the platform layout for the cornerstone laying, a plan of Studley Campus, the latest copy of Alumni News, Dalhousie Review, Dalhousie Gazette, the Halifax Chronicle Herald, one of each of the Canadian silver coins for 1959, a Dalhousie Calendar for 1959-60 and a complete list of the contents.

Following the ceremony, Donald McInnes Q.C. chairman of the Board of Governors, and Dr. A.E. Kerr, President of the university, were hosts at a luncheon at the Halifax Club. Mr. Howe was the guest of honour.

The completion of the Dalhousie Men's Residence marks a great step forward in presenting attractive and suitable accommodations for male students. Housing 158, the building will feature a student snack bar, a large kitchen, two special guest rooms and individually controlled heat thermostats for each room.

### NEW FLOOR IN DAL RINK

During the summer a special concrete floor was laid in the Dalhousie Memorial Rink. Made to withstand very low temperatures, the floor will provide a smooth surface for such activities as roller skating, exhibitions, and shows, when the rink is not being used for ice skating. It is also hoped that the floor will enable the university to hold convocations in the rink.

The floor originally consisted of sand packed around the freezing pipes, which meant the building stood idle whenever it was not being used for skating.

### Our New Director of Alumni Affairs

Dr. A. E. Kerr, President of Dalhousie University announced the appointment of Bruce G. Irwin to the position Director of Alumni Affairs on September 1st, 1959. The position was created by the Board of Governors of Dalhousie to further the development of the Alumni Association and the relations between the University and its Alumni.

Mr. Irwin, originally from Shelburne, N. S., attended Shelburne Academy and the Maritime Business College. In 1953 he graduated from Dalhousie with a Bachelor of Commerce Degree and joined B. F. Goodrich Canada Ltd., Kitchener, Ontario, where he had been employed in a supervisory capacity prior to assuming his new duties.

While at Dalhousie he worked on the Dalhousie Gazette and was active in the Commerce Society, being President of that organization during the 1951-1952 session. He also worked as a Demonstrator in Accounting under the late Professor Wilfred Berman.

Along with his regular duties in the Alumni Office, Mr. Irwin will also be editing future editions of the Alumni News, and is working on plans for the expansion of the Alumni Association.

It is hoped that several new branches will be organized in the near future, and work is progressing on the re-organization of some of the branches which have become inactive over the past few years.

Mr. Irwin also has several ideas about Alumni reunions, dinners, and projects which you will be hearing about at a later date.

Mr. Irwin believes that because of the high calibre of Dalhousians, we will eventually have one of the strongest Alumni Associations in Canada. He feels confident that the co-operation of all members will be forthcoming to make this possible.

At a luncheon meeting in Winnipeg on June 12, 1959, just too late to be reported in the last number of THE NEWS, a small but keenly interested group formed the nucleus of an Alumni Association. Following the luncheon, a brief meeting of organization was held at which Mrs. Wiswell was elected President of the Winnipeg Branch of the Alumni Association, and Miss Brownell was approved as Secretary. Both President and Secretary are actively interested and have a wide knowledge of Dalhousians in the Winnipeg area.

### ASSISTANT IN MATH

Mr. Hugh D. Cochrane has been appointed Assistant Professor of Mathematics. A native of Toronto, he attended Upper Canada College, and the University of Toronto where he received his Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1946. He took post-graduate studies at Cambridge, and received his M.A. there in 1949.

Mr. Cochrane has held several responsible posts before coming to Dalhousie. In 1950-51 he was an Economic Assistant to the Marshall Plan Organization in Paris, and in 1953-54 he was Statistician with a marketing research firm in New York. He comes to Dalhousie from Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., where he has been a Lecturer in Mathematics since 1956. He has also lectured in Mathematics at Carleton College, Ottawa, and the University of Rhode Island.

## With Other Alumni

### **Mount Allison Record**

The main values of annual giving are that (a) it ordinarily brings in unrestricted money, (b) it can generally be used as a "budgeted asset" and applied to current operating expenses, (c) it is not only a dependable backlog for current operations, but a feeder line for occasional capital gifts or bequests, and (d) a regularly contributing alumnus or other friend is a kind of ambassador for the institution.

### University of Manitoba Journal

The S.C.M. Advisory Board has announced appointment of Molly Puxley to the staff of S.C.M. at the University of Manitoba, as associate secretary to Rev. W. D. Titus. Miss Puxley, a graduate of Kings College, Halifax, has been studying French at the University of Manitoba for the past year. Daughter of Canon Puxley, president of Kings College, she was for some time general secretary of the Student Christian Movement of Canada.

### Acadia Bulletin

Low salary and a sense of personal inadequacy were the reasons occurring most frequently in the replies of students who do not desire to become teachers. The teachers' salaries were compared with salaries paid for work in fields requiring the same and sometimes less preparation. They were also discussed in relation to the education which the students believed was necessary for a teacher to qualify for the better paying positions in education. A number of conflicting statements from the students are of interest. Two of these are: "The pay is not high enough for the education needed to become a good teacher", and "Although teachers are always hollering about the low salaries, I never saw any starving yet." When evaluating these reasons, careful thought should be given to the students' level of maturity and to their lack of reliable information on recent salary and salary schedule changes. However, it is apparent that salary is a major consideration of these high school students in their choice of a career.

### University of Toronto Graduate

GRADUATES FOR TOMORROW, a balanced and penetrating documentary about the University of Toronto, has been completed by Arthur Chetwynd's motion picture company. Colour prints in 16 mm. are ready for distribution. The film runs for 14 minutes.

Mingled with nostalgic vistas are scenes which will surprise many an old grad: a little room in the Physics Building cut off from radiation by 50 tons of steel walls; the bang and quivering shape of shock waves caused by speeds five times that of sound; the instrument panels and winking lights of a modern psychology lab.

The camera pokes its nose into the University's sub-critical atomic reactor, moves on to a closed-circuit television lecture, then to seminars.

### McMaster Alumni News

... and from letters that came to me, a picture of the average B.Sc. in chemistry emerges. He is a Hamilton boy who now lives and works elsewhere in Ontario (likely in Toronto or Sarnia); he has an M.Sc. or at least has done some graduate work; he is working as a chemist in a chemical industry; he is in research or development work, and is glad that he is; he won his B.Sc. ten years ago and had his thirty-third birthday this year; his salary has increased \$800 in each of the last three years and is now \$8000 a year; he is married and has two children—and will soon have three; he is proud of being a McMaster graduate in chemistry, and glad that his Course included classes in the humanities.

## The U.B.C. Chronicle

U.B.C. opened in 1915, . . . with a registration of 435 and offered courses leading to a bachelor of arts degree and the first three years of the bachelor of applied science degree.

In 1958, with just under 10,000 students full undergraduate work is offered for 15 degrees in nine faculties. In addition seven degrees are offered in the faculty of graduate studies and Ph.D. work in 24 separate fields of study.

"My very brief history can have no tidy conclusion," the president says. "Neat summaries of the history of an institution can be made only when it is statis—or dead. The University of British Columbia is very much alive and I hope it will continue to develop as it has done in the past."

## Ernest Brehaut Memorial Bursary

Is Dalhousie University well and favorably known in Prince Edward Island? Are Dalhousie's news releases read? Are young men in P. E. I. quick to grasp opportunities? Is there appreciation of the generosity of Dalhousie's benefactors?

Judging by recent happenings the answer to all these questions seems, very much so, to be "yes."

On Saturday, September 26, a news release appearing below, was run in the Prince Edward Island press.

On Monday, September 28, an application for the Ernest Brehaut Memorial Bursary was received from Robert A. Lund, Charlottetown. The application was accepted and a few days later he was a pre-med student at the university.

An announcement of the establishment of the Ernest Brehaut Memorial Bursary in Dalhousie University has been made by President A. E. Kerr. The Bursary has been endowed by Mrs. Brehaut, who now resides in Colorado Springs. The late Dr. Brehaut was born in Murray Harbour, Prince Edward Island, and came from a family that has made a fine contribution to the learned professions. He graduated as B.A. from Dalhousie in 1894. During his course he won the North British Society Prize in 1892, and the Senior Munro Exhibition Prize in 1893. After his graduation from Dalhousie he went to Harvard, where he obtained his B.A. and M.A. Then because of a breakdown in health he went to Colorado, where he taught Latin for some years in Colorado College. When he recovered his health he resumed his studies, and obtained the degree of Ph.D from Columbia University in 1912. His doctoral dissertation, 'An Encyclopedist of the Dark Ages: Isidore of Seville,' was published by the Columbia University Press. After many years of service as an honoured Professor at Colorado College, he died in 1954.

"The Bursary, which will be awarded annually by Dalhousie, will cover the present tuition fees in the normal first year of the Arts and Science course. It will be restricted to qualified students from Prince Edward Island, preference being given to relatives of the late Professor Brehaut. While the academic record of the applicant is important, character, financial need, and the report of the school or college principal will also be considered in making the selection. Students interested in obtaining the Bursary for the 1959-1960 session should write to the Registrar, Dalhousie University. "Mrs. Brehaut, in endowing the Bursary, said that a fund to provide financial aid for students was the kind of memorial that would have pleased her husband best. Further, she said, 'It will keep his name in close connection with Prince Edward Island, his home.' Her intention, as she expressed it in a letter, is that the Bursary should benefit a 'boy from Prince Edward Island who needs the help in order to get an education, and is the kind who could make good use of it.' In making the announcement, Dr. Kerr remarked, 'In a long succession, many able young men from Prince Edward Island have come to Dalhousie for their university education, and subsequently have achieved positions of eminence and usefulness in many parts of Canada and the United States. Professor Brehaut was one of this company, and we are most grateful to Mrs. Brehaut for perpetuating his name in the University, in a manner that will help deserving students from his native Province to continue their education and maintain the excellent tradition.'

"The initial award will be made for one year only; but if the successful candidate achieves satisfactory academic standing he will be considered, year by year, for a renewal of the Bursary. Therefore it is quite possible that the winner may receive assistance throughout his entire course.

"In any year in which the Bursary is not awarded, the income from the endowment will be used to provide the 'Ernest Brehaut Memorial Lectures,' to be given by an outstanding scholar on the invitation of the University."

### Dalhousians at Faraday Society Meeting

Dr. Walter J. Chute, Head of the Department of Chemistry, and Dr. K. E. Hayes, Assistant Professor of Chemistry at Dalhousie University, attended a meeting of the Faraday Society in Kingston, Ontario in September. This was only the third occasion in the long history of the Society that it had met outside the British Isles. The 1960 meeting is scheduled for England.

Sponsored by the National Research Council and the Chemical Institute of Canada, the meeting was held at Queens University, and presided over by Dr. E. W. R. Steacie, President of the National Research Council, and President of the Society.

Attended by 200 delegates from Great Britain, the United States and Canada, the meeting dealt with solid state and crystal imperfections. Twenty papers were presented. There were many most interesting informal discussions on the subject.

### Dal Chemistry Professor at World Conference

Dr. W. R. Trost, associate professor of chemistry at Dalhousie University was one of six official delegates representing Canada at the congress and conference of the international union of pure and applied chemistry held at Munich, Germany and attended by 5,000 delegates.

A graduate of the University of Alberta and McGill, Dr. Trost has done post doctoral work as a Royal Society Fellow at Oxford University, and is national chairman of the inorganic chemistry division of the Canadian Institute of Chemistry.

The union is a world-wide organization consisting of members from major nations on both sides of the "Iron Curtain," and deals with all aspects of chemistry. The congress is attended by from two to six official delegates from each country depending upon that country's category, and this year passed two resolutions of particular interest to Canadians. The first was a change in Canada's category to senior status with six delegates, and the second was the acceptance of the Canadian invitation to hold the next meeting in Montreal in 1961. Both Montreal and Moscow were considered, but Montreal was the final choice of the congress.

A major resolution adopted by the congress was to have carbon replace oxygen as the standard unit of atomic weight measurement, if this is acceptable to other scientific bodies.

### Yesterday and Today

That was yesteryear.

Today?

The story is told in the following paragraph from a news release by the Public Relations Officer. Dalhousie University:

The 1959 Initiation Programme gets under way at Dalhousie University on Wednesday morning, with a guided tour followed by several days of social activities which are designed to familiarize the freshmen with the University, and acquaint them with their fellow and upper classmen. The only carry-over from "hazing", which disappeared from the campus five years ago, are the beanies and placards which the freshmen will wear until after Saturday's football game at Studley. The programme is run by a committee of 2nd year students, headed by Frank Henson of Halifax, and is one of the highlights of the fall term.

### MORE PIONEERING BY DALHOUSIE

Chartered Accountant students from the four Atlantic Provinces attended a five-day pre-examination seminar sponsored jointly by the Dalhousie Commerce Department and the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Nova Scotia. Started several years ago by the late Prof. Wilfred Berman of Dalhousie, to assist those senior Commerce students who were preparing for their final examinations in Chartered Accountancy, the seminar has grown in popularity over the years, until it is now jointly sponsored by the University and the Institute and is open to all Chartered Accountant students in the Maritimes and Newfoundland.

The seminar is headed by Prof. Irvine E. Millie, C.A., of the Dalhousie Commerce Department and R. Allen Finley, C.A., of Lee and Martin of Halifax. Final year students receive their instruction from Prof. Millie, and Primary and Intermediate students are instructed by Chartered Accountants D. F. C. Burton, David A. Roscoe, Lawrence Doane, and Hugh Hartling of local accounting firms. They are also assisted in marking the trial exam papers by several other local chartered accountants.

The students start the seminar by writing several mock examinations. These are then marked and the students are instructed from the results of these exams as to correct text and technique. The actual exams are written at the students home localities.

Prof. Millie stated, "this is another field in which Dalhousie has pioneered, and we have had enquiries from many interested parties across the country who are considering the establishment of similar seminars."

### REPRESENTED DALHOUSIE AT SILVER JUBILEE OF INDIA MEDICAL COUNCIL

Dalhousie was well represented at the Silver Jubilee of the Medical Council of India. The representative was Dr. Jean Whittier, M.D., C.M. '29, from Banswara, Rajasthanm India.

Interesting sidelights on the conference are given in the following excerpts from a letter written by Dr. Whittier to President Kerr following her return home:

"This is to let you know how much I appreciated your thought in suggesting my name to represent Dalhousie at the Silver Jubilee of the Medical Council of India. India is rather a young country as far as education is concerned . . . but it is trying to come up fast. It has had a Medical Association for 35 years but Medical Council for only 25 years. There are 50 Medical Schools connected with universities each giving their own degree, and not all states have branches of Medical Council, but the steps are being taken, and taken in the right directtion. This annual meeting was discussing especially postgraduate work and the need to have some that could be recognized by all medical colleges. We were divided into groups according to specialities. I went into the one in Obstetrics and Gynecology and we discussed postgraduate diplomas and degrees, consultant requirements and professorship requirements, years of experience and study requirements, etc. There were 18 such groups covering most medical and surgical specialties and Saturday morning there was again a big medical meeting and each group reported their findings. It will certainly give them some idea for future discussions and basis on which rules may be made.

"... It was good to see and to hear Mr. Nehru, also the Health Minister, Mr. Karmarker and Dr. Patel, the President of the Medical Council. The other two specials at the inauguration meeting were Dr. Mehta, Finance Minister of Benebay State and Dr. Roy, Chief Minister of West Bengal. Going home from the last meeting I was with Dr. John Herme of W.H.O. who had been in Indore before I went home on furlough, and I had met him there. Also Dr. Miss Patel, Principal of Lady Herding College was there and three doctors for Ludhiana, Dr. Snow, the Principal, Dr. Martin, the Paediatrician, and Dr. Hervie, the Obstetrician and Gynaecologist, the Heads of Departments.

"I did enjoy it very much and I do thank you for making this possible by suggesting my name. I was glad to represent Dalhousie and proud.

"There was another Conference immediately after. The Planned Parenthood (International). They say 28 countries were represented and 700 delegates. Dr. Roland McCleure and Mrs. Norman McKenzie were there from our Mission but I could not stay. Nurses and Midwives exams are too near and they need more classes so I came back as soon as the meetings were over."

### **ASSISTING FOREIGN STUDENTS**

As a special service to foreign students registering at Dalhousie the Business Office has been able to locate approximately 68 rooms in the city to accomodate foreign students.

This has been done through the work of a special Committee on Accommodation for Foreign Students set up at Dalhousie. The committee consists of Prof. A. R. Bevan, Prof. Graham Murray, Dr. R. H. Bingham, Dr. Carl Tupper, and Dean Archibald.

Members of the Business Office offer these students advice when they register and assist them in making contact with householders who are listed as willing to take foreign students.

Last year at Dalhousie there were 63 foreign students registered, of which number 23 were in residence, and the rest were located in private homes.

### ALL ALUMNUS HEADS ROTARY

Dr. George R. Smith, Truro, Dalhousie Alumnus, is the 1959-60 district governor of Rotary International. As governor he will be visiting all clubs in the district during his year of office.


