PROPOSAL FOR "BLACK WIMMIN: WHEN AND WHERE I ENTER"

"Black Wimmin: When and Where I Enter" is a project of DAWA (Diasporic meaning African and Afro Canadian wimmin in the arts).

The curators of the exhibition are Grace Channer and Buseje Bailey, both practising artists and members of DAWA.

The exhibition itself will be a diverse visual expose of Black wimyns creative artistic talents consisting of a series of creative commissioned spaces approximately 10 areas ranging from 20 x 5 feet to 5 x 5 x 5 feet. The works will articulate Black wimmins specific creative energy and ideas and document a body of Black wimmins imagery historically never seen in such a context as an exhibition before.

The spaces refered to here will be areas within the framework of the whole exhibition space. They will include hard and soft murals, sculptures, painted printed, dyed, writings, sound, video with the main focus being on visual art expression. The work will not merely be hung on the walls but composed into sections of space so that an understanding of how Black wimmins creativity functions in everyday life is more apparent to the public audience. Each artist in the show will design and build the structures for their own sections.

Interspersed among the sections as part of the works in some places will be the writings of contemporary Afro Canadian Wimmin writers and poets, the music and voice of Afro Canadian wimmin musicians and video tapings of dancers and Afro Canadian wimmin in theatre.

This format creates the awareness of how art functions in a context outside of the perimeters of official white male dominated art concepts.

Being the first of its kind in Canada this touring exhibition of Afro Canadian

artists will expose to many people the various cultures of the Canadian Black population, their contributions and their creations toward the cultural mosaic of Canada.

To date the exhibition will travel to Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia. Shows have been confirmed in Halifax and Toronto and timetabling the travelling is still under way. The first show has been confirmed for September 1988.

The full travelling time for the exhibition is at present September 1988 to
1989 with shows ranging from two to four weeks. Because the show is travelling
we ask the accepting galleries to let as know as soon as possible your available
times for the show in order that we may effectively timetable the exhibition.

black Wimmin: When and Where We Enter is a touring exhibition of artworks commissioned from ten Black canadian Women artists. The body of work addresses the theme of Black women's experience in Canada. Conceived by Diasporic African Women's Art (DAWA), the exhibition will tour Canada from February 1989 to October 1989 as part of a project to develop an environment in which Black artists can exhibit their work. The marginality of experiences of black women in Canada has served to keep their culture unrepresented in the mainstream arts community. This lack of representation has however added power to their visions. DAWA provides Black women with a context in which to realize and express this vision.

This exhibition challenges the eurocentric concept of art which often separates creative expression from other areas of life. Instead, <u>Black Women When and Where We Enter</u> offers a view based on the lives of Black women, where art, community, politics, work, spirituality and emotion are presented as a whole entity. Traditionally, Black art is not separate from craft nor pleasure from necessity. This exhibition is an attempt to celebrate the conectedness of all things in the lives of these artists.

The curatorial aims and objectives are:

- -to contribute to and stimulate discourse related to the nature of contemporary Black art.
- -to address the aesthetic, critical and social concerns of Black artists in Canada.
- -to create a forum in which the public can address the artists and in which the artist may interact with the public on issues relating to art and society.
- -to encourage Black women artists to create a body of original work documenting their experiences in Canada.
- -to present these works in a context relevant to their creation.
- -to provide additional visual and audual documentation to accompany the tour.

This exhibition describes two historical perspectives..that of being Black in Canada and that of being a woman. It is the first Canadian exhibition composed entirely of Black women's imagery. The curators are Grace Channer and Buseje Bailey; both are artists and members of DAWA. Participating include Khadeja, Dzian Lacharite, Buseje Bailey, Winsom, Suli Williams, Foluke, Claire Carew, Kim McNeilly and Marie-Avrile Jordon. These artists were chosen by the following criteria: 1) First and foremost they are known for their commitment to the development of their skills, and the output of cultural images. 2) These artists demonstrate an interest in developing a Black aesthetic in terms of women's experience. 3) The artists represent Black women's experiences from several cities across Canada.

Its sponsorship of "BLACK WIMMIN: WHEN AND WHERE WE ENTER" will provide the first exhibition which is exclusively on Black wimmins art in Canada.

The exhibition, touring Canada throughout 1989, opened first at A Space and then travels to Ottawa, Vancouver, Montreal, and Halifax. In conjunction with the exhibition, workshops have been planned, pending funding. A brief outline of these workshops:

HANDS ON -

A hands-on workshop about the Diasporic African sensibility focusing on children ages kindergarten to grade 8. Included will be percussional instrument making, clay masks, and interiors.

WEST AFRICAN TEXTILES -

An adult workshop including some demonstrations about west African dying techniques. Also a workshop for kids to work with dying textiles.
