





Synopsis: "Mediterranean Project"

I am happy to tell you that I have now received all comments from members of my Editorial Board concerning your synopsis. I enclose these comments and, as you will see, these are favourable. Provided you can follow their suggestions, I would now like you to go ahead and prepare the manuscript of the article.

I enclose Notes for Contributors and I am sure you will bear in mind what I have said in them. With regard to references, I shall be perfectly happy for you to write out the name of the journal you quote in full as this may be of advantage to many readers who are not conversant with the special abbreviations in your own field.

The most important aspect in preparing the manuscript is to bear in mind the level of audience to which you address your article. The best guidance is to imagine that you are addressing the assembled Editorial Board! Naturally, they will not be experts in your subject although they are in each case very eminent scientists in their own field. You must therefore keep your language simple yet you can assume a very high level of understanding in the general field of science and technology. If you want to use any specialised expression, you must explain it fully the first time you mention it.

When planning your manuscript, please explain in the first two or three pages the specific interdisciplinary aspect of your subject, drawing attention to any novel, controversial or unusual aspects of your article. Only then come to the methodology, research results or historical background on which you base your conclusions. In fact, start with your conclusions and develop the basis on which they are founded afterwards!



Synopsis: "Mediterranean Project" by Prof. Elizabeth Mann-Borgese, International Ocean Institute, Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada.

Comments by Members of Editorial Board

1. "I am not certain how interdisciplinary the projected analysis will be, but the case per se is certainly of interest from several disciplinary perspectives. The synopsis promises an interesting account, and I certainly think the author should prepare her manuscript."
2. "The synopsis indicates a very worthwhile essay, and I recommend requesting the manuscript. I would be much interested in having the Mediterranean Centre examine the proposal (ten years ago) by Professor Joseph Debonne of the University of Ottawa for the transport - across the Mediterranean to Algeria - of Rhone River water, to double the arable land of North Africa! Also, this Centre may be a good way to launch the use of the airship as a major logistical tool in Africa, as recommended in a major Delphi poll of African scientists!"
3. "The paper could be a first-class contribution to Interdisciplinary Science Reviews. On the other hand, the synopsis creates some disquiet - the third paragraph notes that the third world is completely excluded from international cooperation, that the R&D gap between North and South is widening. These are interesting points, but are they correct? If they are mainstays and argument, then a little data should be thrown in support of those contentions. In talking in cases, Dr Borgese is in fact talking about two proposals. The problem in talking about proposals is to constrain the arm-waving, the advocacy, and the unbounded celebration of the potential outcomes, and to tie oneself down to the reality of what could be done and who could do it. Ideology comes in in terms of her enthusiasm for joint developments in the framework for the application of the principal of the Common Heritage of Mankind. The implication in her remarks, that the future technology would not be owned in any private sense but developed jointly internationally and for peaceful purposes, throws a tremendous amount of baggage into the argument. There is strong evidence that with notable, but notably few, exceptions, the best technologies have been developed in a free market, competitive, reward-for-accomplishment environment. What justified her contradictory thesis?"

"The principal problem Dr Borgese faces in putting forward a solis paper will be to overcome advocacy and implicit ideology and nail herself down to what could be done, who could do it, with what incentives, what payoff, what sponsorship, with what management, and what follow through, plus a look at the likely and possible side effects. There is some research on international cooperation. Gene Skolnikoff of MIT years ago showed that international cooperation in technology occurred with great enthusiasm when that cooperation was absolutely essential to the operation of the technology - spectrum allocation being the premier example. But as one moved away from that condition in which cooperation was essential to operation, one found more and more political conflict, cross-currents, and befuddlement. I hope these kind of points will be considered by Dr Borgese."

NOTES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

INTERDISCIPLINARY SCIENCE REVIEWS publishes significant contributions in the pure, applied, social and economic sciences. Surveys of new knowledge on the borderline of two or more disciplines are encouraged, and authors are asked to discuss significant problems awaiting solution.

Submission of Manuscripts

Papers should be between 5,000 and 8,000 words; prospective authors are asked to consult the Editor. Manuscripts may be accepted in English or another language but will be published in English. Prospective authors should submit a 500-word synopsis, which the Editor will submit to referees.

Contributors are asked to bear in mind that papers should be understandable to those who are not specialists in the contributors' field.

The Editor will commission reviews on the basis of the synopsis, in English, subject to final approval of the manuscript.

Copyright

All contributors must explicitly transfer copyright to the publisher. Contributors whose synopses have been accepted will be sent a form for this purpose.

Manuscripts

These should be typed on one side only of approximately A4 paper (28 × 20 cm, 11 × 8 inches) using double-line spacing. Margins of 4 cm should be allowed above, below and to the left of the text. Headings and sub-headings should be used.

Three copies of the manuscript should be submitted to the Editor at the editorial office. The first page of the manuscript should indicate the name(s) of the author(s) and affiliation. The name of the author to whom proofs and enquiries may be directed should be clearly indicated.

Permission

If excerpts or illustrations from previously published works are included, the author will obtain written permission from the copyright owners and show credit to the sources in the manuscript. Copies of letters of permission should be sent along with the manuscript.

Biography

Brief biographical details (not more than 100 words) of each author should be provided, together with a small photograph.

Order of Authors

The editorial policy of ISR is to place the name of the senior author of an article before those of his or her collaborators.

Abstract

An abstract of not more than 250 words should be supplied. It should define the scope and content of the article.

Nomenclature

Authors should observe international standards of nomenclature. If at all possible, nomenclature rules given by the appropriate International Commission should be followed.

Units

The use of SI units is mandatory – the old Imperial Units are permissible only in their historical context. Any non-SI unit should be defined in terms of the equivalent SI unit the first time it is used.

PLEASE TURN OVER

Abbreviations

Apart from certain standard abbreviations which are accepted throughout the scientific community (for example, kg, m, s) the full name must be given when an abbreviation is first used in the text.

Illustrations

Illustrations should be supplied on tracing cloth, paper or white board, separately from the text. They should be numbered consecutively with arabic numerals. Each illustration should bear the name of the senior author. Half-tone illustrations should be supplied as glossy prints, of minimum size approximately 15 cm × 10 cm, also carrying the name of the senior author. The precise position of all illustrations must be clearly indicated in the manuscript.

Legends for illustrations should be intelligible without reference to the text and should be provided on a separate sheet, double-spaced. The originals and two sets of copies should accompany the typescript.

Tables

Tables should be typed in double-line spacing and should be intelligible without reference to the text. Tables should be provided on separate sheets.

Acknowledgements

These should be placed at the end of the text, preceding Literature Cited.

Literature Cited

References should be denoted in the text by superior numbers in sequence and should be listed at the end of the contribution. Footnotes will not be published. Explanatory material that cannot reasonably be included in the text should be listed in the same manner as references. It should be borne in mind that because ISR is interdisciplinary, the reader may not be familiar with the literature of a particular subject, so it should be made clear whether a reference is to a book or a journal; if a journal, the title of individual papers must be given in full; if a book, the publisher and city of publication should be shown.
