Much of the material which appears in its pages will be already known to the Halifax reader. It should be remembered, however, that the primary purpose of the Alumni News is to serve those who are living far from Dalhousie. Its value must be judged on how well it serves as a link, binding together and to the university all the sons and daughters of Dalhousie.



### THE ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Dalhousie Alumni Association was held at Shirreff Hall on Tuesday, May 8, 1951, with approximately three hundred members and guests in attendance. Prior to the business meeting a buffet supper was served by the members of the Women's Division.

The highlight of the business meeting, which was called to order by the President, Mr. H. R. Wyman, at 8.00 p.m., was an address by the outstanding Canadian author and graduate of Dalhousie, Mr. Hugh MacLennan, B.A., 1928. Mr. MacLennan was introduced to the gathering by Mr. M. M. Rankin. In his address to the members, Mr. MacLennan paid eloquent tribute to the beauty of Nova Scotia and to the character of her people.

After the address of the guest speaker came the appointment of the Honorary President. On motion of Dr. J. H. L. Johnstone, seconded by Miss Dorothy P. Rhind and unanimously supported by the members, Dr. Howard Logan Bronson was appointed Honorary President of the Association for the year 1951-52. In thanking the members for the tribute they had paid him Dr. Bronson said that the appointment gave him a sense of being an integral part of Dalhousie and of Nova Scotia.

Following the election of the Honorary President, Mr. George Farquhar paid tribute to the late Professor Murray Macneill and moved that the Alumni Association record its great sense of loss at his passing. Mrs. Macneill who was present expressed her thanks to the members for the many messages of sympathy that she had received.

The meeting then continued with the routine presentation of reports from the President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and the Assistant Treasurer. The report of the Secretary-Treasurer showed receipts totalling \$4,480.72 and disbursements of \$4,529.83. The disbursements include a grant of \$1,000.00 made to Dalhousie University. The Life Membership Fund has been increased by \$250.00. Dues have been paid by 1229 members.

Dr. A. E. Kerr, President of Dalhousie, now addressed the meeting, thanking the members for their continued interest in the affairs of the university.

The names of the officers for the coming year were then announced by Mr. George Farquhar. These names are listed on the first page of this issue. After the introduction of these officers and the appointment of the auditors for the coming year, there being no further business, the meeting adjourned.



## DALHOUSIE REJOINS AMERICAN ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

This Spring, the Dalhousie Alumni Association made application for the re-instatement of Dalhousie University in Types A and B memberships in The American Alumni Council. On June 20th word was received from the Council's Board of Directors that Dalhousie's application had been approved. The Board on behalf of the Council extended a very hearty welcome to the Alumni Association and invited Dalhousie to participate in all of its activities. Dalhousie had previously been a member of the A.A.C. from 1927 to 1929.

The American Alumni Council is an association of the men and women professionally engaged in alumni work in the colleges of the United States and Canada. Its objects are "to benefit its members by the interchange of ideas on alumni and educational problems; by the study of practices and policies of organized alumni work; and by the appraisal of alumni achievement. The Council holds a membership in the American Council of Education and co-operates with other national educational bodies in the furtherance of their mutual interests. Since its essential function is reciprocal internal service, the Council avoids the pressure-group approach to its external relations.

The Council through its Editor, publishes perhaps the most complete library of professional alumni literature available. It includes virtually everything that has been written about alumni work. Dalhousie has already taken advantage of this fact, and several books on Alumni problems are on file in the Alumni Office.

Membership in the Council entitles member Alumni Associations to receive the bi-monthly magazine of the Council, "The A. A. C. News". This periodical is designed to keep the members in touch with Council activities and with the developments in Alumni work in the interval between district and national conference. Reports on the District and National Conferences are also sent to member institutions.

All members of the Council must maintain Type A membership, which is primarily designed to be of assistance to the Alumni Secretary. Type B membership is for institutions with an Alumni Fund Director, while Type C membership is available for those Universities which publish an alumni magazine. Each year, the Council presents the Robert Sibley Award to the Type C member institutions whose magazine is selected by a competent committee of judges as the *Alumni Magazine of the Year*.

Dalhousie is a member of District One, which includes Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Rhode Island and Vermont. Last January the 33rd Annual District One Conference was held at the Seignory Club, Montebello, Quebec. McGill University was host to the District One Members. Two Maritime Colleges, The University of New



Brunswick and Mount Allison University, were represented at the conference by their respective Alumni Secretaries.

The National Conference for 1951 was held at the French Lick Springs Hotel, French Lick, Indiana. Three Canadian Universities were represented, including Dalhousie. The others were the University of Alberta and Queen's University. Dalhousie was represented by Mr. Orval J. T. Troy, LL.B., '51, who had been employed full-time during the summer months to carry out research as to Dalhousie's needs in the Alumni Field. The University was enabled to employ Mr. Troy by a special grant from the Dalhousie Alumni Association, but the conference expenses were borne by the University.

Mr. Troy reports that the Conference proved to be very worthwhile inasmuch as it enabled him to bring back to the University the latest and best information available on ideas and procedures concerning the many phases of alumni work. This information will be incorporated in Mr. Troy's report to the President of the University on Dalhousie's Alumni needs.

Highlights of the Convention were the presentation of the "Alumnus of the Year Award" to Judge Harold R. Medina, and the presentation of the Robert Sibley Award to the *Johns Hopkins Magazine* as the most distinguished alumni magazine of the Year.

The conference closed with the annual business meeting. Of special interest to Canadian members was the decision that the A.A.C. was more than "national" and consequently all appropriate references in the Constitution and By-Laws should be changed to read "general organization" and "general conferences" instead of "national organization" and "national conferences". The A.A.C. felt these amendments were necessary "out of respect for the active participation of so many splendid Canadians in the program of the A.A.C. and to accommodate the possibility of membership for institutions in other countries." In fact, the general feeling was that the A.A.C. was actually international.

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### DALHOUSIAN WINS TEACHING ASSISTANTSHIP

News has been received that F. S. K. MacMillan, B.Sc. has been awarded a Teaching Assistantship of value \$1300 at the University of Michigan. Mr. MacMillan, who is a native of Charlottetown, P. E. I., received his Bachelor of Science degree from Dalhousie in 1949. For the past two years he has been a student in the Faculty of Graduate Studies specializing in the field of Biochemistry and he received the degree of Master of Science in this subject at the spring convocation.

This award is an indication of the high standards in the Faculty of Graduate Studies and of Mr. MacMillan's ability in the field of Biochemistry.



## NEW APPOINTMENTS TO THE STAFF

### Faculty of Arts and Science

**Douglas E. Ryan**, of Fredericton, N. B., has been appointed Assistant Professor of Chemistry. Dr. Ryan received his B.Sc. degree from the University of New Brunswick, his M.A. from Toronto, and his Ph.D. from the University of London. He was for a time an Assistant Professor in the University of New Brunswick, and spent a year at Illinois Institute in Chicago before going to London on a Beaverbrook Scholarship. He holds the diploma of the Imperial College.

**Peter Waite**, who is an M.A. of both the University of British Columbia and the University of Toronto, has been appointed Lecturer in History for the year 1951-52. The Canadian Social Science Research Council gave him a fellowship which enabled him to pursue his work towards a Ph.D. degree in Toronto University during the past two years. He has completed all the requirements for this degree, with the exception of the thesis, to which he is now giving his attention.

**Carl S. Webber**, who received his M.A. from Dalhousie in 1950, has been appointed to the part time staff as a Special Lecturer in History for the session 1951-52.

### Faculty of Law

**A. W. R. Carrothers** has joined the staff in the Faculty of Law as Assistant Professor. A graduate of the University of British Columbia in Arts and Law, he won the Morgan Scholarship there for general proficiency in legal studies. He is a member of the Vancouver Bar and became a full time member of the Faculty of Law in the University of British Columbia in 1948. He published a case-book in Company Law in 1949. The Council of the Canadian Bar Association awarded him the Viscount Bennett Scholarship in 1950 for post-graduate study and Harvard Law School also gave him a tuition scholarship. He received his LL.M. from Harvard in June of this year, his work there being mainly in the fields of Corporation, Jurisprudence and Labour Law.

### Faculty of Medicine

**D. H. Barnbrook, M.B., Ch.B. (Birmingham), F.R.C.S. (E.)**, has been appointed Associate Professor of Anatomy. He received his medical degree in 1945, and at the same time was awarded the Queen's Scholarship and a prize in obstetrics and gynaecology. Recently he received his Fellowship in the Royal College of Surgeons of England. Dr. Barnbrook served on the staff of the Hallem Hospital,



West Bromwich, England, for five years previous to coming to Canada last August.

**Clark Edward Corliss, B.S. (Vermont), M.S. (Mass.), Ph.D. (Brown)** has been appointed Assistant Professor of Histology and Embryology. Professor Corliss completed the requirements for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Biology at Brown University, Providence, Rhode Island, where he served as a Graduate Assistant from 1948-50. He is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

**Dr. C. B. Stewart** has been granted leave of absence to take additional training in Public Health leading to the degree of Doctor of Public Health in Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health, Baltimore, from October 1, 1951 to June 30, 1952. During his absence his work in Epidemiology will be carried on by **Dr. F. G. W. McHattie**, who will serve as Interim Professor of Epidemiology, on a part time basis. Dr. McHattie is a graduate of the Medical School of Toronto University. He was a Junior Intern at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, 1939-40. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, in February, 1940; was transferred to the Royal Canadian Navy, September, 1945. He received his diploma in Public Health from the University of Toronto in 1950. He is at present Command Hygiene Officer, Atlantic Coast, and holds the rank of Surgeon Commander.

**Johann Spitzer** joined the staff as Lecturer in Physiology in April, 1951. He was born in Baja, Hungary, in 1927. He received his M.D. degree from the University of Munich in 1950. From January 1947 to October 1949 Dr. Spitzer worked in the Department of Physiology in the Medical School of Budapest University, first as a voluntary worker and later as a member of the regular staff and as Research Fellow on the Hungarian Scientific Council. Dr. Spitzer is awaiting permission to enter the United States.

**John Conrad Szerb** has been appointed Lecturer in Pharmacology (temporary). He was born in Budapest, Hungary in 1926. He received his M.D. degree from the University of Munich in 1950. He was a Demonstrator in the University of Budapest during the year 1948-49.

**Miss Florence Rowley, B.Sc. (Boston)**, has been appointed Director of Physical Education for Women. Miss Rowley is a native of Fredericton, N. B.



**NOTES FROM THE LAW SCHOOL**

A definitive article by W. R. Lederman, Province of Nova Scotia Professor of Law, on "Classification in Private International Law" was published in the January and February 1951 issues of The Canadian Bar Review.

Dean Horace E. Read, LL.B. (1924), was granted the honorary degree of D.C.L. by Acadia University at its Spring Convocation where he gave the address to the graduating class.

Canada's newest learned society, the Association of Canadian Law Teachers, was established in 1950. Dalhousie Law Faculty was represented at the 1951 annual meeting, held at McGill during the second week of June, by Professors W. R. Lederman, R. Graham Murray and James McL. Hendry B.A. (1939), LL.B., and by Dean Read.

Dalhousie University was represented by Dean Read at the dedication ceremonies of the Arthur T. Vanderbilt Law Center, at New York University, on September fifteenth. The program included four symposia on modern aspects of law in which eminent social scientists, business and government leaders, and natural scientists participated. These were followed by a dinner at which the principal speakers were Chief Justice Vanderbilt of New Jersey, Roscoe Pound, Dean Emeritus of Harvard Law School, and Lord Evershed, Master of the Rolls of England.

Frank M. Covert, K.C., B.A. (1927), LL.B. (1929) is substituting as Lecturer on Income Taxation for Rt. Hon. J. L. Ilsley, P.C., LL.D., LL.B. (1916) who is engaged as Chairman of the Canadian War Claims Commission this year.

David C. Colquhoun, B.A. (1923), LL.B. (1924) of New York, Berkeley M. Kelloway, LL.B. (1929) of Worcester, Mass. and John B. McEvoy, C.B.E., K.C., LL.B. (1935) of St. John's, Newfoundland, were welcome visitors at the Law School during September.

W. C. Dunlop, K.C., LL.B. (1922), Vice-President of the Canadian Bar Association for Nova Scotia from 1949-51, attended the convention of the American Bar Association held in New York City following his attendance at the Canadian Bar Association meeting in Toronto in September. While in New York he visited his brother John A. Dunlop, B.A. (1922), attorney for the Cyanamid Corporation of America.



Ronald J. Downie, LL.B. (1951) is pursuing post-graduate study in law at Harvard Law School. He was awarded the Viscount Bennett Scholarship by the Council of the Canadian Bar Association and a tuition scholarship by Harvard last Spring. Maxwell W. Broley, LL.B. (1951) is also a post-graduate student at Harvard Law School.

Dalhousie's first Master of Laws (LL.M.) degree was granted to Linden M. Smith, LL.B. (1950) at Convocation last May. His main fields were Legislation and Labour Law, his thesis being on legal Aid for the Poor.

Registered as candidates for the Master of Laws at present are Martin Haley, LL.B. (1947), Harold F. Jackson, LL.B. (1951) and Orval J. T. Troy, LL.B. (1951).

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### FREDERICTON BRANCH HAS ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING

The Fredericton Branch of the Dalhousie Alumni Association held its organizational meeting on Monday evening, October 1, 1951. Thirteen members were present at the fairly successful gathering in Fraser Memorial Hall of Saint Paul's United Church. It was felt there should not be too much disappointment in the turnout taking into consideration the present busy time of all other organizations.

Under the chairmanship of Mr. Robert Watson, a lively discussion was carried on, concerning the aim and purpose of having such an organization. The general opinion was that by having such organizations throughout the country, the alumni would feel a greater responsibility to their alma mater, in regards to paying dues, especially. In other words, "prompters" are needed to remind the alumni to pay their dues. ### NEWS ABOUT THE FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

During the 1950-51 session, sixty students were registered in the Faculty. At the 1951 May and Fall Convocations, fourteen Master of Arts degrees and twelve Master of Science degrees were conferred. At the May Convocation, the degree of Master of Laws was conferred for the first time by the University, the recipient being Mr. L. M. Smith.

The number of fellowships, scholarships, studentships and bursaries won by students in the Faculty was somewhat larger than the previous year. Twenty-nine awards of gross value \$30,500 were received by students. Eighteen of these awards are being held at Dalhousie, and eleven are held elsewhere by students who graduated from the Faculty in 1951. The awards include National Research Council Studentships and Bursaries; one 1851 Exhibition Science Research Scholarship; a Research Assistantship in Physics at Yale; a Research Assistantship in Biochemistry at the University of Michigan, a British Council Scholarship at Cambridge, two Assistantships in Psychology, and a number of Bursaries in Psychiatry awarded by the Department of Public Health and Welfare.

During the year 1951 twenty-six grants in aid of research were received by the teaching members of the Faculty. These have a total value of about \$80,000 and were received from the National Research Council, the Defence Research Board, the National Cancer Institute and the Department of Health and Welfare.

These awards testify to the first rate quality of the students and the staff in the Faculty and indicate that research work, particularly in the sciences, is most active.

A number of Nova Scotia business firms, particularly in Halifax, have continued to contribute funds to provide for fellowships and assistantships: From these funds the following awards were made in 1951:

Having completed his master's work in Economics, Mr. J. M. Forrest is taking the education course at Dalhousie University.

Mr. E. R. Hayes is working toward the degree of Ph. D. in Chemistry at McMaster University.

Mr. E. L. Heighton, having completed his master's work in Mathematics, is now teaching at Dartmouth High School.

Mr. W. D. Jamieson, who received the Master of Science degree in May, is continuing his studies in Chemistry at Cambridge Uni-



versity. Mr. Jamieson is the holder of an 1851 Exhibition Overseas Science Research Scholarship.

Mr. D. F. MacLennan, who received the degree of Master of Science in May, is working toward the degree of Ph.D. in Chemistry at McGill University. He is the holder of a National Research Council Studentship.

Mr. F. S. K. MacMillan is proceeding toward the degree of Ph.D. in Biochemistry. He is the holder of a University of Michigan Teaching Assistantship of value \$1300.

Mr. E. G. Nichols, who received the degree of Master of Science at the Fall Convocation, is employed as Psychologist at Falconwood Hospital, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Mr. T. C. Noel, M.Sc., is Associate Professor of Physics at Memorial University of Newfoundland.

Having completed his master's work in English, Mr. M. G. Parks is now studying toward the degree of Ph.D. at the University of Toronto.

Mr. G. L. Rutherford, who received the degree of Master of Arts in Psychology, is now taking the education course at Dalhousie University.

Mr. L. M. Smith is practising his profession in Halifax, having received the degree of Master of Laws.

Miss Margaret Stevenson, M.A., is employed as Psychologist at Camp Hill Hospital.

Mr. G. A. Tracy, who received the Master's Degree in Classics, is teaching at King's College School, Windsor, N. S.

Rev. E. P. Thompson, who received the degree of Master of Arts in History, has a parish in Bathurst, New Brunswick.

Mr. E. S. Warren, who received the degree of Master of Science in Physics, is continuing his studies toward the degree of Ph.D. He is the holder of a Yale University Teaching Fellowship of value \$1450.



## BRANCH ASSOCIATIONS

On May 13th, 1946 the Dalhousie Alumni Association adopted a new Constitution and By-Laws. This new Constitution was "designed to remove the last obstacle to the formation of branch associations of Alumni in every community where two or three could gather together in the name of Dalhousie." It was a progressive step for the new By-laws made it possible for the members of branch associations to automatically become members of the parent association without payment of an additional fee. Branch members were also entitled to receive the ALUMNI NEWS and all the other privileges which the parent association members enjoyed. The hope was expressed in an article in the October, 1946 issue of the Alumni News that a large number of branch associations would now be organized, as a result of the revised By-Laws.

In 1947, President Murray M. Rankin in his annual report stated that "Dalhousians in Ottawa have the distinction of being organized officially as the first branch of the Dalhousie Alumni Association under its new constitution. This enthusiastic group is well underway and is setting an example that we hope will be followed by others throughout Canada, and the United States. Already preliminary steps have been taken by Alumni in St. John's, Newfoundland towards the formation of a branch in that city".

The Alumni Executive decided in 1948 not to press for the organization of local branches because it was the Campaign Year. A new branch had been formed in London, England, however and reports of preliminary organizational work had been received from several other cities.

No branches were actually formed in 1949, but considerable correspondence was carried on through the Alumni Office with interested Dalhousians in Montreal and Toronto. An Extension Committee was appointed and arrangements were made to organize branches in New Glasgow, Truro and Lunenburg.

The year 1950 also failed to produce any new branches of the Association. The Extension Committee formed in 1949 had, however, given careful study to the problem of the formation of branches and reported that it was of the opinion "that success in this field requires the part-time attention of a salaried official of the University—due to the inability of our own members to give the matter the time and attention it requires."

This Spring, the Alumni Association in co-operation with the University, decided that the recommendation of the Extension Committee should be adopted. It was realised that the organization of new branches of the Alumni Association involved too much time and attention for voluntary workers. Consequently, this Spring, when the Alumni Association made a special grant to the University for the promotion of Alumni interest Mr. Orval J. T. Troy was engaged



for the summer months by the University to carry out this work. He was also asked to investigate the current problems facing the Alumni Association and to make appropriate recommendations concerning their solution. Mr. Troy is presently doing post-graduate work in Law at the University, but has been retained on a part-time basis by the University to carry on the organizational project initiated this Spring.

Organization of official branches of the Association should be carried out according to the revised By-laws previously referred to in this article. By-law No. 35 states that "Any member or members of the Association resident in any district may, on receiving the approval of the Executive of the Association, form a local Branch of the Association for that district, which Branch shall be known by the name of the district."

By-law No. 36 states that the objects of such local branches shall be the promotion throughout the district of the interests of the Alumni Association and of the University by inducing Alumni residents to become members of the Association and of the Branch, by holding meetings, by encouraging students to attend the University and by any other means that may seem desirable.

According to other By-laws of the Association any person who for one year or more had been a registered student at the University, is eligible for membership in a local branch of the Alumni Association. Membership in a local branch automatically carries membership in the parent Association. The membership fee is only Three Dollars a year for both memberships, This amount is paid to the Secretary of the local branch concerned, who in turn is allowed to keep one-half of the membership fee for local club use. The other half is remitted to the Alumni Office to help defray the costs of such general Alumni projects as the publication of the Alumni News.

Mimeographed suggestions and application forms for the organization of local branches have been drawn up and are available to interested Alumni. Briefly, the recommended procedure for establishing a group is as follows:

Any person or persons interested in establishing a local branch of the Alumni Association in their community should contact the Alumni Office at Halifax in order to obtain sufficient information about Alumni in their area. Next a Preliminary Organizational Committee should be set up, consisting of approximately four to eight interested and enthusiastic Dalhousians. This committee should determine the date, time and place for a general organizational meeting. If the committee so desires, a slate of officers could be drawn up to be presented to the general organizational meeting. An interesting program should also be considered. Notice of all meetings should be filed with the Alumni Office in order for the branch to be officially recognized by the parent body and perhaps what is more important, in order that a report of the activities of the branch may be published in the Alumni News.



It should be emphasized that the Alumni Office is only too willing to co-operate with the local branches in order to make the task of the local committees a pleasant one. The Alumni Office can assist local branches by:

- (1) supplying copies of the Constitution and By-laws.
- (2) supplying lists of Alumni, Alumnae and undergraduates resident in the area.
- (3) mimeographing and forwarding any letters, notices of meetings, or other information that the local branch, its officers or members wish to be mailed.
- (4) providing special speakers for annual meetings or banquets, if reasonable notice is given in advance.
- (5) co-operating in any other way that may be of assistance in furthering the interests of the local branch, the Alumni Association and the University.

Since this project has been started, preliminary organizational work has been carried out in many Maritime centres and in a few other communities in Canada. Preliminary organizational committees are being organized in Saint John, Moncton, New Glasgow, Truro, Lunenburg, Sydney and Glace Bay. One official branch has already been formed in Fredericton, thanks to the efforts of a very enthusiastic preliminary committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Robert Watson, Com. '49. Other branches are expected to be formed this Fall. If all goes well, there should be at least six new local branches of the Association by next Spring. It has been suggested, that once these groups are established, simultaneous dinner meetings should be held during the Convocation Week, 1952. The idea is good, but it's success depends on you. *Have you a local branch in your community?* If not, here is your chance to do something about it. With assistance from the Alumni Office, you will find it an easy and enjoyable task . . . and you might have loads of fun too.

## THE MEDICAL SCHOOL

We have now settled into the routine of another year. Fifty-nine new students have been admitted, all from the Atlantic Provinces. The total number of students in the Medical school is now two hundred and seventy-two.

There are quite a number of new staff appointments:

In the Department of Preventive Medicine Dr. Chester B. Stewart, Professor of Epidemiology, has gone to John's Hopkins for one year as Professor of Epidemiology (temporary). He has been replaced by Surgeon-Commander F. G. W. MacHattie of the Royal Canadian Navy, M.D., D.P.H. Toronto.

The Department of Pharmacology has been fortunate in adding to its staff Dr. John C. Szerb, who will act as Lecturer for the session 1951-52. Dr. Szerb obtained his M.D. from Munich and spent some time in Paris at the Institut Pasteur where he carried on research work upon the analgesic effects of cortisone and related steroids. This work will be continued at Dalhousie.

The Department of Physiology has taken on Dr. Johann Spitzer as Lecturer. Dr. Spitzer was born in Budapest, educated in Budapest and Vienna and received his M.D. degree in 1950 from Munich. He joined the staff in 1950 and is doing research work on blood and blood clotting.

The Department of Anatomy, which now includes Histology and Embryology has added Dr. D. H. Barnbrook, M.B., Ch.B., F.R.C.S. as Associate Professor of Anatomy and Dr. C. E. Corliss, M.Sc., Ph.D. of Brown University, Rhode Island, as Assistant Professor of Microscopic Anatomy.

In the Department of Psychiatry Dr. Robert J. Weil joined the staff in September 1950, following completion of training at the Menninger Clinic at Topeka. Doctor Weil is Assistant Professor of Psychiatry; Doctor J. F. Nicholson (Dal. 1937) also commenced his duties as Assistant Professor of Psychiatry in September 1951. Doctor Liba Tyhurst was appointed Assistant in Psychiatry in November 1950 to work part-time with the University and to take part in the Cornell-Nova Scotia Government research project in Digby County. Doctor James Tyhurst at the same time was appointed Lecturer in Psychiatry and is to head up the Digby County Research project. In the University he is particularly interested in the field of Social Psychiatry. Mr. Andrew J. Crook, Social Worker, was appointed to the University staff in June, 1950 and has been actively engaged in the organization of the Child Guidance Clinic and the setting up of the research project in Obstetrics.

In the Department of Paediatrics Dr. Henry B. Ross is giving



most of his time to post-graduate teaching and research. Dr. R. M. Ritchie, Dal. 1943 who has just completed a course of training at the Children's Memorial Hospital in Montreal has been appointed Demonstrator. Dr. W. A. Murray, Dal. 1943 and Dr. W. I. Morse, Dal. 1945 have been appointed to the Department of Medicine. Dr. Leslie Stewart has been appointed to the Department of Surgery and Dr. C. Jones of the Halifax Infirmary has been appointed to the Department of Radiology.

We regret to announce the retirement on account of ill health of Professor R. J. Bean. Mrs. Bean has also retired. Professor and Mrs. Bean will be greatly missed by the students and friends on the Faculty. They have done a grand job of teaching and in the many years they have been with us have built up one of the best equipped departments on the campus.

The Post-Graduate Department has been quite active. The original Committee made up of Dr. E. F. Ross, Chariman, Dr. H. B. Ross and Dr. L. C. Steeves has been augmented. The Victoria General Hospital is represented by Dr. C. M. Bethune, the Superintendent, also Dr. M. M. Hoffman and Dr. L. C. Steeves; Camp Hill Hospital by Dr. T. E. Kirk, the Superintendent, and Dr. R. M. MacDonald; the Children's Hospital by Dr. J. L. Sutherland and Dr. H. B. Ross; the Grace Hospital by Dr. W. R. C. Tupper; the Halifax City Department of Health by Dr. A. R. Morton. The heads of the several clinical departments, surgery, medicine, paediatrics, obstetrics and gynaecology are represented by Dr. W. Allan Curry, Dr. C. W. Holland, Dr. H. B. Atlee and Dr. G. B. Wiswell. Dr. R. L. Saunders is a member of the Committee representing the pre-clinical departments. Dr. Fred L. Whitehead represents the Medical Societies of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, Dr. W. A. Hewatt the Medical Society of Nova Scotia and Dr. C. H. Pottle the Medical Society of Newfoundland.

The teaching hospitals to date are the Victoria General Hospital, the Grace Maternity Hospital, the Children's Hospital, Camp Hill Hospital, the Halifax Tuberculosis Hospital and the Saint John General Hospital.

There has been an office established in the Victoria General Hospital and a permanent secretary has been appointed in the person of Miss Joan Hudson. A small booklet, the Post-Graduate News has been established and it will be sent every month to all the doctors in the four Maritime Provinces. One edition has already gone out. This booklet will give the schedule of the events to come in the way of post graduate education\* and will also contain short articles.

We have had one visitor to date and that is Dr. Edwin B. Astwood, Research Professor of Medicine of Tufts Medicine School at Boston. He spoke to the Halifax Medical Society on the Treatment



of Thyroidism and the next morning addressed the Dalhousie medical students on the Physiology of the Thyroid. These meetings were well attended.

Dr. D. R. S. Howell, Assistant Professor of Dermatology has spoken at Charlottetown, Yarmouth, Moncton and Saint John. Dr. Martin Hoffman addressed the Queens-Lunenburg Medical Society. Dr. H. B. Ross who is devoting most of his time to post-graduate work in Paediatrics, made a tour of the Annapolis Valley and the South Shore of Nova Scotia. He also attended the Medical Societies of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia.

There will be a surgical course given during the month of October. Our Refresher Course also will be given during the month of November. The Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology will be giving a course in November. Dr. R. B. Cattell, Surgeon of the Lahey Clinic will be our next visitor.

In the Department of Physiology as mentioned before they have added Dr. Johann Spitzer as Lecturer. Dr. Gordin Kaplan has started another course for Science students on cellular physiology. He has also received a grant for research from the Defence Research Board and the National Research Council. Dr. C. B. Weld has also had a grant from the National Research Council.

During the past year the Department of Anatomy under the chairmanship of Dr. Richard Saunders has undergone both reorganization and expansion in respect to its teaching and research programmes, personnel and equipment.

The curriculum of developmental and microscopic anatomy has been revised and orientated both towards human gross anatomy and clinical medicine. This amalgamation of anatomy and histology has permitted a closer teaching co-ordination and pooling of teaching aids, material and equipment. In addition modern texts have been adopted in both gross and microscopic anatomy in view of the changing emphasis in medicine and necessity of affording the medical student time for the study of the living subject.

A living anatomy laboratory for surface and radiological anatomy has been established alongside the dissecting room in order to facilitate the correlation of cadaveric and living anatomy. The laboratory incorporates a students' dressing room and fluoroscopy room and has been equipped with examination couches, muscle stimulating and other instruments in order that dissection may be co-ordinated with those anatomical features which can readily be determined in the living body by physical and endoscopic examination or radiologic procedures. This living anatomy unit, which is the first of its kind in Canada, has received favourable comment from both visiting staff of other Canadian universities as well as the Survey Committee of the Canadian Dental Association.

Another development has been the installation of a refrigeration



plant and plasticizing unit for the improved preparation of anatomical material.

Through the cooperation of the Radiology Department of the Victoria General Hospital the department has been fortunate in securing the services of Dr. Peter Loder, M.D., C.M. (Dal) as Instructor in Radiological Anatomy.

An active research programme has been planned and work has commenced in the fields of micro-radiography electromyography, experimental embryology, and surgical applied anatomy. The department is also participating in post-graduate instruction and has arranged facilities for senior students and graduates.

The efforts of the Department of Pathology in the year 1950-51 have been largely devoted to replenishing material for teaching. Over 15,000 histological slides were made last year and a good start has been made to providing a wet-specimen collection. Already the bulk of the teaching of general pathology is done in the practical laboratory and here teaching has been facilitated by the introduction of a public address system.

While lack of room is a stumbling block to many ambitions a number of major publications are on their way to press and there is every indication, despite many difficulties, that the department will gain recognition in its own field.

During the past year the activities of the Department of Psychiatry at Dalhousie University have greatly expanded. This has been made possible through grants received from the Atlantic Provinces through the Federal Health Grants, from the Rockefeller Foundation, from the National Research Council and from expanding University support. We owe particular thanks to the Department of Health of the Province of Nova Scotia, who through the Chief of the Department of Neuro-Psychiatry, Doctor Clyde Marshall, has given continuous support and help to the University Department. An expanded training program has been made possible by the cooperation of the Victoria General Hospital, the Children's Hospital, the Nova Scotia Hospital in Dartmouth, Camp Hill Hospital, the Department of Veteran's Affairs Hospital in Halifax. New facilities have been added at the Dalhousie Public Health Clinic for improved teaching in Child Psychiatry.

We have had the advantage of outside lecturers during this past year. In March, Doctor Eric Wittkower, from McGill University, spent several days with us lecturing in Psychosomatic Medicine to our Residents. In April Doctor Kenneth Gray and Doctor John Seeley on the staff of the Toronto University visited us and discussed problems of medical, legal and social Psychiatry with the Residents.

Members of the staff have also had an opportunity to present material in other places. In September, Doctor Jones spoke to the Newfoundland Medical Society at their annual meeting and Doctor



R. J. Weil had a paper presented at the American Ortho-Psychiatric Association at their annual meeting in New York.

During the past year, Doctor H. Kenneth Hall received his certification in Psychiatry by examination from the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada. Doctor R. O. Jones was made a Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and at the inaugural meeting of the Canadian Psychiatric Association in June, 1951 became the first President of that Association.

All members of the Department have participated widely in local public education in Psychiatry, with Home and School Associations, Service Clubs, Women's Organizations, etc.

### CONVOCATION

The Convocation of Dalhousie University was held on Tuesday, May 15, 1951, at the Capitol Theatre, with over three hundred students receiving degrees and diplomas. Honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws were presented to Miss Georgina MacKay, principal of Morrison High School, Glace Bay, and Dr. John Hubert Craigie, Associate Director of Science Service and Dominion Botanist and Plant Pathologist Ottawa.

After the Invocation, which was given by Reverend Robert Layton B.A., B.D., a graduate of the class of 1901, Dr A. E. Kerr spoke to the graduates. In his remarks, Dr. Kerr stressed the stupendous tasks which face the graduates of this generation.

The address to the graduates was given by the Honorable Henry D. Hicks, Minister of Education for Nova Scotia. Mr. Hicks warned the students that one of the greatest dangers in the world today is the emphasis which is placed on security rather than on the preservation of individual freedom. He reminded them that "There are persons who would put physical security before individual freedom of thought and action . . . the liberty of the individual to do as he wants with his life is being seriously challenged."

Among the degrees conferred were 69 in Arts, 70 in Science, one in Engineering Physics, (the first in Dalhousie's history), 33 in Commerce, two in Music, two in Education, 56 in Law, 55 in Medicine and 12 in Dentistry.

Diplomas were presented to 24 graduates in Education, one in Pharmacy, 20 in Public Health Nursing, one in Teaching and Supervision in Schools of Nursing and two in Food Technology.

First Class Honors were awarded to Jane Margaret Bailly, Lunenburg, (biology); George Malcolm Graham, Parrsboro, (physics); and Kenneth Stanford Nickerson, Dartmouth, (psychology).



Honors were awarded to Norman Ross Beckett, Halifax, (Biology); Barbara Scott Jefferson, Halifax, (English), and Angela deCarteret Pelham, N. Y., (Modern Languages);

The Governor-General's Gold Medal was awarded to George Graham, and the University Medals were presented to Kenneth Nickerson and Jane Bailly (Arts and Science); Ronald Downie, Halifax, (Law), and James C. Vibert, Stewiacke (Medicine). The Avery Prize for the highest pass graduate was won by Elizabeth A. Merrick, Halifax.

### IN TRIBUTE TO DR. HOWARD L. BRONSON

The following are the texts of addresses given in appointing Dr. Bronson as Honorary President of the Alumni Association.

Mr. President, Members of the Dalhousie Alumni Association:

It gives me a great deal of pleasure as his oldest student and oldest colleague to present the name of Howard Logan Bronson, Doctor of Philosophy (Yale University), and Doctor of Laws and Letters, (Dalhousie University), F.R.S.C. for honorary President of this Society.

Born in Washington, Connecticut, this worthy son of Yale succeeded the late President A. Stanley MacKenzie as George Munro Professor of Physics in 1919.

As the holder of this chair for thirty-six years, he not only maintained, but enhanced, the high reputation of his predecessors, for teaching and research. He was responsible for the development at Dalhousie of a group of physicists large in proportion to the size of the University, a number of whom hold professorial rank in universities and many of whom occupy positions of responsibility in government or industrial research organizations. Six of his students have won 1851 Science Research Scholarships, one was a Fellow of the Royal Society of London and four are Fellows of the Royal Society of Canada and two of them were decorated for their scientific efforts during the war.

Not only did he take a leading part in the affairs of the University, but he has exerted a profound influence in moulding the character of his students and the many others who regard him as a friend and a guide. There are few who sacrifice their time to such an extent and so unselfishly as does Dr. Bronson when he believes he is helping someone on his way.

Although a Dalhousian by adoption, those who know him feel that Dalhousie has never had a more loyal alumnus.

In proposing Dr. Bronson as Honorary President of this Society, I submit the name of one of the most revered of Dalhousians, one whose interest in the cause of Dalhousie will never slacken with the years.

No recommendation of Dr. Bronson would be complete without a reference to his work among Dalhousie students, graduates and faculty, as leader of the Bible Study groups familiarly known on the campus as "Jesus in the Records."

Having found abundant life, Dr. Bronson many years ago took it upon himself, not only as an obligation, but as a labour of love, to lead others to make the same discovery for themselves, to awaken in them a search for truth, and above all, to make available to them the one perfect example of a completely dedicated life. Only those who have participated in these studies can know what Dr. Bronson's method of leadership can mean in the development of integrated thinking.

In this task Dr. Bronson has given untold hours of service down through the years, conducting three or four groups each week. Indeed he is still doing so, and as buoyantly as ever, for somewhere along the way Dr. Bronson discovered the fountain of youth. Dr. Bronson has been ably supported by Mrs. Bronson, a woman with at least two exceptional qualities,—she knows when to be silent before her husband, and she had always gladly welcomed into her home, at all hours, and out of all weathers, troops of young people who must certainly have carried in many pounds of grime and dirt.

You will recall that Mr. Chips, as he lay hovering between two worlds, was wryly amused by the remark of an onlooker that "the old fellow had had no children." "What, no children," he exclaims to himself—why I have hundreds—and all boys." Dr. and Mrs. Bronson can be assured to night that they too have hundreds, and not all boys either!

As a member of this family, I take great pleasure in seconding Dr. Johnstone's motion.

(1924) was elected vice-President of the Association for Nova Scotia and re-elected to the Editorial Advisory Board of the Bar Review for 1951-52.

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## DALHOUSIE RECEIVES LARGE BEQUESTS

President A. E. Kerr, of Dalhousie University has announced that the late Eliza Cochran Smith, widow of the late Dr. James Ross Smith, has left the sum of approximately \$72,000 in her will to found scholarships in Medicine and Sciences at Dalhousie.

The late Dr. and Mrs. Smith during their lifetime established The Ross Stewart Smith Scholarship to be awarded to the undergraduate student whose record in advanced classes shows the most distinct evidence of aptitude for scientific study, and the Ross Stewart Smith Prize to be awarded at the end of the third year in Medicine to the student who has carried on the most creditable advanced work in one or more of the pre-clinical subjects.

The total foundation now amounts to \$75,000 and the awards just mentioned, which Dr. and Mrs. Smith created, as a memorial to their son who died during his student days at Dalhousie, will continue to have a primary claim on the revenue. The amount that will be forthcoming annually will help the University to extend the benefits of the memorial to a larger number of students, and to endow new prizes, scholarships or fellowships that will carry out the donor's intention.

The terms of the will authorize the President of the University, on the recommendation of the Senate, wide discretion in the use of the fund in any manner that, in their judgment, will best promote medical and scientific study and research in Dalhousie.



### DALHOUSIAN HONORED

When the American Society of Mechanical Engineers paid honour to the men who had developed America's first jet engine, during World War II, one of the most distinguished engineers thus honoured was Donald F. Warner, Science 1916-19. Mr. Warner as designing engineer for the General Electric Aircraft Gas Turbine Divisions at Lynn has contributed greatly to the progress of the jet engine industry.

At the time he was placed in charge of the secret war-time development at Lynn, Warner was assistant designing engineer in the company's supercharger division. He joined General Electric in 1922 as a student engineer on the test course after receiving a degree in naval architecture and marine engineering from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. A year later he was assigned to steam turbine research and in 1936 was appointed assistant designing engineer of the auxiliary turbine division.

In 1938, when war appeared imminent, he was transferred to the supercharger division where he played an important role in the expansion of General Electric's facilities to meet increased Air Force demands. Warner became assistant designing engineer of the division in 1941.

Following development of the first I-A engine, Warner designed the I-16, an improved powerplant, and then was given overall supervision of the I-40, powerplant of the Lockheed F-80. Warner was later given responsibility for further development of the TG-180 (Air Force J-35), an axial flow engine developed by General Electric turbine engineers at Schenectady.

In December, 1947, he was made designing engineer for the aircraft gas turbine divisions. During this time the axial flow TG-190 (Air Force J-47) was developed and is now in production for the Air Force.

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### SPECIAL TRIBUTE FROM THE STUDENTS

In this year's edition of the Dalhousie Yearbook special tribute was paid by the students to Murray M. Rankin, one of the most loyal and active members of the Alumni. To do him honour and to thank him for his efforts on their behalf the students of Dalhousie dedicated to him the 1951 edition of *Pharos*. This dedication reads in part.

"This volume is respectfully dedicated to a great Dalhousian, Murray MacGregor Rankin, who resigned this year as Secretary-Treasurer of the Students' Council, after twenty years' service as mentor and advisor to student government at Dalhousie.

It would be difficult to find any other living man who has made such a generous contribution of his time and energy to the cause of Dalhousie student activities and whose interest has been reflected by such a lasting impression upon the minds and lives of the members of the student body who had the opportunity to meet him."

Edgar D. Loughead, LL.B. '23, died of a heart attack March 30th, while on a business trip to Seattle. He was 57 years old. A native of Calgary, he was educated at Western Canadian College, Calgary, and graduated from the Dalhousie Law School. He was the son of Sir James and Lady Loughead, western pioneers. During the last War he served as a captain in the RCASC. Surviving are his wife, the former Edna Bauld Sp. Arts, '19-'20, two sons and a daughter.

Dr. Charles Fowler Lindsay died suddenly at his home at Noroton, Conn. April 21st. Born in Halifax, he entered Dalhousie University in 1895 on a McKenzie Bursary, graduating in 1899 with High Honors in Chemistry and Chemical physics, later obtaining his Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins University. For many years he was a resident of the United States, occupying important posts with the General Electric Company Research Laboratory and with the United States Rubber Company. During World War I, he was a member of the Imperial Munitions Board.

Rowland C. Moore died suddenly at his home in Toronto, April 12th. He was born in Halifax in 1893, and received his education at Halifax Academy and later at Dalhousie, Science & Eng. '12-'13. In 1921 he joined the staff of Imperial Oil Limited and at the time of his death was Assistant Manager of Refineries with the Company.

C. Wray Townshend died at his home in Windsor, N. S. June 8th, at the age of 52. He was the son of the late Sir Charles Townshend former Chief Justice of Nova Scotia. Born in Amherst, he attended King's Collegiate School in Windsor, obtained his BA degree from McGill and graduated with his law degree from Dalhousie University in 1923. He was a member of the Council of the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society, and also a member of the Church of England, acting as church warden for a number of years. He was prominent in town affairs, being secretary-manager of the Edgehill Church School for Girls, and was solicitor for the Town of Windsor at the time of his death.



F. Allan Hamilton, died in the City Hospital, Sydney, in June, after an illness of a few days. He was a well-known lawyer and Canada's first negro King's Counsel, which award he received in 1950. He was born in the British West Indies 56 years ago and received his law degree from Dalhousie in 1923. For a time he practised in Halifax but in 1924 he went to Sydney where he resided ever since. He was active in community affairs and was a leader among members of his race in Cape Breton. He was a valued member of the United Baptist Church and also was prominent in the Menelek Co-operative Society, Whitney Pier.

Dr. Louis M. Silver passed away at his home in Halifax, June 6th, 1951, at the age of 87. He was one of the founders of Dalhousie Medical School, and for over 35 years was a lecturer in the School, and for more than 60 years a practitioner in the city of Halifax. He received his early education in Halifax and later attended King's College. After a year at Dalhousie, Arts '84-'85, he went to Scotland, and received his medical degree from Edinburgh University in 1889. Prior to his return to Halifax, he practised for two years at Wakefield, England. Although retired for some years from general practice, he maintained a keen interest in the affairs of Dalhousie University and also in the Victoria General Hospital, where he was consultant emeritus. In 1935 he was elected to an honorary membership in the Nova Scotia Medical Society, being a member of the society from 1889. He was also a member of the Canadian Medical Society and the Canadian College of Physicians. Dr. Gordon Silver M.D., C.M. '35 of Sherbrooke, Guysborough Co., is a son.

Mrs. J. A. Marshall (Katherine D. MacKay) '00-'02, Nova Scotia's first woman druggist, passed away in New Glasgow, May 13th, after a lengthy illness. She engaged in a short period of successful teaching before coming to Dalhousie, and was a graduate of the Department of

Expression, Halifax Ladies' College, and also of Emerson School of Expression, Boston. On two occasions she was prepared to serve as pharmacist in hospitals under an American Board of Foreign Missions, the first time being prevented by the Boxer Rebellion and the second time by the intervention of the First World War, when sailings were cancelled. Returning to Halifax, she had charge of the Halifax Dispensary and at the time of the explosion, rendered valuable assistance.

Lieut. Joseph Levison was killed in Korea May 26th, when a jeep in which he was a passenger ran over a road mine on the western front sector. He was a Canadian Army Public Relations Officer, attached to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and has been in Korea since December, 1950, with the advanced party of the Princess Pats. He had recently become a member of the Halifax Press Club. Lieut. Levison was born in Sydney, but came to Halifax at an early age, and was educated in the Halifax schools, later attending Queen Elizabeth and St. Mary's High Schools. He qualified for his commission through the Canadian Officers' Training Corps while attending Dalhousie from 1947 to 1951 when he enlisted. As an officer cadet, his record was one of the best in Canada. He played a leading part in sports, being an outstanding football player and one of the Province's top swimmers, and squash players. He served as Sports Editor on the Dalhousie Gazette, and was one of the chief organizers of the International Students Service Campaign on the Dal Campus to raise funds for displaced students who wished to continue their studies in Canada.

Dr. Theodore R. Ford died at his home at Liverpool, N. S., May 29, 1951, after a long period of ill-health. He was a native of Milton, Queens County, where he received his early education, later attending Acadia University. He graduated in medicine from Dalhousie University in 1903, and since 1909 had practised at Liverpool until a few years ago he was obliged to retire, owing to ill-health.



Mrs. Malcolm Fooshee, the former Claire Murray of New Glasgow, died in the New York Infirmary June 26th after a long illness. She received her early education at New Glasgow, and was a graduate of Pictou Academy, and later in Arts from Dalhousie in 1924. After graduation she taught in New Glasgow High School, and went from there to New York where she gained fame with her illustrated poems which were syndicated and appeared in many American publications. She was the author of "Sea Pieces" a volume of verse, and was especially noted for her sonnets. The week of her death, two poems were published in the summer issue of The Antioch Review. In her many interests she was associated with the United Hospital, the Milton Parent-Teachers Association, Christ's Anglican Church of which she was a member, and several clubs in Rye, New York where she made her home since her marriage. The family suggested that instead of sending flowers, those wishing might send a donation to the Poetry Prize Fund established in Mrs. Fooshee's honor at her alma mater, Dalhousie University.

Dr. John Charles Morrison, died at his home in Halifax, June 30th, at the age of 76, having resided in Halifax since his retirement in 1943. He was born in Englishtown, Victoria Co., and received his later education in Halifax at the old Academy, and Dalhousie University where he obtained his MDCM degree in 1903. He did postgraduate work at London and Edinburgh, the Mayo Clinic and the New York Polyclinic. He began as a general practitioner serving during his life as resident surgeon of the Dominion Coal Company, staff member of St. Joseph's Hospital, Glace Bay; surgeon staff member of New Waterford General Hospital, and examiner in surgery of fourth and fifth year students at Dalhousie University. He was a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, a Council Member of the Canadian Medical Association, vice-president of the N. S. Medical Society, President of the Cape Breton Medical Society, member of the Provincial Medical

Board, the Halifax Medical Society, N. S. Historical Society, Institute of International Affairs, Canadian Club, North British Society and Masonic Order. Dr. Allister Neil Morrison MDCM '43 of Musquoboit Harbour is a son.

Dr. Charley Morrison was one of the pioneer doctors in the New Waterford district, and first worked for, and later in, the present New Waterford General Hospital.

John A. (Ted) Gordon, M.B.E., manager for the Maritime Provinces of the apparatus division of Canadian General Electric Co., died in the Sutherland Memorial Hospital, Pictou, July 2nd, after a short illness. He was 32. He was visiting his family at their summer home at Pictou when he became ill. Born in Bay Roberts, Nfld, he received his early education in Canso, N. S. and later at Dalhousie graduating in 1939 with a B.S.C. His B.E. degree he obtained from McGill. In 1941, he enlisted in the RCEME as a lieutenant and served in France, Belgium, Holland and Germany, being awarded the M.B.E. He was discharged at the end of the war with the rank of captain. He then returned to General Electric and was stationed in Peterborough, Toronto and Windsor, Ontario, before returning to the Maritimes with headquarters in Halifax.

O. R. Regan, K.C. died at the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, following an illness of several months, at the age of 71. He practised law for over 40 years. He was educated in the Dartmouth and Halifax schools, graduated in law from Dalhousie in 1901, and practised in Halifax until 1910 when he went to Moosejaw where he practised for a number of years. During the first World War, he served overseas with the Canadian Army for three years, returning to Canada in 1918. He again moved to Western Canada, returning to Nova Scotia in 1930. He was appointed King's Counsel in 1923. Prior to the First World War, he took an active interest in civic circles in Dartmouth, his native town.



Dr. Guy Stewart Goodwin, M.D., C.M. '12 died in Vancouver, July 8th at the age of 60. He was born in Halifax, and on his graduation from Dalhousie was winner of two prizes, the Medical Faculty Prize, and the Dr. Birt Prize. He practised in Moose Jaw, Sask. from 1921 to 1949 when he retired to Vancouver. He served in the Royal Army Medical Corps from 1914 to 1919. Between the First and Second World Wars he was officer commanding the 10th Field Ambulance in Moose Jaw. He was the founder of the Associated Medical Clinic in that city, and was one-time president of the Canadian Medical Association.

Robert Sedgewick Deane died at Cedar Crest Sanitarium, Hartford, Connecticut, July 22nd. He was born at Deane Settlement in 1881, and was the grandson of the late Dr. Robert Sedgewick, B.A. '67, LL.D. '93 of Musquodoboit. He graduated in law from Dalhousie in 1912, and practised his profession in the Canadian West and Halifax. During the First World War, he served overseas with the Forestry Corps. After his return, he accepted a position as farm manager at the Home for Crippled Children, Newington, Conn., where he resided until the time of his death.

Rev. Frank Baird, D.D., retired minister of the Presbyterian Church died at his home in Fredericton, N. B. in June this year. He was born in Chipman, N. B. and received his early education in that place, later graduating in Arts from University of New Brunswick. He received his M.A. from Dalhousie in 1899, and in 1927 was granted an honorary degree of doctor of divinity from the Presbyterian College in Montreal. He held charges in Pictou, Chipman, and Fredericton, and in 1930 was Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Miss Amelia Creelman passed away at the Vancouver General Hospital on August 3rd, after a long illness. She went to Vancouver in 1910, after graduating from Dalhousie in Arts in 1909. She taught at Dawson School

and later at King George High School until 1946 when she joined the staff of the University of British Columbia as lecturer in English. She was an active member of the Dalhousie Women's Club and a former member of the University Women's Club of Vancouver. Burial was at her old home at Bass River, N. S.

D. Frank Matheson, Lunenburg's senior barrister, died at his home in Lunenburg August 21st. He was born at St. Peters, C. B., and educated at the Halifax Academy and Dalhousie, graduating in Law in 1901. He was admitted to the Bar in 1903, and created a King's Counsel in 1909. He began practice in Lunenburg with the late Justice A. K. MacLean, LL.B. '92, and engaged in private practice in 1912. In 1920 he was appointed a Crown Prosecutor. He was the first president of the Lunenburg Board of Trade and was president of the Lunenburg Liberal Association for a number of years.

Miss Winnifred May Webster passed away at Lower Canard, King County on August 27th, following a lengthy illness. She was for 30 years a member of the teaching staff of Kings County Academy, having retired in 1937. Her teaching career extended over a period of 40 years. She graduated from Berwick High School at the age of 14, and from the Provincial Normal College, Truro, two years later. In 1903 she graduated from Dalhousie with a bachelor of Arts degree and received the Munro Scholarship. She then took up post-graduate work at Columbia University, coming to Kentville in 1907. In 1935 Miss Webster was one of a number to receive the King's Jubilee Medal.

Judge George Geddie Patterson died at his home in New Glasgow, N. S. September 10th, 1951 after a brief illness. He had celebrated his 87th birthday in June, and until the time of his death, retained an active interest in all affairs of civic or educational nature. He was noted during his life as jurist, legislator, historian and athlete. He was born in Green Hill,



Pictou County, his father being the well-known historian of the County. In 1933 he was made a Doctor of Laws by Dalhousie University. After practising law in New Glasgow for a number of years he was elected Liberal member for the Nova Scotia Legislative Assembly. In civic affairs he had been councillor, school board member and magistrate. He taught school at Arichat, N. S. and New Glasgow High. Later he became a lecturer at the Dalhousie Law School, and for the past many years was a member of the Board of Governors of Dalhousie. He attended a Board meeting late in August. His athletic interests lay in football in his earlier years, and later he was an enthusiastic curler, at one time competing in Scotland as captain of a Canadian team. He played a major role as member of a large number of societies during his lifetime, and was an active member of the Presbyterian Church in New Glasgow, as well as being a member of the Historical Committee of Pictou Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. A. D. Holmes the former Inez Corine Gould died at Halifax, July 8, 1951. She attended Dalhousie, Arts 1938-'40.

John Albert Taylor died at his home in Bethlehem, Penn., July, 1951. He was born in Liverpool, England in 1903, attended Rothesay Collegiate School, and later McGill University where he obtained his BA degree. He received his Dip. Eng. degree from Dalhousie in 1922, before going to McGill.

Dr. William A. P. Ternan died in Edmonton May 29, 1951. He was born in Halifax the son of the late Fleet Surgeon John Ternan, and attended Dalhousie in 1883-'84. He received his medical degree from Edinburgh Univ., and lived in Alberta where he practised until his retirement some years ago. He was 92 years old.
