HISTORY



Our Heritage

In 1817, George Ramsay, the ninth Earl of Dalhousie and Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, was determined to found a college "... upon the principles of religious toleration," and "in imitation of the University of Edinburgh". Although Nova Scotia boasted King's College in Windsor, the entrance exam effectively excluded many due to religious affiliation.

The funds used to begin construction of Dalhousie College were obtained from customs duties acquired by the British during their occupation of Castine, Maine in 1814.



On May 22nd, 1820 the Earl of Dalhousie laid the cornerstone of the first Dalhousie College. The original site was the Grand Parade where Halifax City Hall presently stands.

The buildings were ready for occupation in 1823, however the College still had many problems to solve before it could open its doors. Not only had the professors not been chosen, the early supporters of the college were apprehensive, believing King's College to be sufficient. Two attempts to amalgamate the colleges failed and it wasn't until 1838 that Dalhousie came to function as a college, with Reverend Thomas McCulloch serving as President.

Dalhousie offered only three chairs on opening: Classical Languages, Mathematics and Natural Philosophy.

The first class consisted of twelve students, which later increased to six-

teen. Courses lasted for four years; tuition was between \$6 and \$24.

When President McCulloch died in 1843, the college closed and remained so until 1848 when enough funds were accumulated to continue Dalhousie's educational services. From 1849 to 1860, the facilities served as a high school.

The latter part of the nineteenth century was a busy time at Dalhousie. In 1866 the first degree of Bachelor of Arts was awarded. One year later the University Library was founded and in 1868 the Faculty of Medicine was established. The Dalhousie Gazette published its first edition in 1869 and the Alumni Association organized in 1871.

In 1885 President Dr. John Forrest, the third President of Dalhousie, along with his brother-in-law, George Munro, founded five new chairs, Physics, History, Political Economy,

English Literature, Law and Philosophy. Munro donated \$350,000 which was used to erect new buildings and to improve the quality of the teaching staff. This generous grant, described as "unparalleled in the history of British North America," has been honored by the proclamation of an annual University holiday, Munro Day.

Dalhousie moved to Carleton Street in 1886 where the Forrest Building was built housing the Faculties of Law, Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy, and Biology. Ready to expand, the University purchased the Studley Estate in 1912 for \$50,000 and here the Science Building (now the Chemistry Building) and the MacDonald Memorial Library were constructed.

Between 1920 and 1930, the Law Building (now the Faculty Club) and Shirreff hall were completed.



The funds used to construct the Women's Residence were donated by Mrs. E.B. Eddy. During the 1930's the Gymnasium and the Medical Dental Library were built.

Dalhousie maintained its good reputation throughout its many transitions. During the Second World War, while many men were not attending classes at Dal, roughly 1/2 of the Inner Cabinet War Committee (the most important group in government at that time) were Dalhousians.

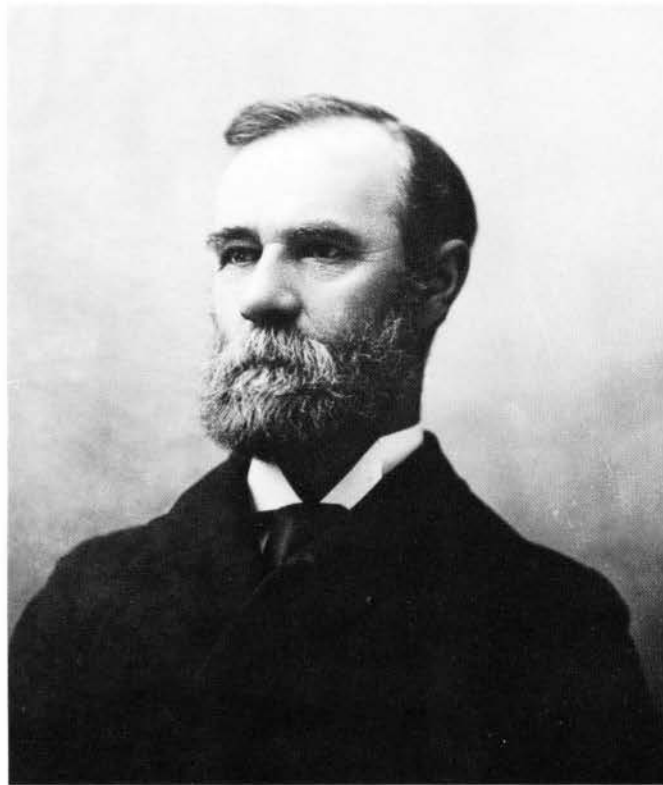
With the 1950's came the construction of the Arts and Administration Building and the Memorial Rink but it was not until the 1960's that Dalhousie "saw the great expansion that changed the little college into something close to a so-called multiversity." The Sir James Dunn Science Building was opened in 1960 and one year later saw the opening of Howe

Hall, the Men's Residence. Also during this decade, a new residence was acquired for the President on Oxford St., Dalhousie became affiliated with the Nova Scotia College of Art, construction began on both the Sir Charles Tupper Medical Building and a new building to house the Law School on University Avenue. The Fall of 1969 saw the opening of the Student Union Building, complete with a live Tiger.

The Fall Session of 1970 saw the completion of the Isaac Walton Killam Memorial Library. The following year the Arts Centre opened, home of the Rebecca Cohn Auditorium. The vast and unique Life Science Centre was erected in 1972, which now incorporates the Biology, Oceanography and Psychology departments.

Nineteen seventy-nine was a progressive year for the sports facilities at Dalhousie. The Memorial Rink, which had



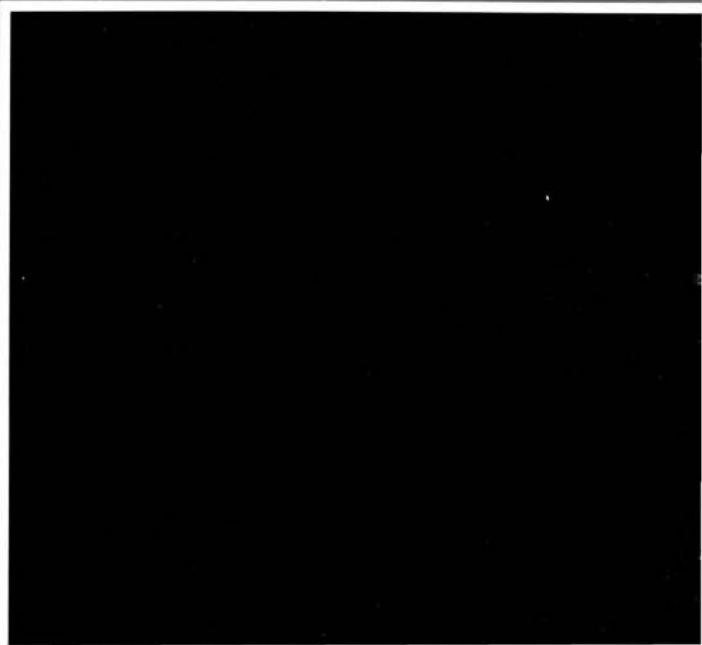


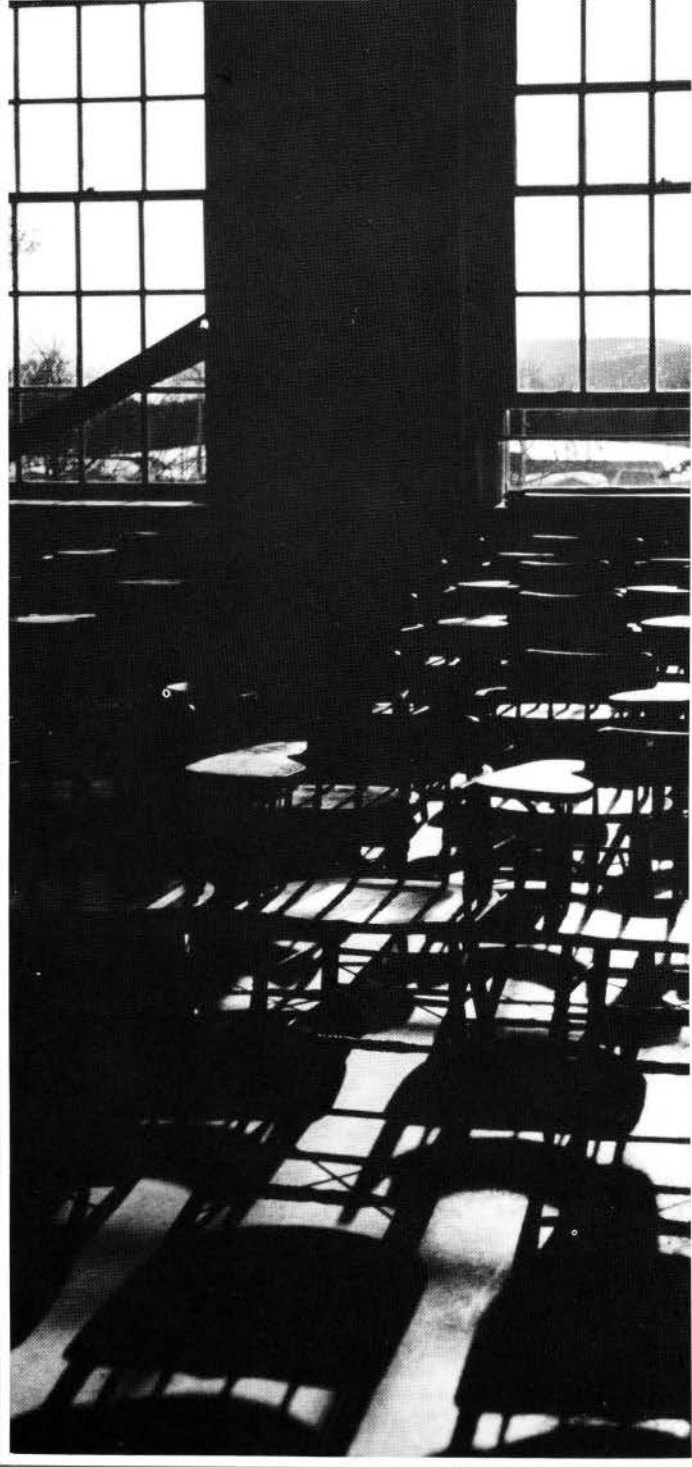
burned to the ground in 1978, was rebuilt and Dalhousie saw the opening of the Dalplex.

Dalhousie was struck once again by fire in August of 1985 when the top two floors of the Weldon Law Building burned causing extensive damage. Luckily, many books survived and have been restored to their temporary home in the Killam Library.

As Dalhousie celebrates its 170th anniversary, she is still growing. The new Eliza Ritchie Women's Residence was opened this Fall and the finishing touches are being placed on the new Chemistry Building. Plans are in the making for renovations to be made this Summer on the SUB and an addition to the Weldon Law Building is underway.

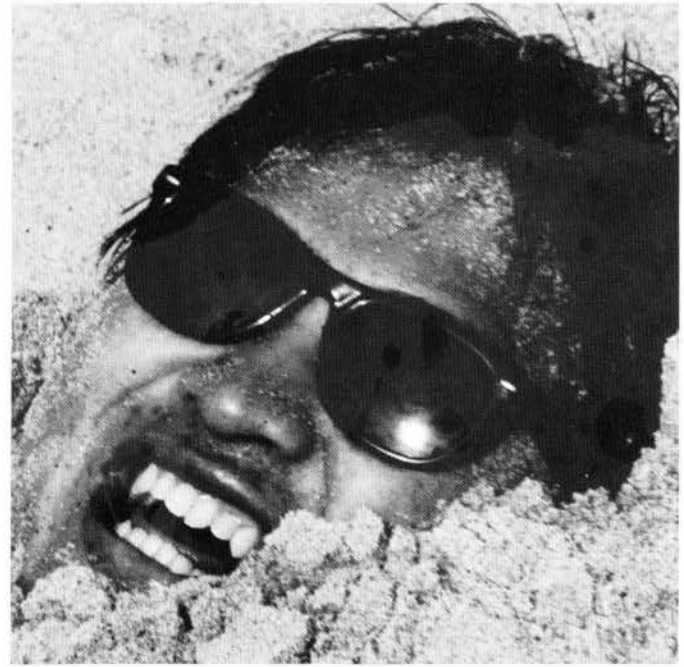

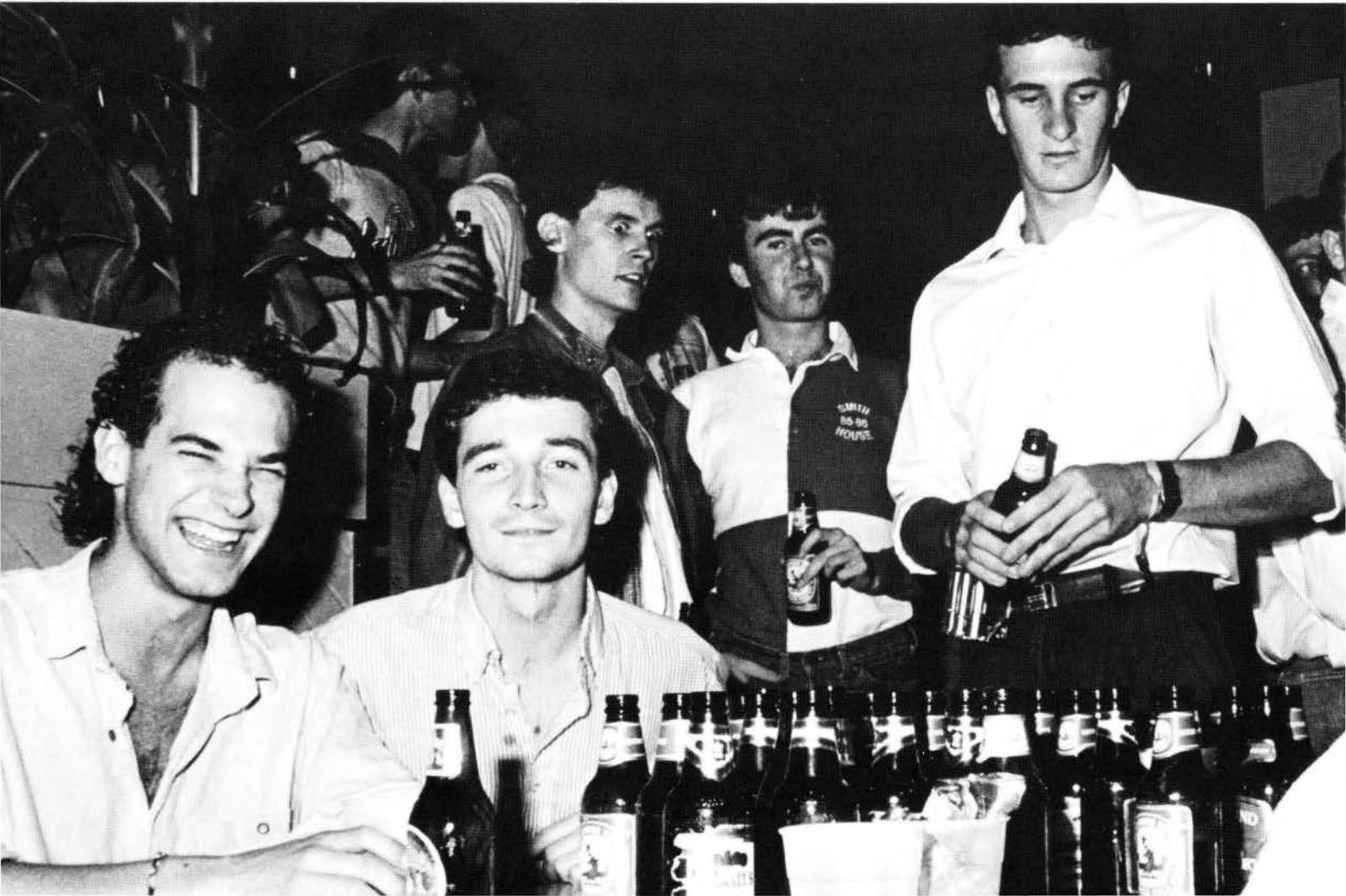
Back to the Beach!





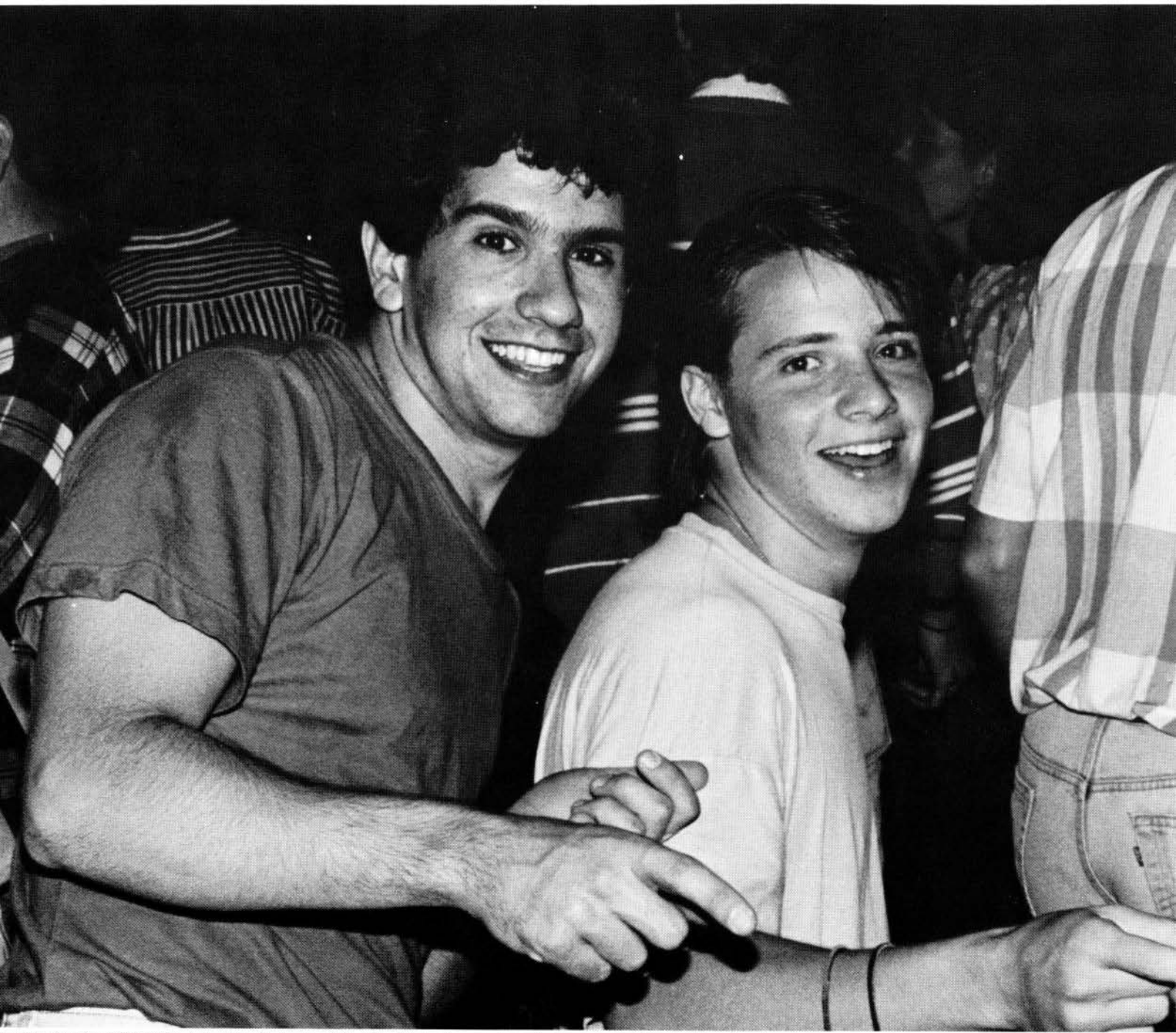

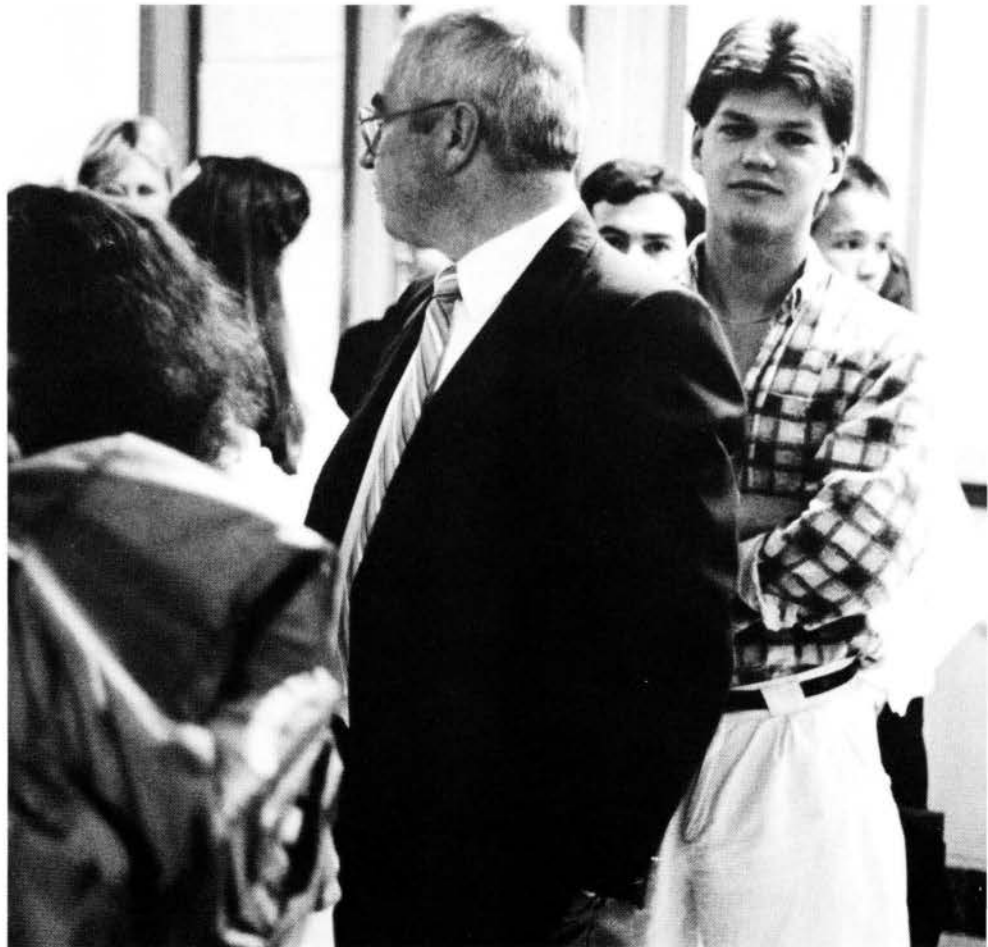

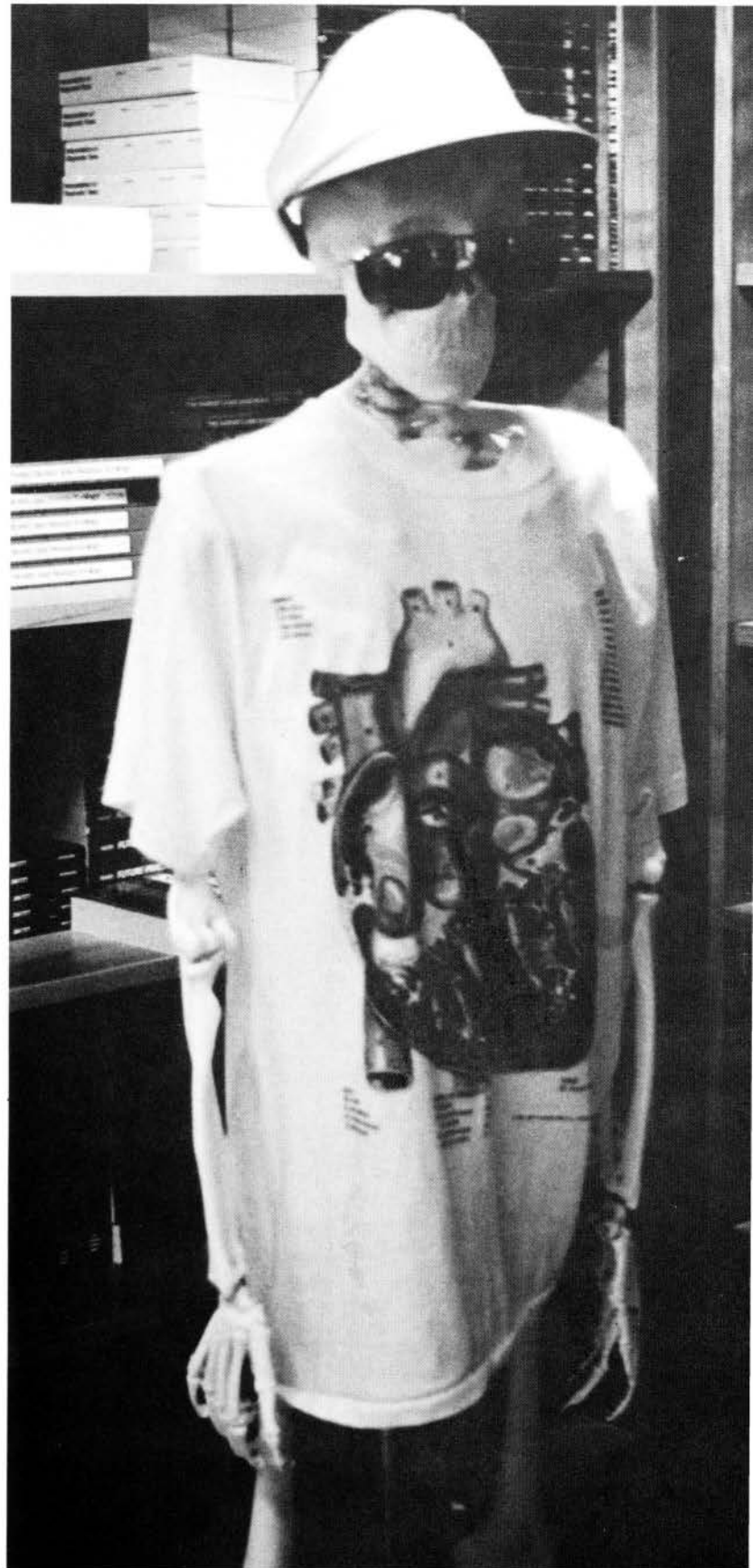
Bookstore Blues

Throughout the rest of the year, the Dal Bookstore is a convenient, well-stocked place to replenish supplies, and purchase Dal memorabilia.

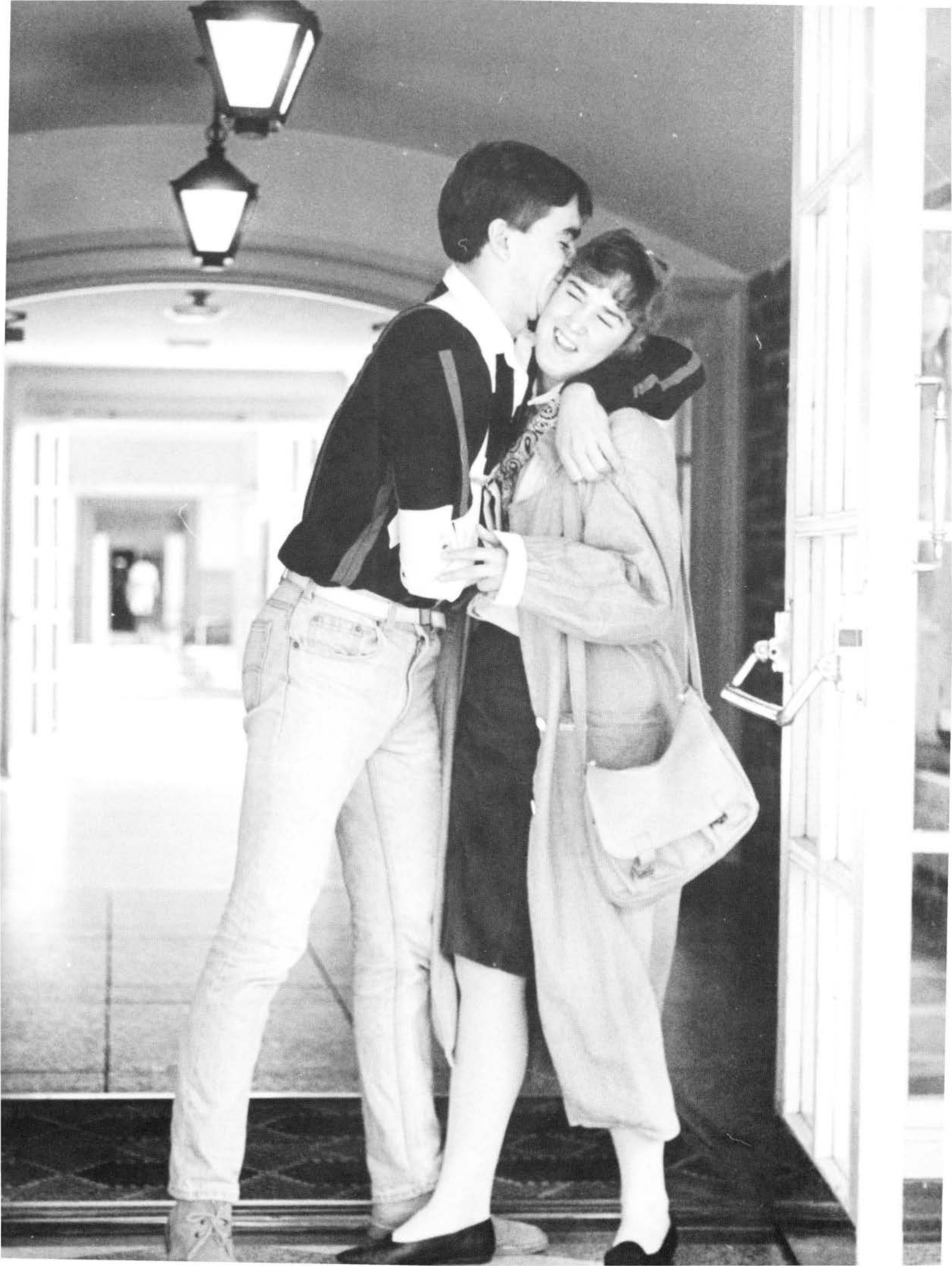




Residence Life

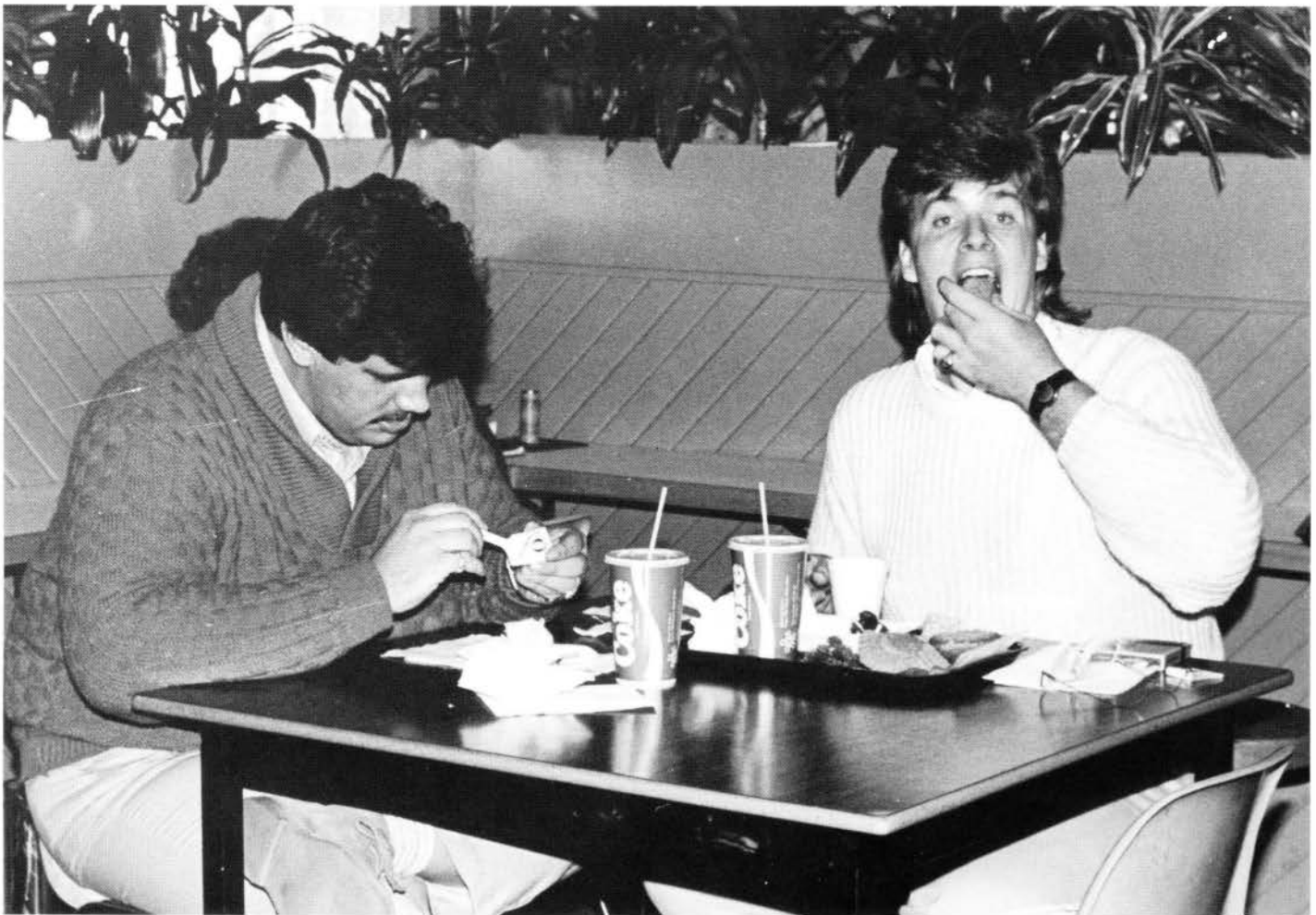
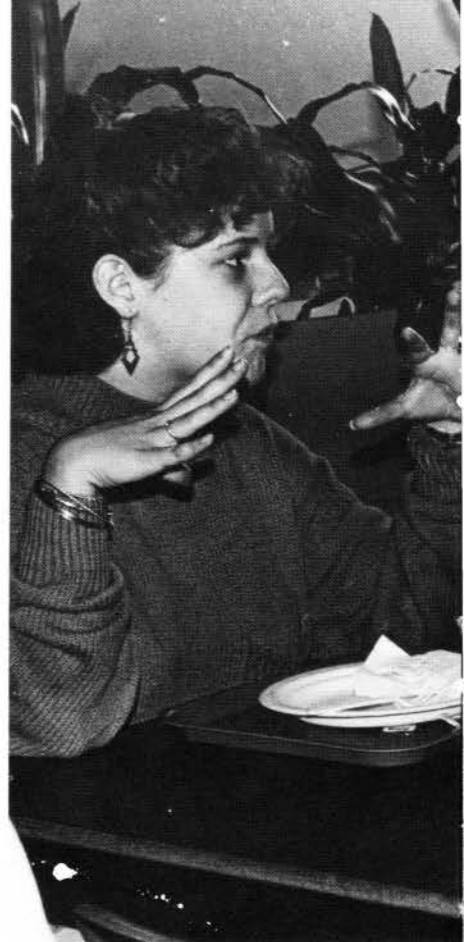


The S.U.B.

The Dalhousie Student Union Building -- popularly known as the S.U.B. -- is a focal point of life on the Dal campus. It was built in 1968 to hold the offices of the Student Union. This year's president, Caroline Zayid occupies offices on the second floor, with the rest of her cabinet.

The Enquiry Desk and Travel Cuts are found in the main lobby. The staff at the Enquiry Desk attempt to answer the questions thrown their way. Travel Cuts provides students with a convenient place to make all of their travel arrangements. Located in the S.U.B.'s basement is the bookstore, and Office Services, which provides student groups and students alike with such services as printing, photocopying, poster-making, paper cutting, etc. There is also a technical department, and a sound service, which are available to any group. Other offices in the S.U.B. include the Chaplaincy office, an office of Counselling and Psychological Services, and a Housing Office. There are also meeting rooms available for student groups on campus and the McInnis Room for big events. Finally, there are the Garden Cafeteria, the Green Room, the Games Room, and the Grawood Lounge.

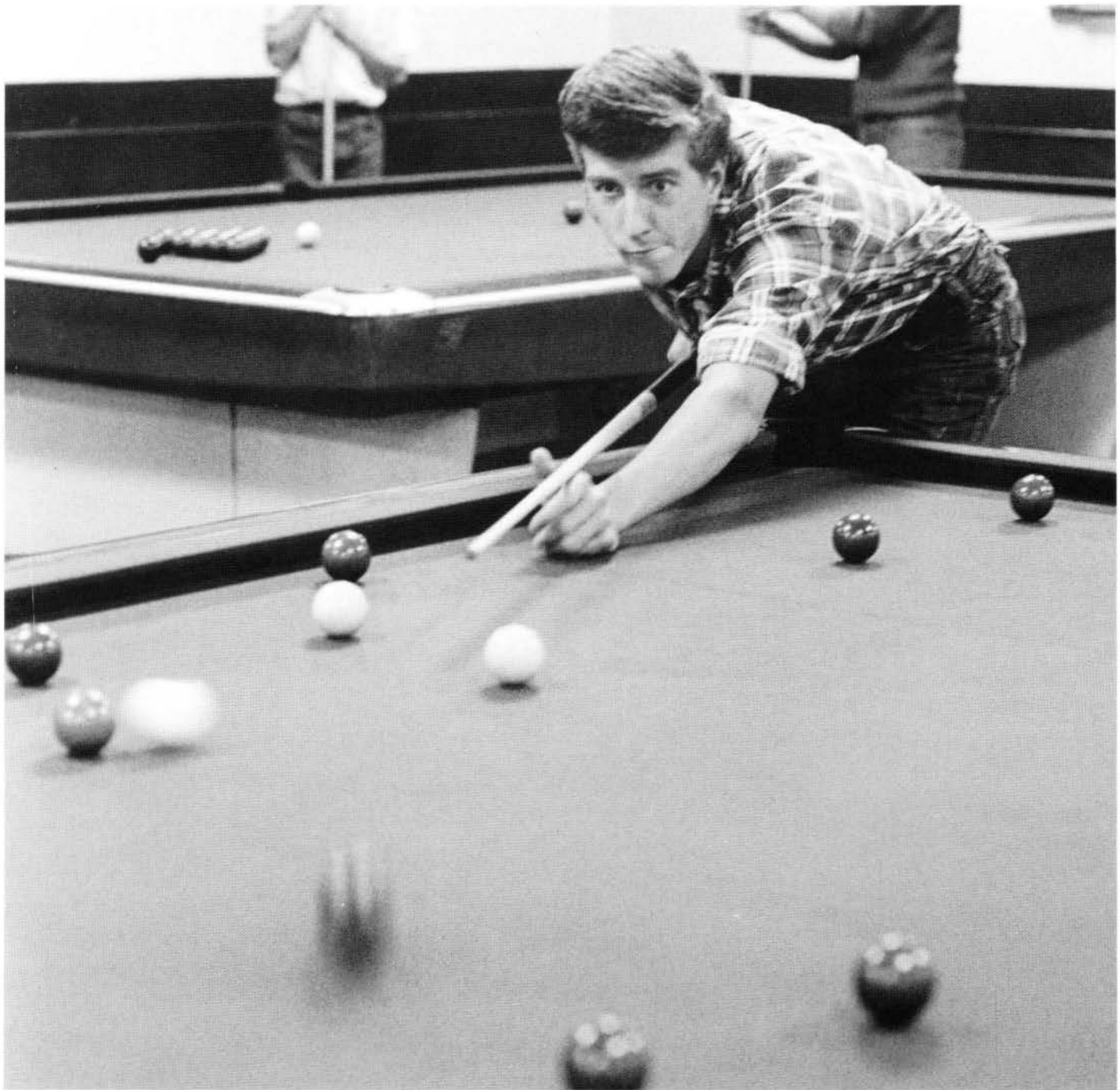


The Green Room

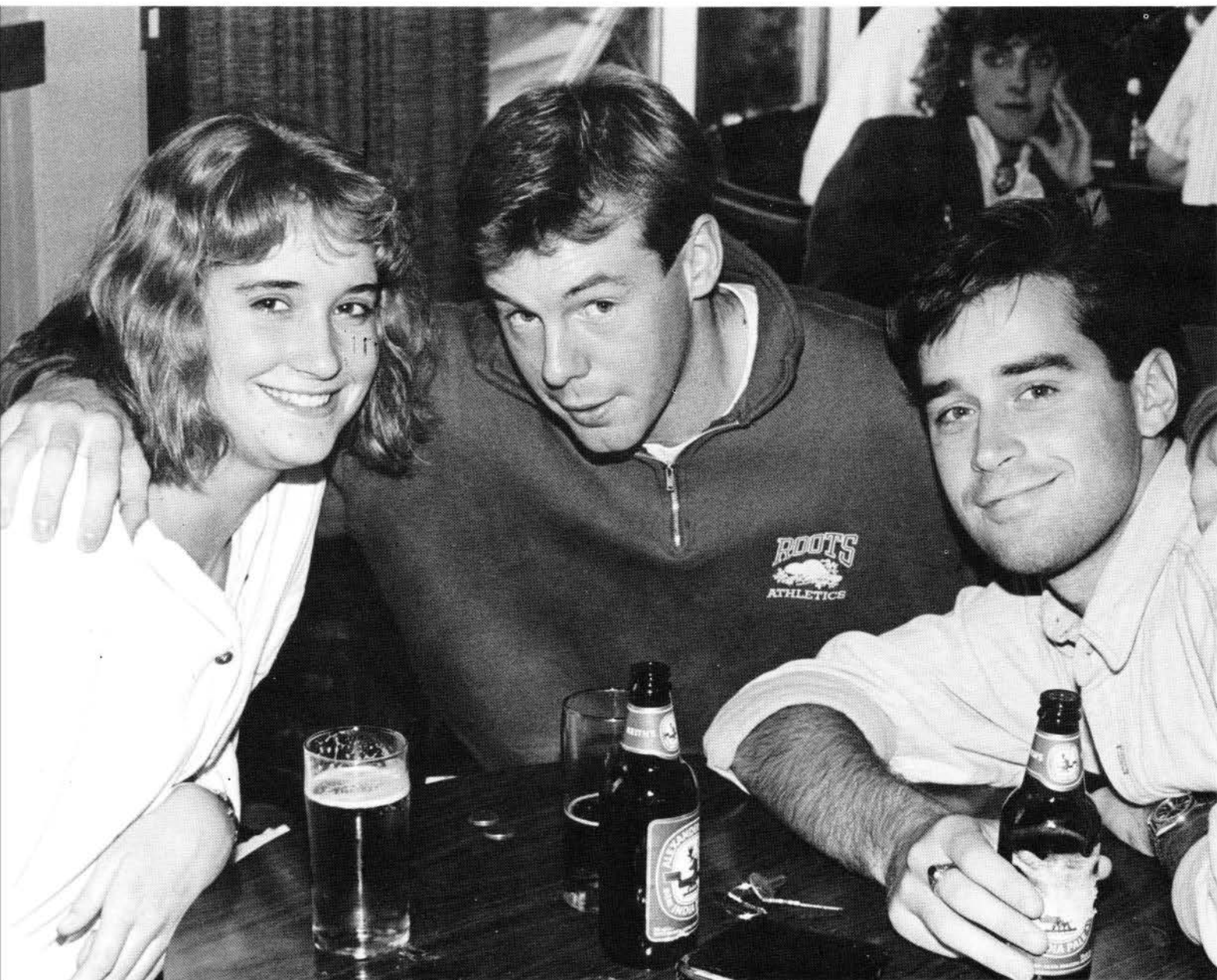

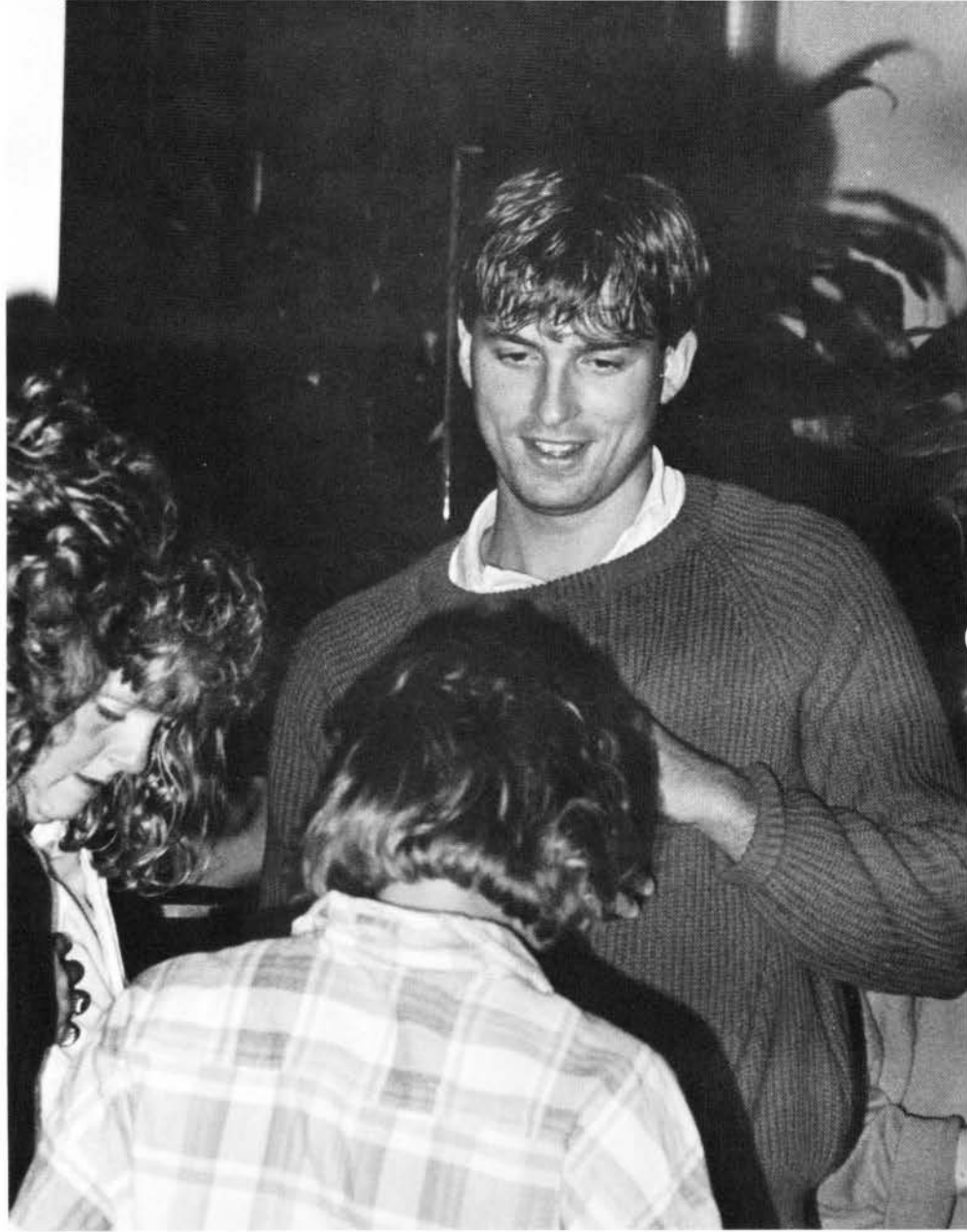

At least once a year, the party in the Grawood gets so big that there is no choice but to move into the Garden Cafeteria.

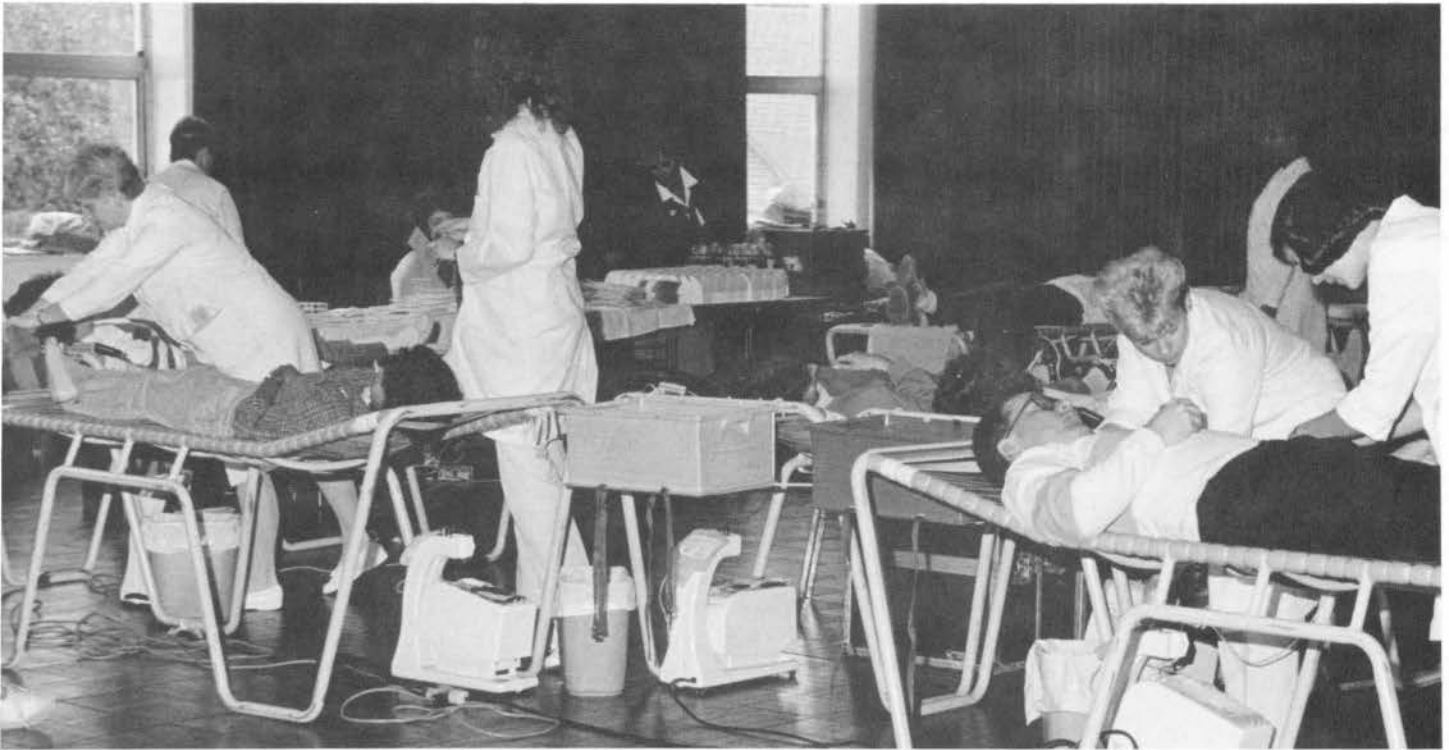
Not only is the Garden a place to meet friends and have coffee, it also is a great alternative to the Grawood and has hosted many a successful party.



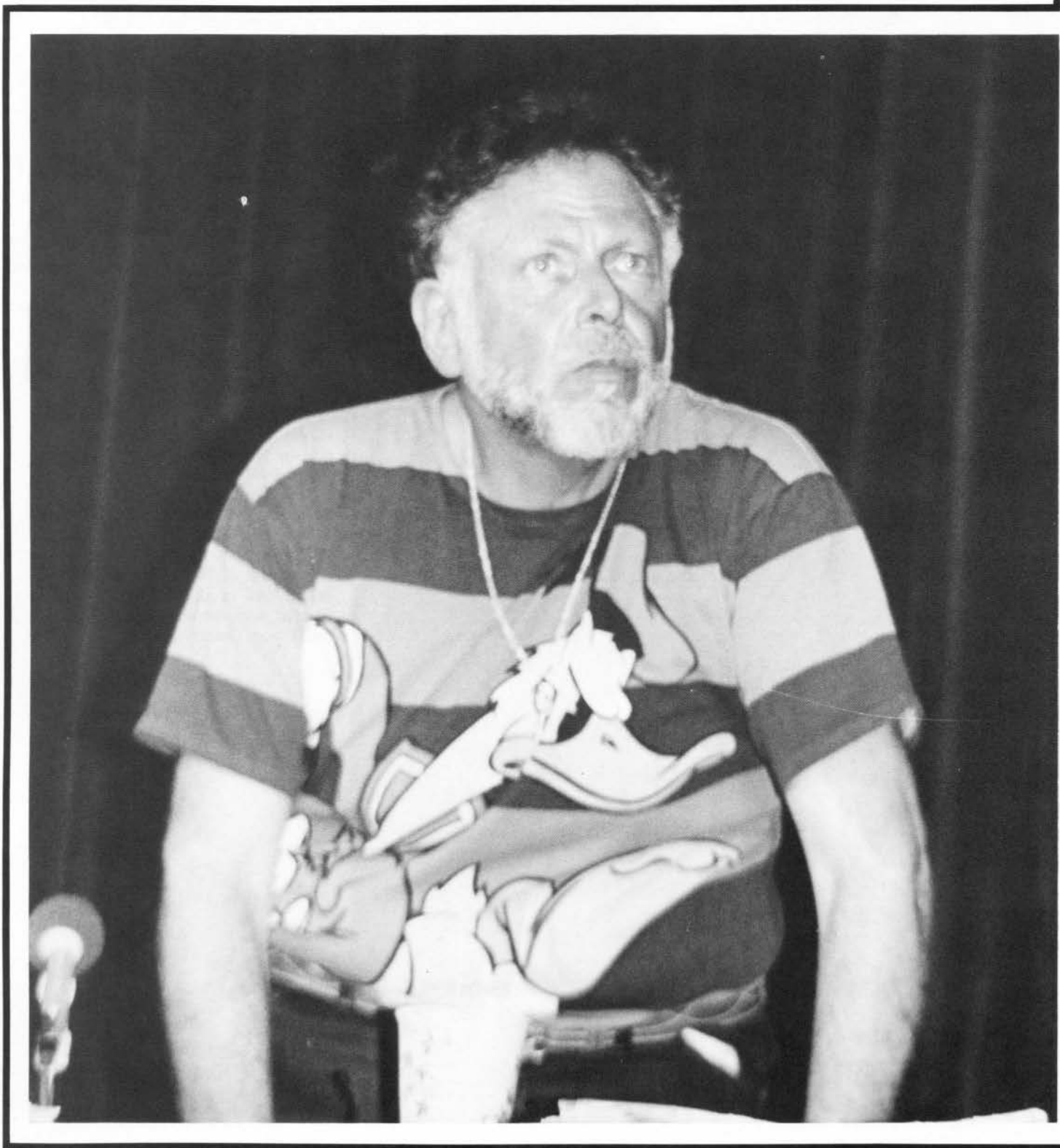




Dal rolls up its sleeves



The Red Cross held two blood donor clinics in the McInnis Room this year, one in November and the second in February. The attendance for each of the two days of the February clinic was 259 donors. The two-day total included 61 first-time male donors, 60 first-time female donors and 323 repeat donors for a total of 444 pints of blood obtained. All in all, the Red Cross was pleased with the efforts of the participants from Dalhousie.





On Wednesday, September 30th, 1987, the Dalhousie Student Union presented Al Goldstein and Susan Cole in "The Great Pornography Debate." Al Goldstein, owner of **Screw Magazine**, argued that those opposed to pornography are simply "people against pleasure," citing the culprit to be "freedom of choice, not men exploiting women." Susan Cole, acclaimed feminist and founder of the women's magazine, **Broadside**, returned Mr. Goldstein's fire, a pro-censorship accusation, stating, "... 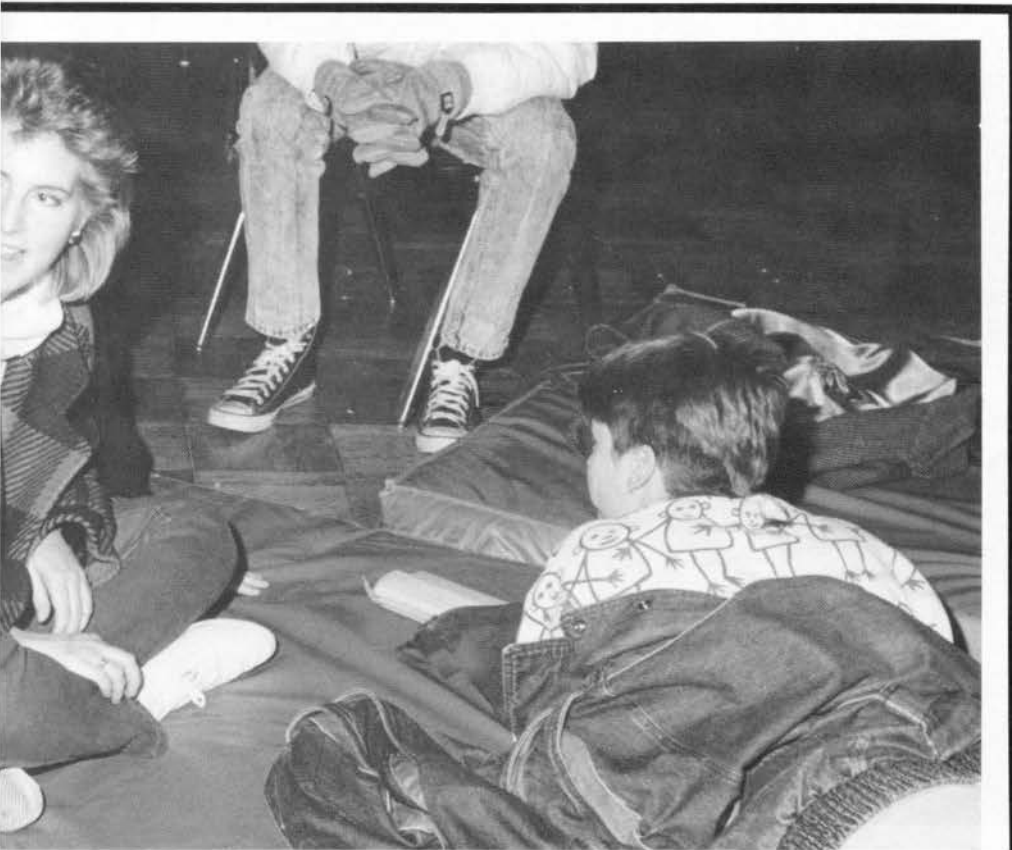


Halloween's Rocky Horror

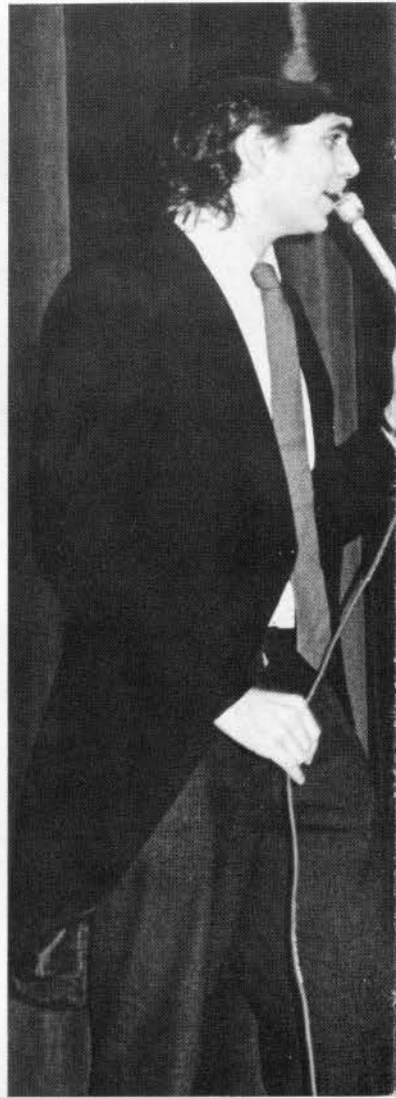
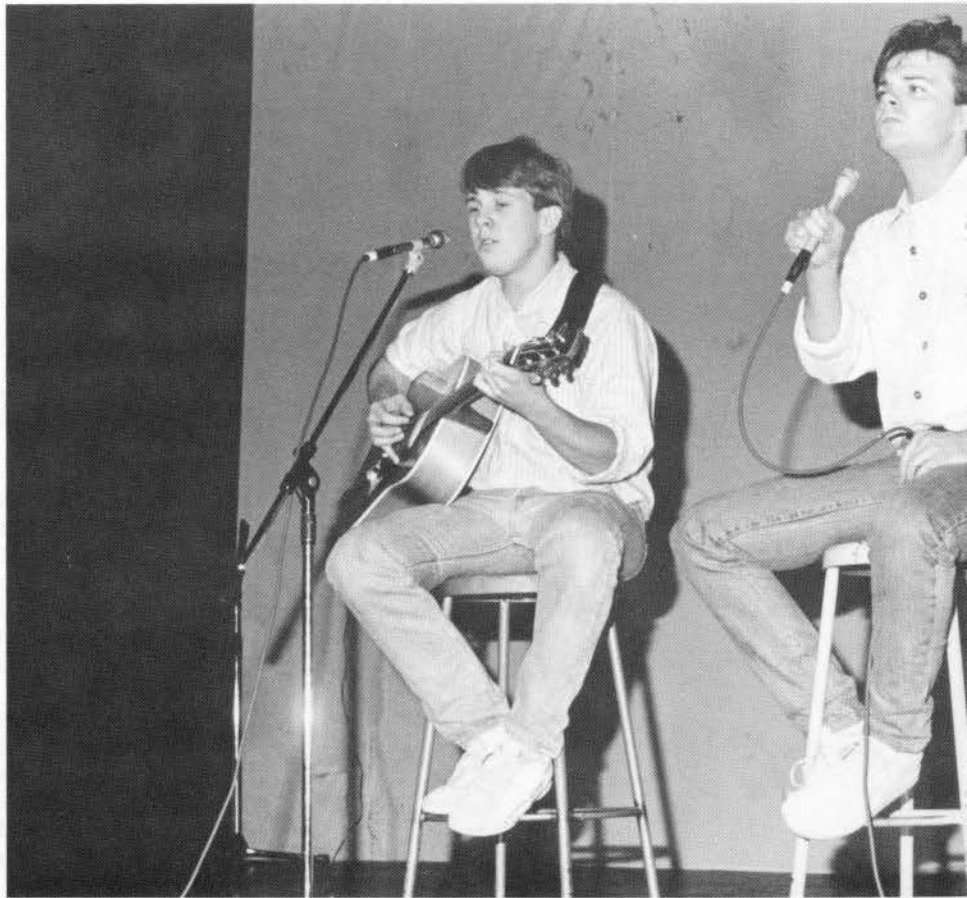
BLIZZARD BONANZA

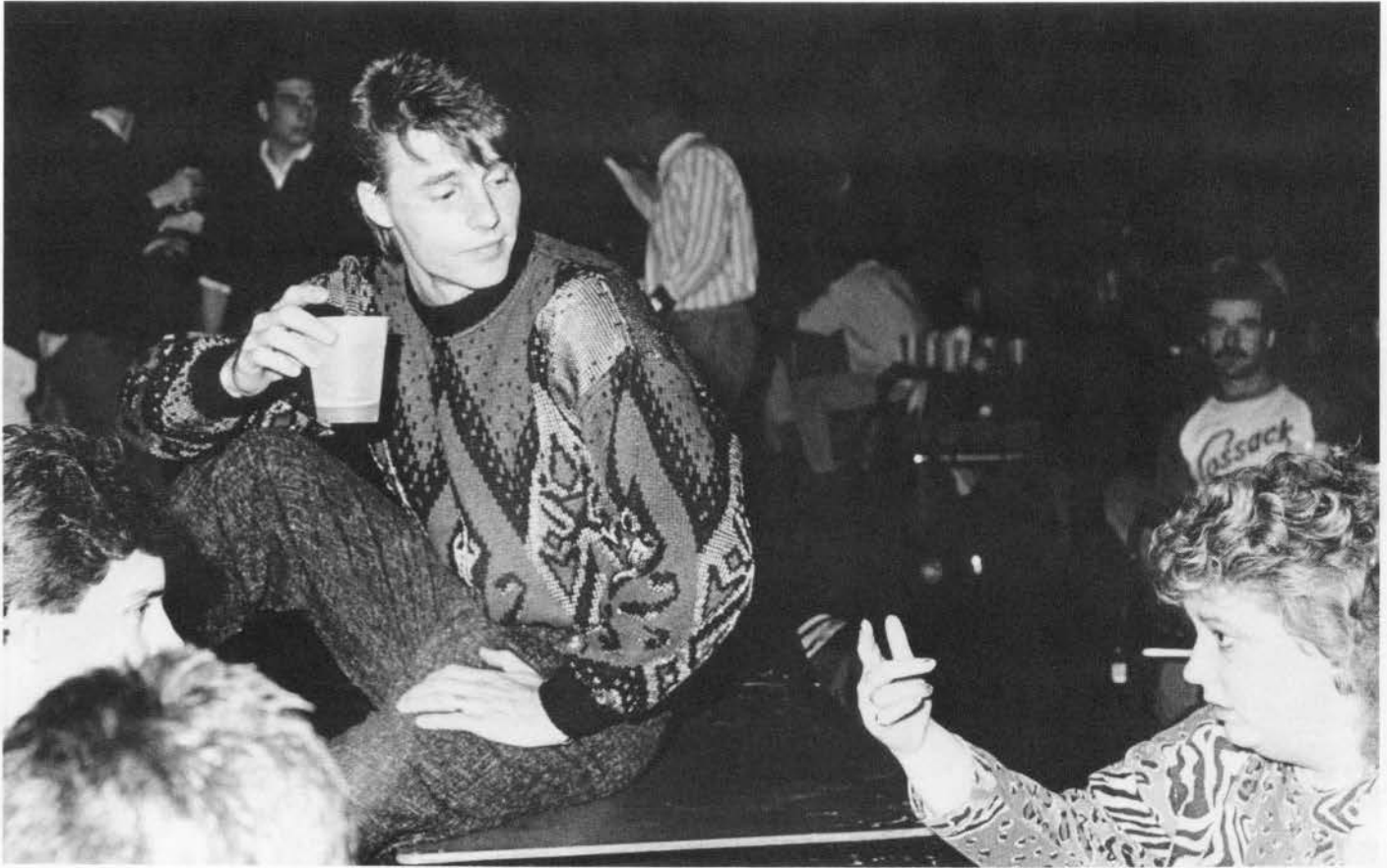

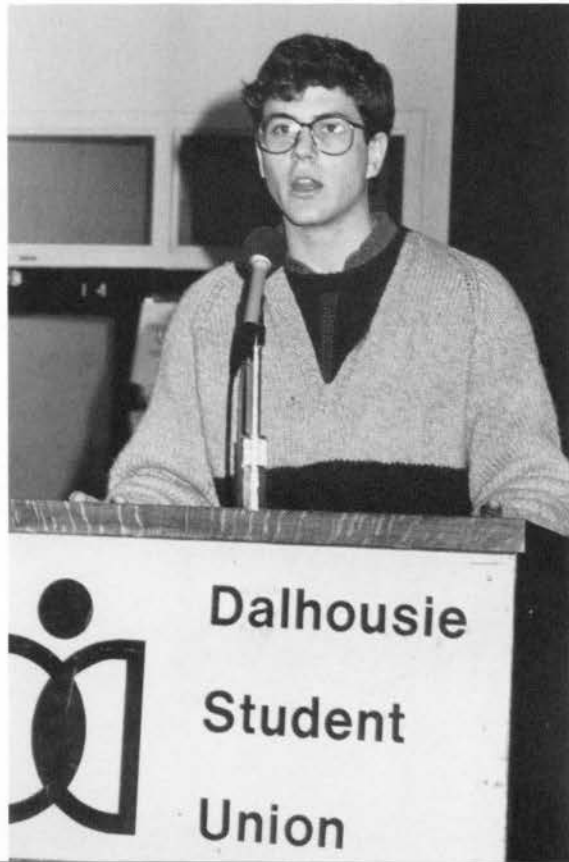
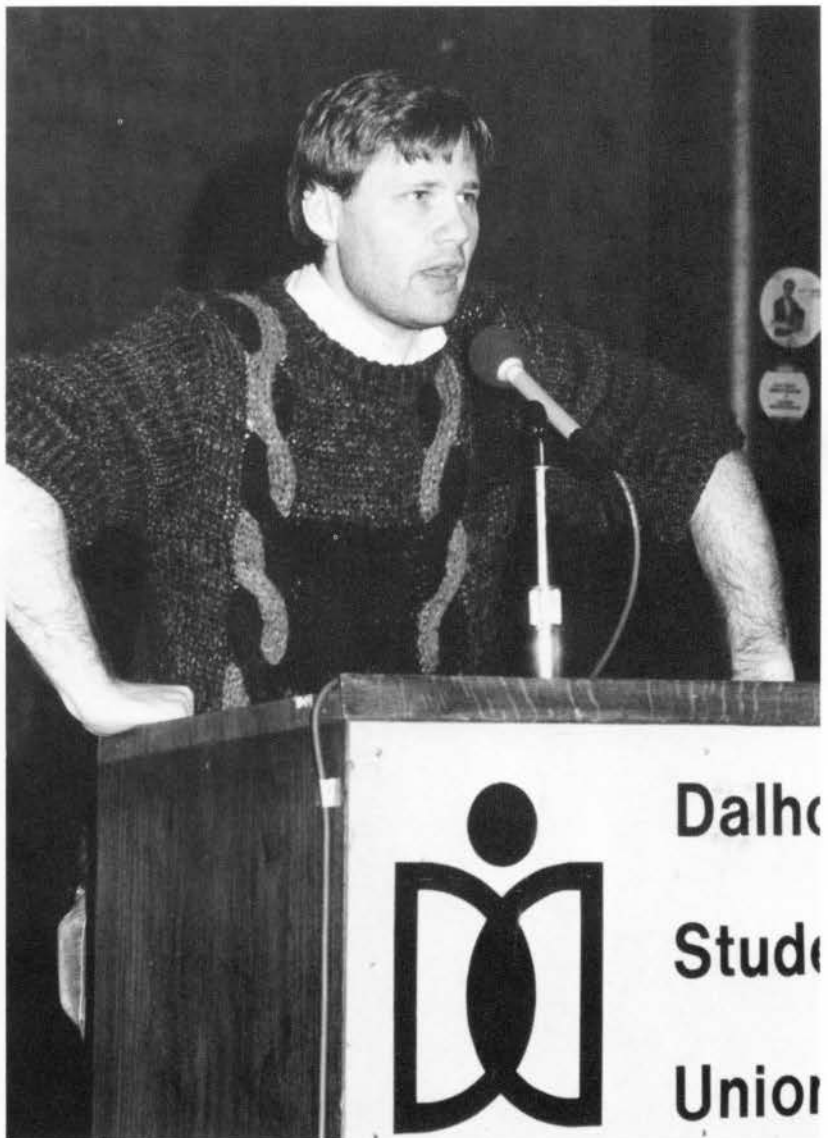
Student Council

Dalhousie students benefitted from their efforts, enjoying a greater variety of activities and the guarantee that student concerns were being voiced.

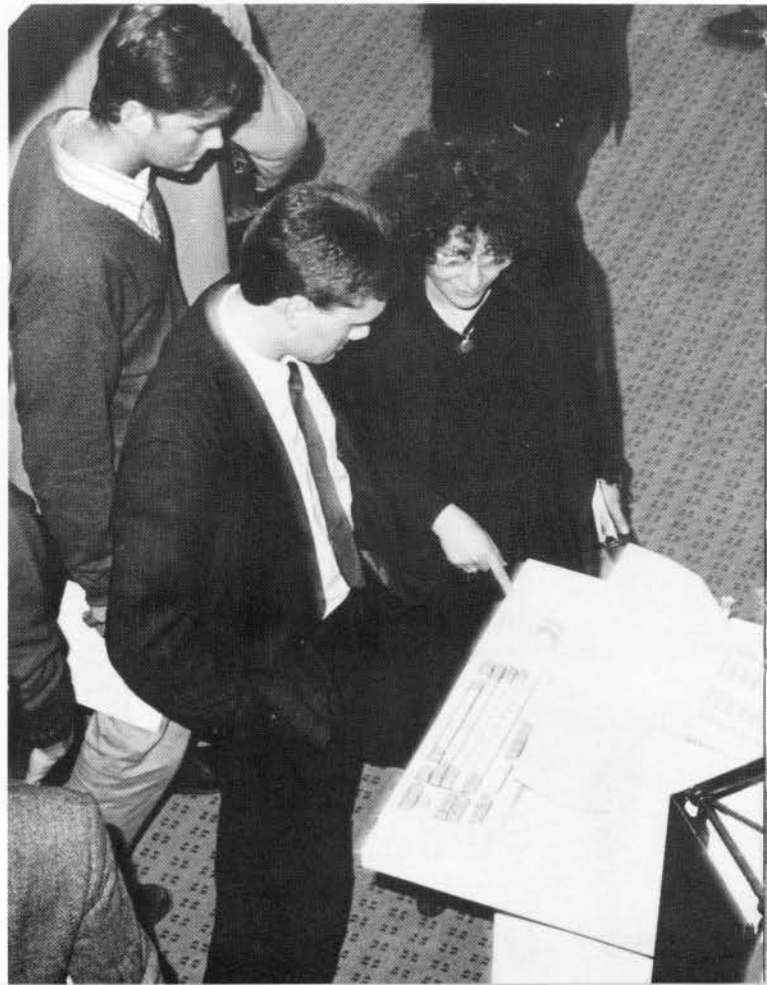


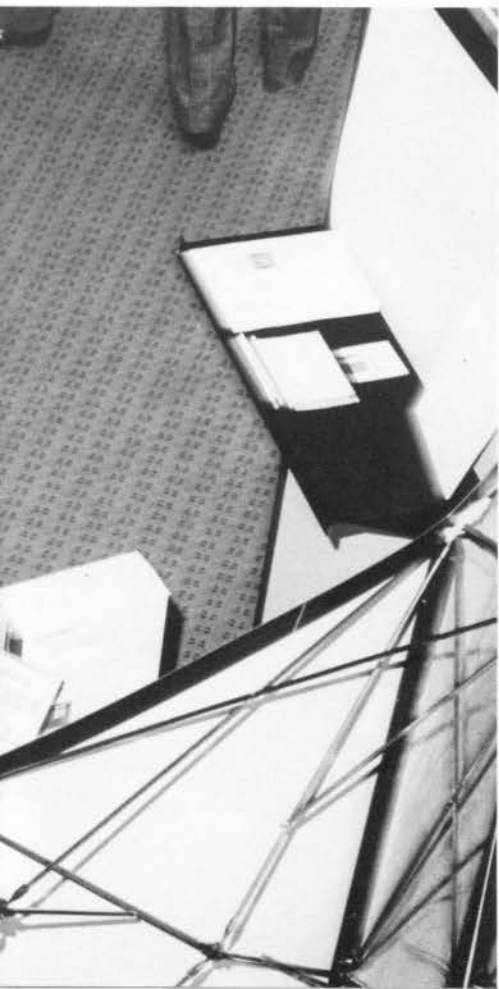


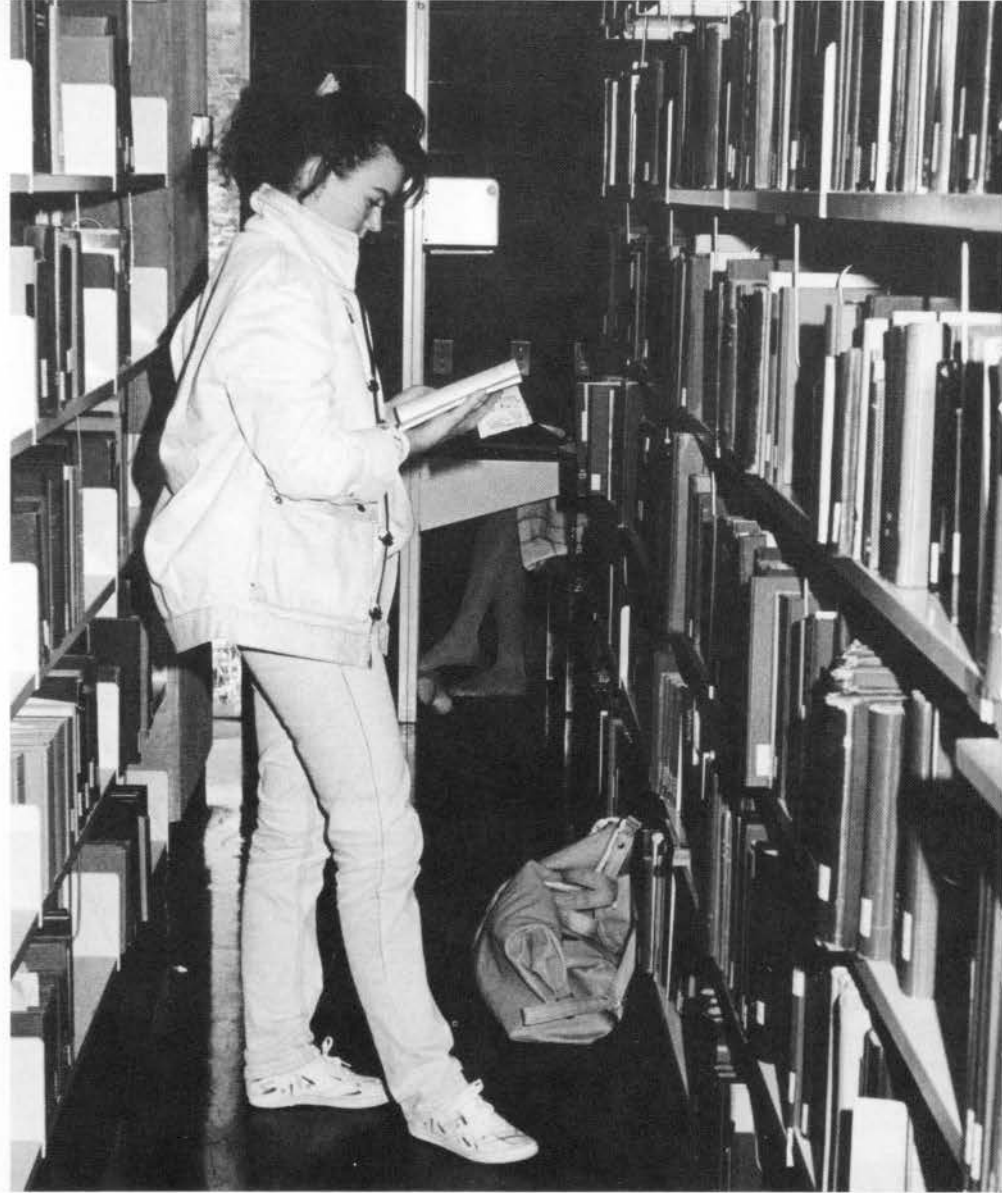

All those involved came away with a clearer view of the direction Dalhousie should pursue as well as some fond memories of the "Purple Paint and Green Jell-O Show."

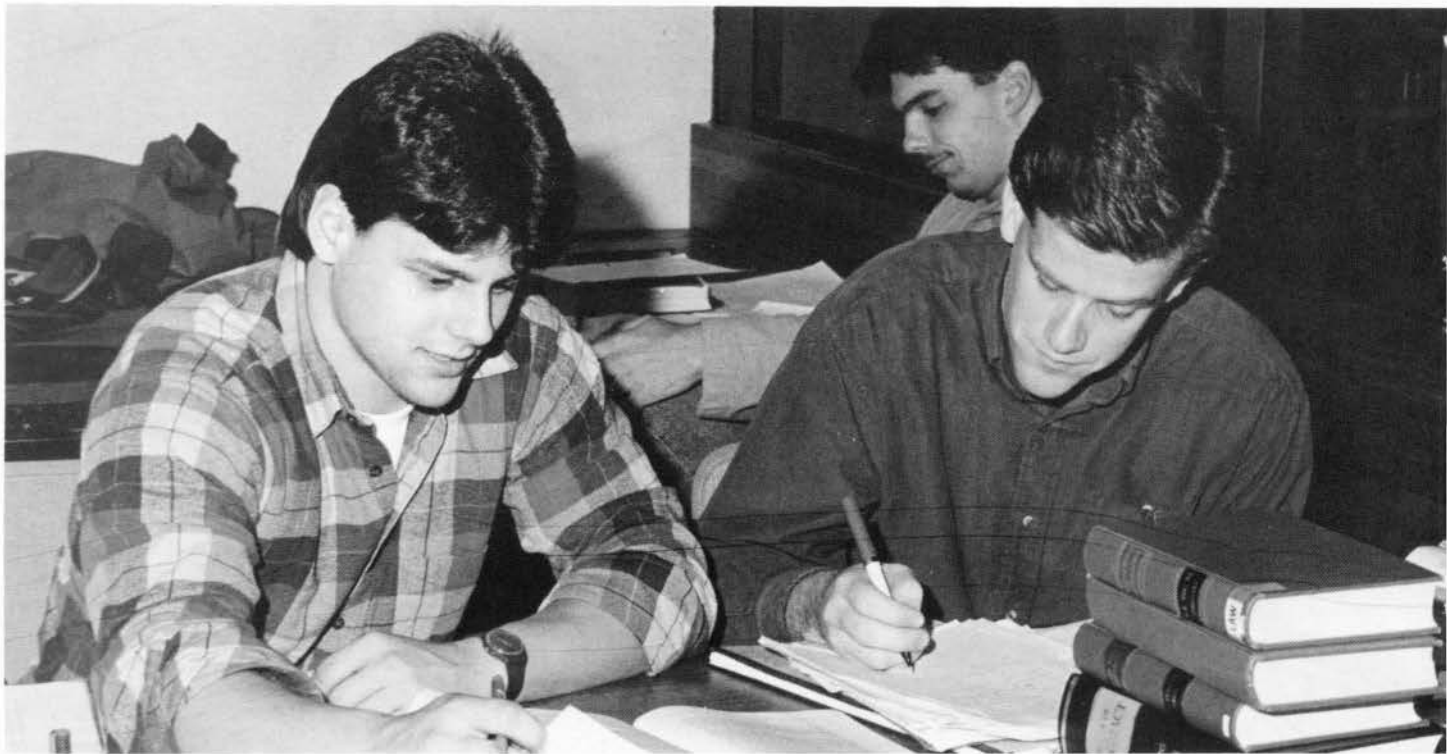

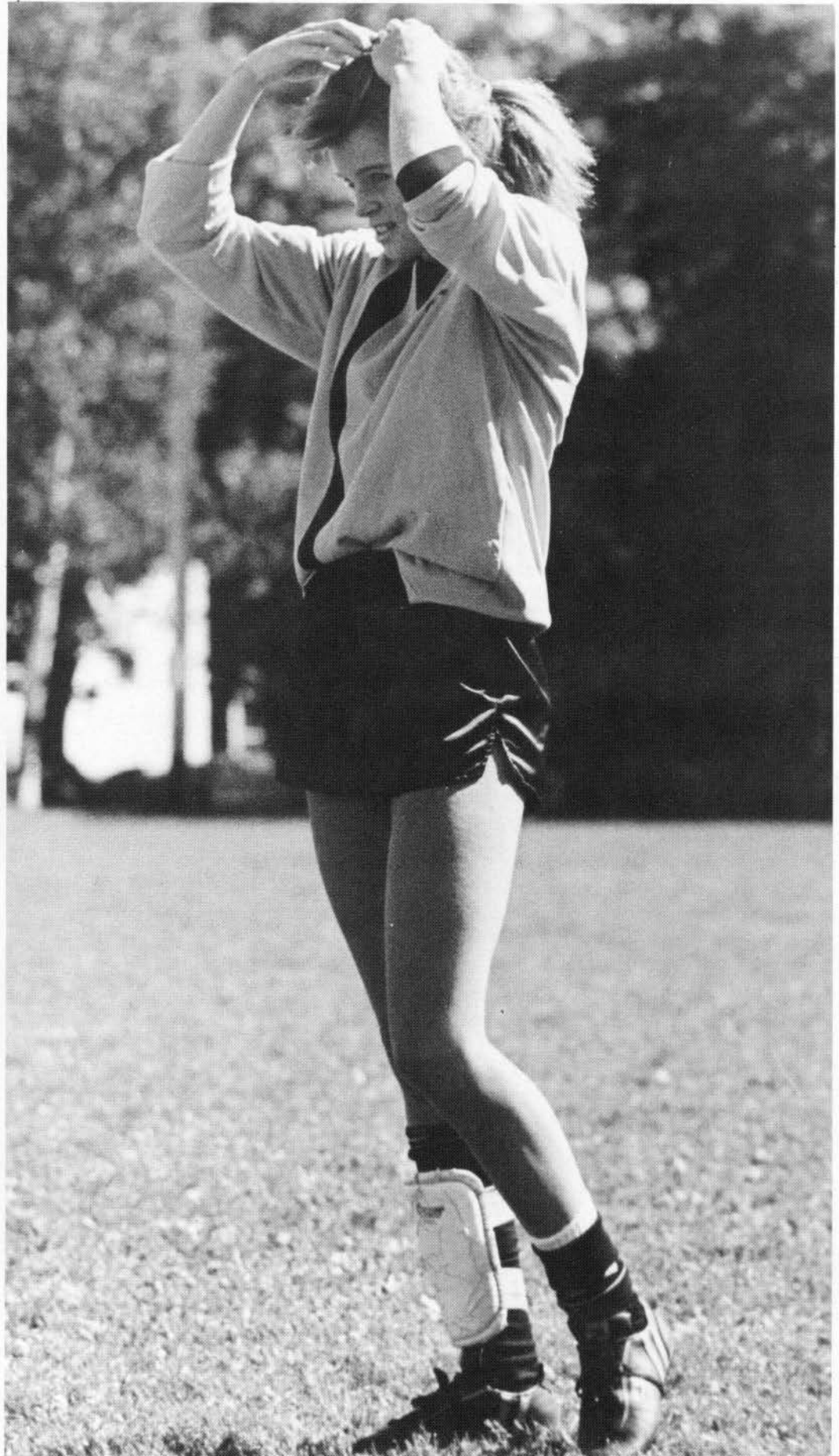
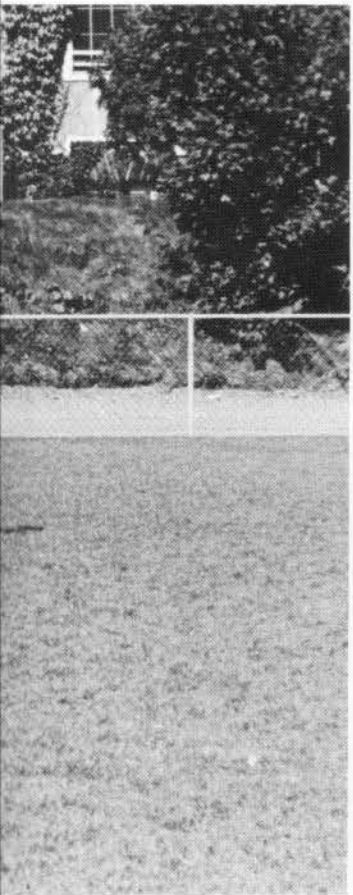
Women's Soccer

Men's Soccer



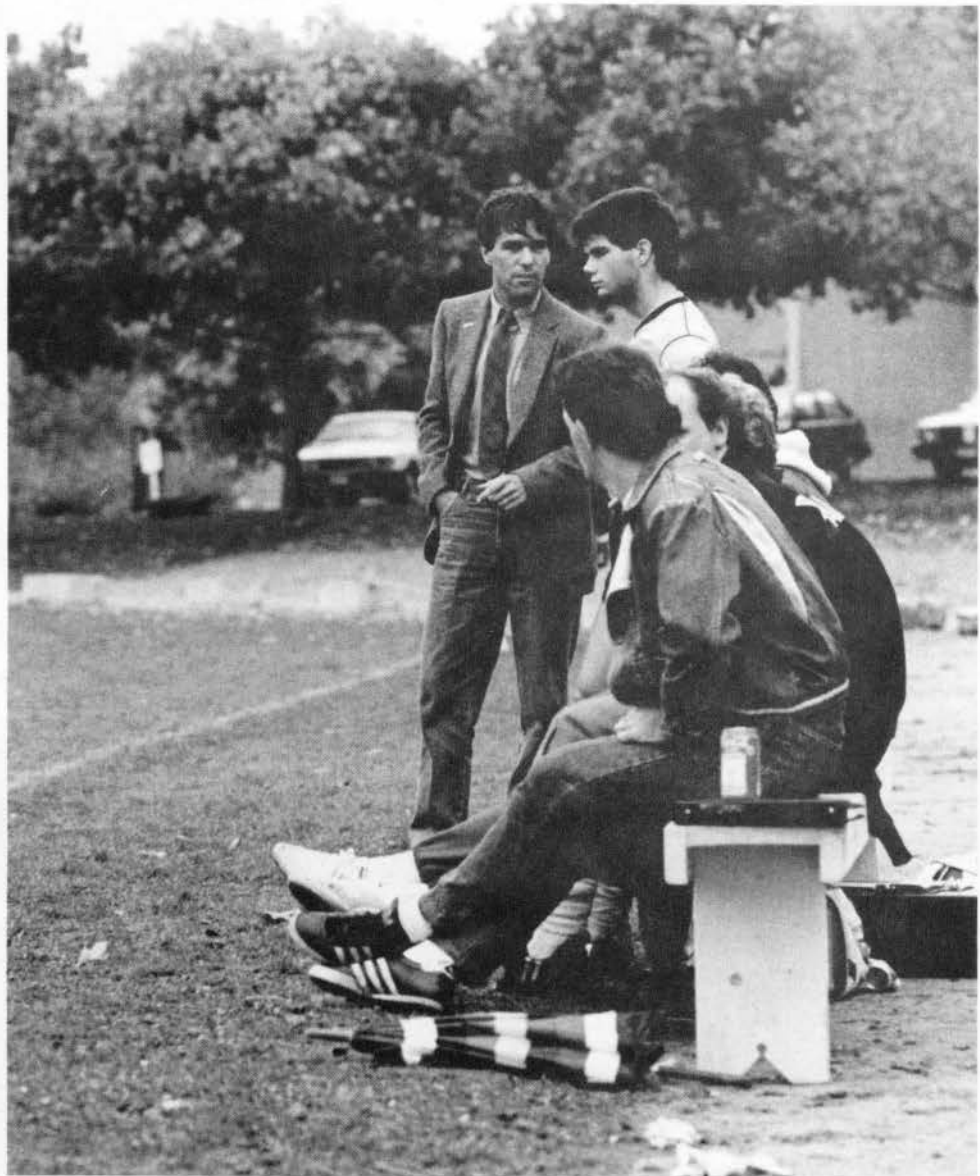
Injuries plagued the Tigers this year as the absence of two key players resulted in the loss of several important games at the beginning of the season.

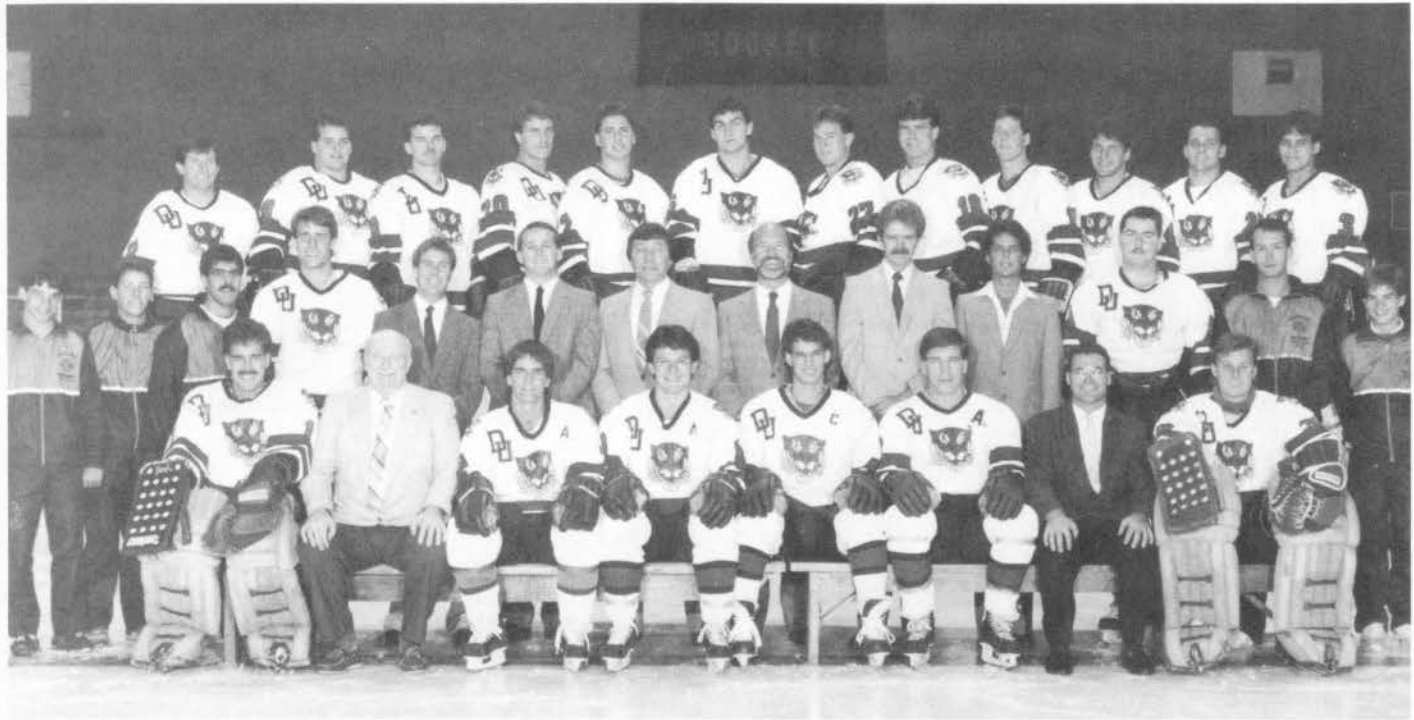


Hockey

With a 7-9 record, Dal ended up third in the very competitive Kelly Division, U.P.E.I. taking the AUSA title home to the Island.

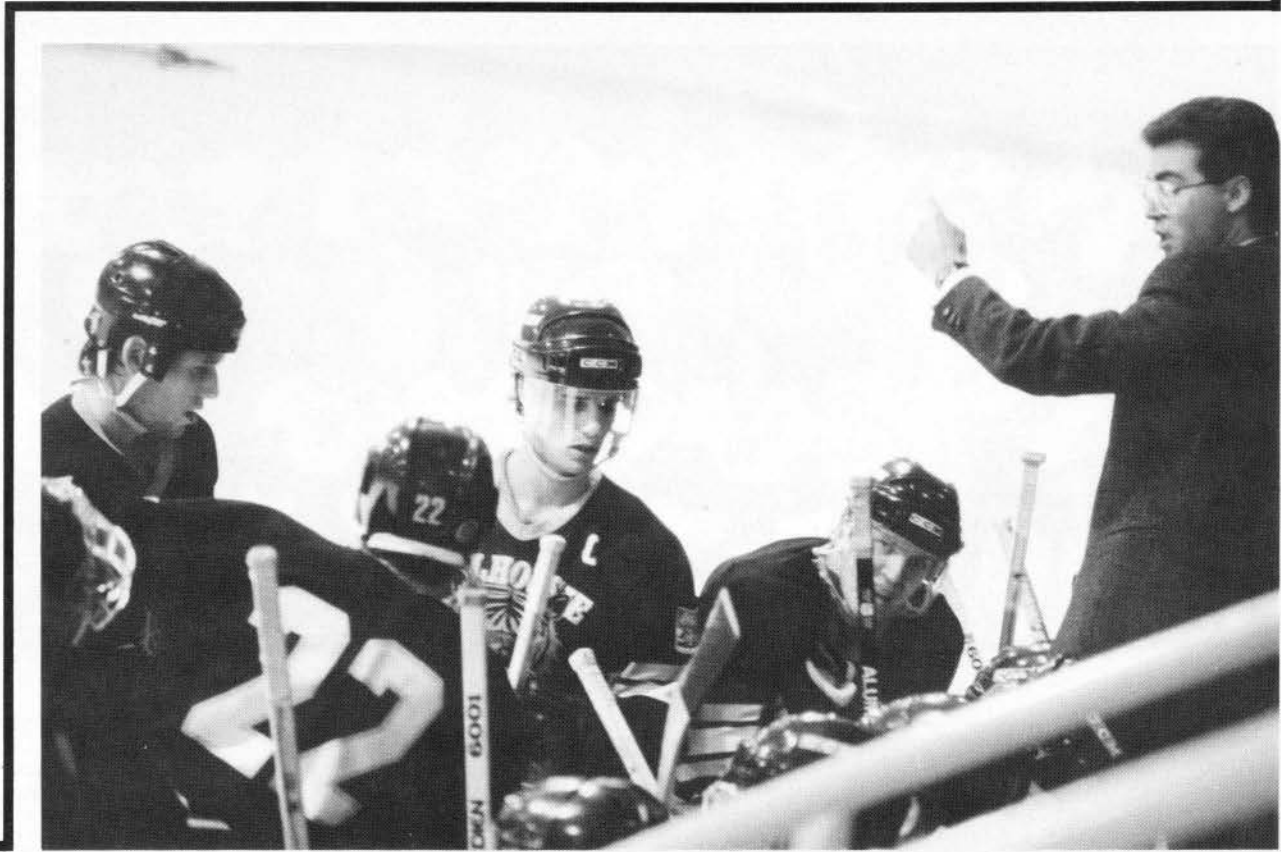

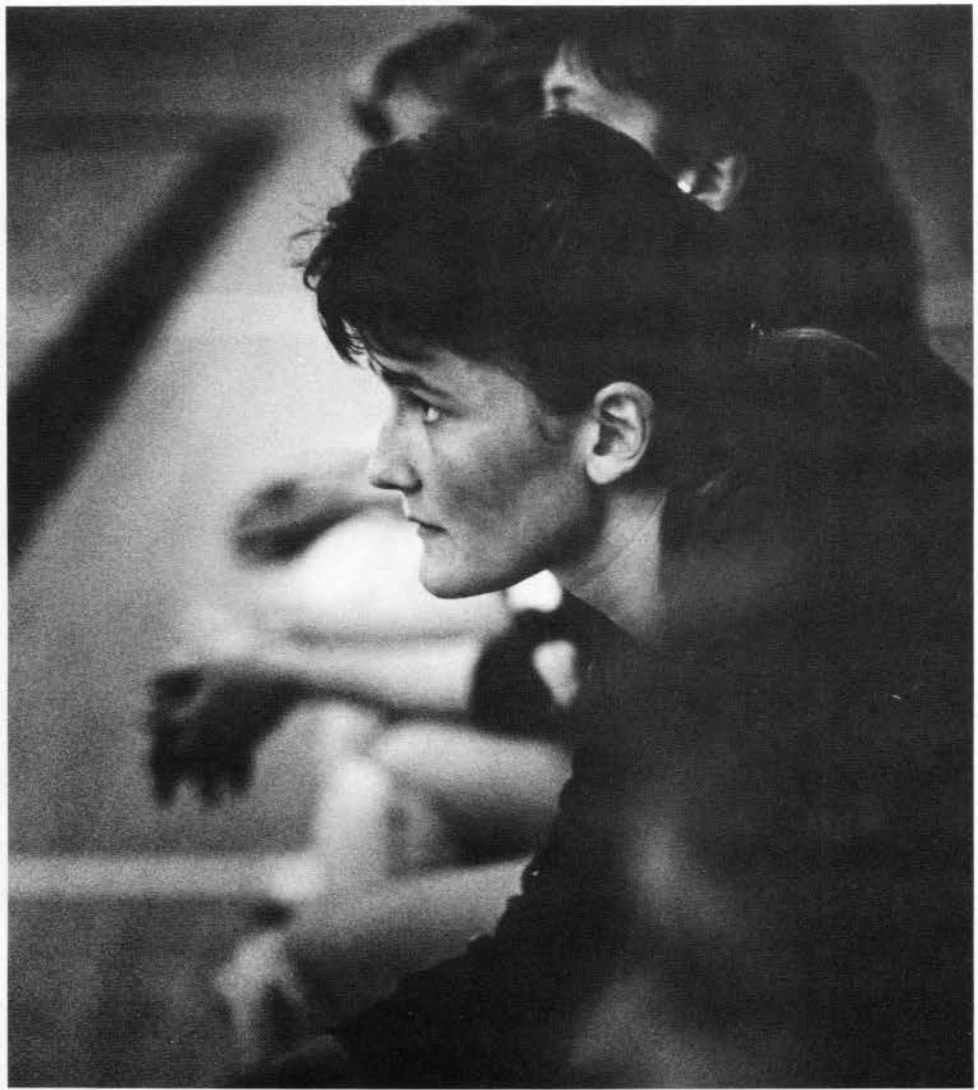




Despite competing in a tougher league this season, the female Tigers rallied to a 13-1 record in regular season play, capturing the AUAA title.
