I send books there as I can. I wanted a Christmas box for a queer old fellow who reads ANYTHING. I sometimes give him my Atlantic Monthly, sometimes a child's book, All the same he reads them all. So with somemisgivings with parting I sent him your book. He read it three times before passing it on.
