Dear Mrs. Borgese:

Thank you very much for the materials that you sent to me in March. I can now assure you that they have been put to good use.

May I ask for more? This summer I will be directed a Workshop on the Design of World Order Models, as described in the enclosed announcement. We have decided that, for a practice design exercise, it would be useful to ask the participants to develop proposals with reference to some aspect of the future administration of the oceans. Your 1968 version of The Ocean Regime would be particularly useful for them to read because it contains well articulated proposals as well as explanatory commentary. May I have twenty copies for distribution to the participants?

We may also use your Saturday Review article, and perhaps also your article on "The World Communities," but I expect we will be able to xerox these.

I notice that in the February 1971 version of The Ocean Regime there is no function corresponding to Article V, item 13 in the 1968 version: "to control armed forces operating on the seabed." Has this been dropped because of the desire to emphasize positive functions, as suggested in the 1968 commentary, on p. 31? Can you describe to me your current thinking on the role of arms control measures in the regime you now envision?

I understand that David Krieger, now at San Francisco State College, will be joining you soon. Dave and I have become very good friends, and we have many common interests. I hope that we will somehow be able to work together, toward your ends, and also toward my ends, which are to raise ocean consciousness here in Hawaii and through that, to develop designs for world community. I'll write to Dave.

DESIGNING THE WORLD OF THE FUTURE

Fifteen outstanding scholars from Asia and the United States have been invited to participate in a <u>Workshop on the Design of World Order Models</u> to be held during the week of July 17-22, 1972 at the East-West Center at the University of Hawaii. The Workshop is an outgrowth of the World Order Models Project, a transnational research project in which teams of scholars in eight regions of the world are developing designs of alternative preferred world political systems for the decade of the 1990s.

The Workshop will involve a core group of leading scholars from several disciplines. Their purpose will be to study the experience of the World Order Models Project and to set the stage for continued planning for a more just and peaceful world order. The Workshop will prepare the participants to broaden involvement by engaging others in the planning effort.

Yoshi Sakamoto, director of the Japanese WOMP team and a professor of law and political science at the University of Tokyo; Saul Mendlovitz, overall director of WOMP and professor of international law at Rutgers Law School; and George Kent, professor of political science at the University of Hawaii, will be the principal discussion leaders.

A major feature of the Workshop, open to all, will be a presentation by Professor Mendlovitz on "World Order Design: The Power of Arrogance." His talk will be given at the Kennedy Theater on Monday, July 17, 1972 at 8:00 P.M. An open, informal reception will be held afterward at Jefferson Hall, directly across from the Kennedy Theater, on the University of Hawaii campus.

The Workshop is being sponsored by the World Law Fund, hosted by the East-West Center, and funded by the Institute for International Order.
