

Many of you may not be aware that this year marks the tenth anniversary of "Modo Optimum." The yearbook was first published in 1969, the first year we spent in the Burbidge Pharmacy Building. However, publication ceased after the first issue and was not resumed until five years later. Fortunately for all of us, the yearbook has been published annually since 1973.
