MAJOR CHANGES IN BY-LAWS APPROVED AT ANNUAL MEETING



"I now ask you, Mr. President, in the name of the Senate, to confer on John George Diefenbaker the degree of Doctor of Laws, honoris causa."

DALHOUSIE CONVOCATION '61

The Rt. Hon. John Diefenbaker, Prime Minister of Canada was one of six prominent Canadians honored by Dalhousie on Convocation Day, May 18th.

During the morning Convocation, honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws were conferred upon Miss Jessie MacKnight, Director of Dispensing and Assistant to the Dean of the Maritime College of Pharmacy, and Dr. A. W. Trueman, Director of the Canada Council, former Chairman of the National Film Board, and former President of the University of Manitoba and the University of New Brunswick.

Dr. Trueman, one of the outstanding Canadian educators of our time, delivered an inspiring address to the graduates of the morning session.

During the afternoon Convocation, honorary degrees were conferred upon Prime Minister Diefenbaker, Dr. H. B.

Atlee, Professor Emeritus of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at Dalhousie, Dr. Norman H. Gosse, former Associate Professor of Surgery at Dalhousie, and W. H. Howard, prominent Montreal barrister, industrialist and financier.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker, who had just bid goodbye to President Kennedy in Ottawa before flying to Halifax, delivered the address to Convocation during the afternoon session.

University President, Dr. A. E. Kerr, in the name of the Senate, conferred degrees and diplomas on 372 students.

During the morning Convocation the following degrees and diplomas (with the number conferred shown in brackets) were awarded:

B.S. (69), B.Sc. (39), B.Com. (25), M.A. (11), M.Sc. (11), Diploma in Clinical

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The most extensive amendments to the By-Laws since the Dalhousie Alumni Association was incorporated in 1876 were passed at the annual meeting on May 15th.

The By-Law changes, which were recommended by the Alumni Executive, are a prelude to a major revision in the fund raising programme of the Association. Although the present dues system is not likely to be changed before the next University Campaign, the revised By-Laws empower the Executive to adopt their new programme at the appropriate time.

Aaron Zive, Halifax barrister and businessman, was elected President of the Association at the meeting which was held in Shirreff Hall.

As in other years, members of the graduating class were guests of the Association at a buffet supper prior to the business meeting. Also present were several members of the Class of '11 who had returned to Dalhousie during Convocation Week to celebrate the 50th anniversary of their graduation.

Alumni President, Arthur J. Meagher, Q.C., opened the meeting by congratulating the Class of '61 and welcoming them to membership in the Association. Peter Green, Life President of the Class thanked Professor Meagher and introduced his fellow life officers to the meeting.

Dr. C. L. Gass, Class of '11, read the names of his classmates who would be on hand for the 50th anniversary reunion and introduced those members of the class who were present.

Following the adoption of the minutes of the 1960 meeting, Mrs. D. K. Murray, First Vice-President, reported on the work of the Women's Division. She reported that over \$750 had been realized at the Fall Tea and Sale. Part of the money would be used for a scholarship this year and the balance would be placed in the newly established Alumnae Scholarship Fund. Mrs. Murray also said that a successful Freshman Party was held in January and an Alumnae Coffee Party in February.

Director of Alumni Affairs, Bruce Irwin, reported that new branches in Queens-

**NEW COURSES TO BE
 OFFERED AT DALHOUSIE**

Starting in October, Dalhousie will have a School of Dental Hygiene which will form part of the Faculty of Dentistry. In making the announcement, Dr. Kerr also announced the appointment of Mrs. Janet Louise Burnham as Director of the new school.

Mrs. Burnham is a graduate Dental Hygienist of the University of Minnesota and holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Iowa.

The new school, second in Canada, will train young women for careers as public health educators and oral prophylacticians. Regular university entrance qualifications will be required.

A three-year correspondence course leading to a certificate will also be offered to assessors in Nova Scotia this fall. Organization of this course, with active co-operation of the Department of Municipal Affairs, has been completed by the University's Institute of Public Affairs.

The course, one of three available in Canada, will be completely new and adapted to Nova Scotia conditions. Besides dealing with valuation and assessment, it will give assessors general knowledge about the historical and general background of municipal government, an introduction to municipal law, the assessor's place in local government, legal aspects of assessment, local government finance, and a review of assessment practice in Canada.

**DALHOUSIE DEFICIT
 FORECAST**

Beginning next year, Dalhousie University will commit itself to spending substantially in excess of foreseeable income, Dr. A. E. Kerr told members of the graduating class in his address to Convocation.

Dr. Kerr spoke of the development and growth of the University since it was founded and expressed the hope that the growth would continue. He said that the decision to budget expenditures beyond revenue was made so that the essential work of the University would not be hampered. He also said that increased efforts will have to be made to find the extra money that will be required in the immediate future.

In the past year two major buildings have been opened on the campus the President said. The first to be opened was the Sir James Dunn Science Building and the second was the new residence for men.

Dr. Kerr also welcomed members of the Class of '11 who were celebrating the 50th anniversary of their graduation and said that it was impossible not to wonder what changes will take place before some of the Class of '61 return to Dalhousie to celebrate their Golden Jubilee.

MEET OUR NEW PRESIDENT



AARON ZIVE

On May 15th, Aaron Zive became President of the Dalhousie Alumni Association, succeeding Prof. Arthur J. Meagher, Q.C., who retired after serving two full terms in office.

Our new President was born in Halifax and attended Halifax County Academy. He graduated from Dalhousie with a B.Sc. in 1929 and an LL.B. in 1933. Following graduation he practiced law in Halifax until 1941 when he joined the R.C.A.F. and served as Flight Lieutenant in the Judge Advocates Branch until the end of the war.

In 1945 he joined the Legal Branch of War Assets Corporation in Montreal and remained there until 1948 when he returned to Halifax. He is presently in private practice and is Secretary-Treasurer of S. P. Zive and Son, Ltd.

Mr. Zive has been extremely active in community work and has been President or Director of such organizations as the Canadian Jewish Congress, the Canadian Cancer Society, the Canadian Mental Health Association, the Halifax-Dartmouth United Appeal, B'Nai B'Rith, and the St. John's Ambulance Corp.

Mr. Zive is also a member of the Halifax Branch of the United Nations Organization, the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society, the Halifax Board of Trade and the Board of Education of Beth Israel Synagogue.

He was elected to the Executive of the Dalhousie Alumni Association in 1956 and became Second Vice-President in 1959. Mr. Zive is married and has two sons and a daughter.

Shelburne, Montreal and Saint John had been established during the year and that the branches in Ottawa, Great Britain, Kings-Hants, Truro, New York and Toronto had also been active.

He also reported on the successful Alumni Night in the Sir James Dunn Science Building in November, the Men's Residence Open House in March, the Class of '11 Reunion, the Alumni Fund, and the Dalhousie Tutoring Service which has placed over 250 applicants for tutoring with the 75 Dalhousie students who registered with the service.

Treasurer John Moore and Associate Treasurer Verna Leonard presented their reports in written form. Copies of their reports appear elsewhere in this issue of "The News".

Dr. C. M. Bethune, President of the Medical Alumni, reported that his Association continues to expand with a membership of 500, including 98 Life Members. The Medical Alumni held a reception and dinner during the Canadian Medical Association meeting in Banff last summer and a very successful annual meeting at the Lord Nelson Hotel in November.

President Meagher, who was completing his final term in office, reported on the highlights of the year and congratulated the Executives of the Medical Alumni and the branches for their interest in promoting the welfare of the University.

He reported that the Association Executive had met monthly during the year and had discussed such projects as the Dalhousie Club, the Annual Giving Programme, the Football Fund, cultural and intellectual programmes, Freshman entertainment, the Student's Union Building and student tours of Dalhousie.

Professor Meagher thanked the Executive and the University administration for their interest in the work of the Association.

University President, Dr. A. E. Kerr, welcomed the Class of '11 and congratulated the alumni on their programme. He added that the Board of Governors is facing a great challenge today and must raise more money during the coming year than ever before. Thus the Board will need all the support the alumni can give.

The Chairman of the Board, Mr. Donald McInnes, Q.C., thanked the alumni for their interest in the welfare of Dalhousie and reported on the recent growth of the University. He said that an increase in the amount of government support will be necessary if Canadian Universities are to meet the challenge of the future. Mr. McInnes also said that Dalhousie's new School of Oceanography is going to play an important part in the economy of the region by searching out the riches of the sea.

Mrs. E. C. Harris reported on the proposed Faculty-Alumni Club. During the year the organizing committee had met with a committee from the Board of Governors and had been promised some financial assistance. Questionnaires had been sent to the Halifax alumni and a favourable response obtained. The By-Laws and Memorandum of Association of the Club had been approved at a combined meeting of the Executives of the Alumni and the Faculty Associations.

The committee has asked the Board of Governors for permission to use the name "The Dalhousie Club", but as yet the Board has not passed upon this request. Meanwhile, the committee is searching for a suitable building to begin operation of the Club.

Under the heading of "New Business", the proposed amendments to the By-Laws pertaining to the new Annual Giving Programme were passed.

Mrs. H. L. Roper then nominated Dean C. L. Bennet as Honorary President of the Association. Professor Malcolm Parks seconded the nomination and Dr. Murray Fraser moved that nominations cease.

In accepting the nomination Dean Bennet thanked the alumni for their kindness and said that he would be pleased to serve the alumni and the University in any way that he could.

Mr. C. B. Havey presented the results of the election on behalf of the scrutineers, Prof. G. F. W. Inrig and Prof. W. M. H. Charles, who were unable to be present.

Elected were: President—Aaron Zive, First Vice-President—Mrs. D. K. Murray, Second Vice-President—Carmen F. Moir, Executive Members—Rev. A. J. Farquhar, Dr. J. K. B. Purves, Reginald A. Cluney, Mrs. H. B. Ross and Mrs. H. L. Roper.

Elected to the Board of Governors for the 1961-64 term were George C. Thompson, Rev. D. M. Sinclair and Mrs. H. T. Creighton.

The meeting elected W. D. Outhit and Prof. E. C. Harris as auditors for the coming year.

The new President, Aaron Zive, took the chair and thanked the Association for his election to the office. There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

MAJOR EXPANSION IN ARTS AND SCIENCE

Dr. A. E. Kerr has announced that Dalhousie University has decided on a considerable expansion of teaching staff in the Faculty of Arts and Science. The Board of Governors has approved a proposal by the dean of this faculty, Dr. Henry D. Hicks, to add a maximum of twenty new professors, the president said.

These new appointments, together with regular increases within the faculty, will add about \$250,000 to the budget of the faculty.

Dr. Hicks said that this decision reflects the university's determination to maintain high standards of under-graduate instruction and to improve and expand the facilities for graduate study.

The Faculty of Graduate Studies last year added courses leading to Ph.D. degrees in Chemistry, Oceanography and Physics to the curriculum. This year a course leading to a master of arts degree in education was approved. The latter course will be available from Oct. 1961.

The University has shown a spectacular growth since the last war. In 1944-45 the Faculty of Arts and Science employed 31 professors, for an enrolment of 479. The total of salary payments in this faculty was \$111,800.

During the present academic year the faculty had 65 professors, an enrolment of 1,425 and a salary total of \$549,300. In September teaching staff is expected to number 85, for a total in salaries of close to \$800,000.

OUR HONORARY PRESIDENT

Our new Honorary President, Charles Lindsay Bennet, is Vice-President of Dalhousie and Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies. Having taught English to the students of Dalhousie and King's for almost 40 years, he has, in the words of Mrs. H. L. Roper who nominated him, "...given to his students a standard of integrity and enthusiasm for his subject that will be long remembered".

Dean Bennet was born in New Zealand and attended Otago University until his studies were interrupted by World War I. After the war he attended Cambridge on a New Zealand Expeditionary Force Scholarship and graduated with B.A. Honours in 1922.

He came to Dalhousie that same year as Lecturer in English and was Assistant Professor of English at King's from 1923 until 1928. From 1928 until 1930 he did post-graduate work in English at Harvard and received his M.A.

He returned to King's in 1930 and came to Dalhousie in 1931 as Professor of English and Head of the Department.

He was University Registrar from 1935 to 1945, Veteran's Adviser from 1945-50, and Secretary of the Senate from 1948-58. He was appointed Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies in 1956 and was made the first University Vice-President in 1958.

Dean Bennet is married to a Dalhousian, the former Helene Sandford, B.A. '23, and they have three children. He has edited senior high school text books in English which have been used in all provinces and recently wrote the section on the Atlantic Provinces in a book, "The Face of Canada". Since 1957 he has been Editor of "The Dalhousie Review".

Perhaps the best description of our new Honorary President was contained in Mrs. Roper's nomination when she referred to Dean Bennet as "... a New Zealander by birth, a Haligonian by adoption and a Dalhousian by preference".

**DALHOUSIE FUTURE
DISCUSSED AT FACULTY
SYMPOSIUM**

Expanding student populations, strained budgets, inadequate staffs and crowded facilities are some of the more pressing problems facing universities in the 60's. To cope with these problems effectively, educators must occasionally make an honest appraisal of their function and role in education and take a good hard look at future plans.

The Faculty Association at Dalhousie did just that on April 15. The occasion was a day-long Symposium sponsored by the Association on the present and future of the University.

Those who attended the sessions were favourably impressed with the quality of the keynote addresses and eleven papers presented on the related subjects. While not all the participants were in complete agreement with one another, their appraisals and suggestions were honest and constructive.

Before tackling the major problem, "Dalhousie and the Future", the functions of a university and its relationship to the community were considered. In each case a keynote address and several papers were presented prior to a period of open discussion during which faculty, alumni and friends of the university were able to state their views.

The first two sessions produced conclusions generally acceptable today as ideal for any educational institution. Areas of disagreement were in the main of a particular nature (example: Should all professors be required to do research?) and did not detract from the basic principles.

During the final session on the future of the University, conclusions drawn from the previous sessions were projected. Although the majority agreed that additional properly trained professors were needed, that the University should provide constant leadership in the community, and that a wider range of late-hour and evening classes should be offered, no easy solution to the problem of financing future expansion was found.

Several speakers suggested that while additional allotments of public funds would be needed, caution would have to be exercised to prevent political control at the university level.

Although no resolutions were drafted and many of the problems remain unsolved, the Symposium was a success. If just one problem of the future can be solved because of suggestions made at the meeting, then the time and effort that went into the Symposium will have been well worthwhile.

CAMPUS CLIPPINGS

Teaching Hospitals

An additional 372 teaching beds were made available to Dalhousie medical students by the signing of two recent agreements at the University.

On April 5th, the Minister of National Defence, Douglas Harkness, signed an agreement establishing the Canadian Forces Hospital at Stadacona as a teaching hospital, and on May 5th, the Halifax Infirmary signed a similar agreement with Dalhousie.

These added to the existing agreements with Victoria General, Grace Maternity, Camp Hill, Children's Hospital and the Nova Scotia Rehabilitation Centre and bring the total number of teaching beds available to the Faculty of Medicine to 1809.

Wilson Fellowships

The scholastic standards of Dalhousie's Faculty of Graduate Studies have been recognized by the Woodrow Wilson Foundation. Dalhousie is one of five Canadian universities to be so honoured; the great majority of the Wilson awards go to United States universities, especially Harvard.

The foundation awards are valued at \$1,500, with full tuition costs paid by the foundation to specific universities which, in the opinion of the organization's trustees, maintain the highest standards of scholarship.

Harry Boardmore of Mount Allison has been nominated for a Wilson Fellow-

ship for study at Dalhousie. This will entitle the Department of English at Dalhousie to a \$2,000 grant from the foundation.

Two of the six awards this year in the Atlantic Provinces went to Dalhousie graduates. They are Elisabeth Archibald, B.A. '61 and George Martell, B.A. '61, who also received Canada Council scholarships for Master's study.

Viscount Bennet Scholarship

Paul S. Creaghan, LL.B. '61, won the 1961 Viscount Bennet Scholarship valued at \$2,000 and has elected to take post-graduate study at Harvard as a candidate for a Master of Laws degree.

This marks the fifth time in eleven years of competition that the scholarship has been awarded to a student of the Dalhousie Law School.

McLean, Dean of the Faculty of Dentistry at Dalhousie University deliver an extremely interesting and informative paper on "Fluoridation and Public Health".

None of their arguments were valid, he stated.

Dr. McLean also spoke of the shortage of practising dentists. Nova Scotia has only one dentist for every 3,700 people. He felt that more students should be encouraged to enter the profession and he particularly stressed the opportunity for women in this field.

Following the lecture, a delightful reception was held at the home of Dr. and Mrs. MacCormack so that members of the executive and members of the dental profession in Truro, with their wives, might have an opportunity to meet Mrs. Murray and Dr. McLean.

It is the intention of the Truro Branch to have such a lecture each year as a public service and it is felt that the success of this and last year's efforts augurs well for the future.

Unless Canadians give as much voluntarily to their university system as the Russians give by compulsion to theirs, Canada and the western democracies stand in peril of losing the cold war, Dr. Henry Hicks told the Saint John Branch of the Alumni Association at their meeting on April 28.

Dr. Herbert J. Melanson, M.D., C.M. '25, died at his home in Weymouth February 12, following several months illness. He was a native of Digby County and a graduate in Arts of St. Anne's College in 1920. He was 63 years old.

Dr. Alexander A. J. Murchison, M.D., C.M. '28, superintendent of Riverside and Hillsborough Hospitals for the past 27 years, died at his home in Charlottetown, February 19, following a heart attack. He had planned to retire next year. He was 64 years old.

Mrs. J. Breckinridge McGregor, Arts '05-'06, the former Hazel Bell, died in Toronto in February. Before her marriage she was engaged in social work in London, England, Boston, Halifax and Toronto, and after marriage she maintained an active interest in welfare and church organizations. Dr. Thomas Walter MacLean, M.D., C.M. '24, died in Sarnia, Ontario, March 28, at the age of 64. He was born in Springville, Pictou County, and received his early education at Pictou Academy, and following a period of overseas service with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, he entered Dalhousie University. He practised at Scotsburn and later at Westville, before going to Sarnia seven years ago.

Peter MacAulay, Arts and Law '10-'17, died at North Sydney, March 28. He was born at Big Baddeck in 1889, and was a retired insurance salesman. He was a former law clerk of the provincial legislature and former town stipendiary magistrate.

Last year she was elected president for a second term of the 600,000-member National Council of Women.

Miss Alison D. Stewart, Arts '09-'10, died April 9 in Halifax, after a few months' illness. She was for some years secretary to the board of the Halifax Ladies' College and Conservatory of Music, and later was a member of the staff of the Income Tax department in Halifax.

J. Henry MacDonald, B.A. '26, M.A. '27, died in Watertown, New York, May 29, at the age of 62. A native of Sunny Brae, Pictou County, he graduated from Pictou Academy before coming to Dalhousie. For more than 30 years he was engaged in the teaching profession in the United States.

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NEW MEDICAL BUILDING

Dr. A. E. Kerr, has announced plans for the construction of a new, central building to serve the Faculty of Medicine. He also gave notice of the establishment of a Faculty of Health Professions.

"The medical faculty," said Dr. Kerr, "has grown steadily since the end of the war, in response to a constant demand for more doctors, reflected in rising enrolment. This trend has forced the university to enlarge its staff of full-time teachers in the medical faculty. This has also led to a marked increase in medical research under auspices of Dalhousie."

"All this growth, however, has taken place without a corresponding expansion of the school's physical plant".

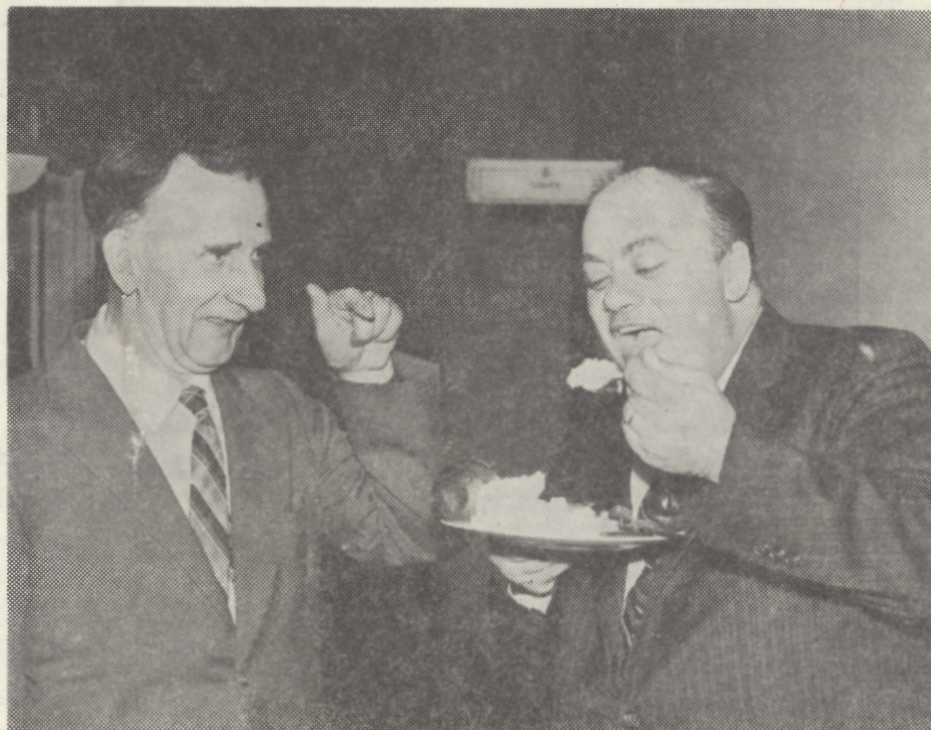
"The Board of Governors has recognized the imperative need for a new, central medical building", said Dr. Kerr. "With this need in mind the university last year obtained from the city the portion of Carleton Street that traverses the present medical campus. Acquisition of this street gives the university much greater freedom in planning its new medical facilities".

Preliminary plans for this new building are now being drawn, and an estimate of the necessary investment will be made. The building is expected to cost several million dollars.

"This new Medical Building," said Dr. Stewart, Dean of Medicine, "is urgently needed. The present facilities were taken into use in 1921, to accommodate 50 students and six professors. Since that time the enrolment has grown to 80 and full-time professors teaching the medical sciences now number 31. Their departments also teach medical science courses to students of dentistry, pharmacy and nursing. Badly needed courses in physiotherapy, which are not available in the Maritimes, have been held off for the last two years because of lack of space".

The new Faculty of Health Professions, will include the School of Nursing and the Maritime College of Pharmacy. Trustees of this college have applied for incorporation within the university, following a survey by the Canadian Association for the Advancement of Pharmacy.

In the course of time new divisions will be added, one of which, the School of Physiotherapy, has already been approved in principle. It is hoped, said Dr. Kerr, that physical accommodation for this new faculty will be provided in the plans for development of Carleton campus.
