


The College, as a component of the Health Studies group, has been designated as one of just two areas of emphasis by the University. Liz, if it weren't for your help in the library there are probably very few people who would be able to pass third year. Thanks for your smile and your encouragement too.


To all members of the teaching staff, thanks for all the work you put in. We know we aren't the only ones who put in late hours.


A Week to Remember

The DalPlex pool will now hold fond memories for all of us and it may never be the same again.




Toga Party








FOR THE HEALTH OF IT

Dr. Duff - A Truly Great Man

At the Pharmacy Awards Banquet, Dr. Gordon Duff's retirement plans were made official for September 1990. Dr. Duff has been at the College for twenty-nine years and many of us know little about him (besides trying to keep awake in his classes!). What we've failed to realize is the substantial contributions that Dr. Duff has made to our education here at the College.

Dr. Duff was born in the wild west of Saskatchewan. In 1953, he received a Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy from the University of Saskatchewan. After working a summer in a retail pharmacy in Ontario, he returned to the University to study with a professor of Organic Chemistry for a Master of Science Degree. (Dr. James had also started that year in a Master of Science program studying Pharmaceutics.) Here in Canada at that time, there were no PhD programs. Writing away to many of the American colleges, he decided to attend the University of Florida. They offered better financial assistance, a good reputation and a different place with a much warmer climate! During his time there, he studied Medicinal Chemistry and did research in Organic Chemistry. In 1958, he successfully completed his PhD and now very homesick returned to Canada to teach Pharmaceutical Chemistry at the University of Saskatchewan for the next three years.

Out of the blue the President of Dalhousie University phoned and asked Dr. Duff to come for an interview for the position of Director of the Dalhousie College of Pharmacy. The Old Maritime College of Pharmacy was integrating to become part of Dalhousie University. Dr. Duff accepted the proposal and came to the Maritimes in August, 1961, where he began the great task of the first Director.

It was very challenging as he initiated the transition from the old three year diploma program to the four year degree program. Working in a small building with limited staff can be frustrating. A few times Dr. Duff was tempted to return home but he stuck it through!

During his teaching career, he was moved farther away from teaching Medicinal Chemistry - partly due to the added responsibilities of being a Director. He presently teaches Pharmacy Administration - first year and parts of third and fourth year Therapeutics such as: hyperthyroidism, hypothyroidism, Crohn's disease, hyperlipidemia, thrombosis, liver disease, alcoholism, and miscellaneous topics.

Dr. Duff has also served on many committees and societies throughout his career as a member or as chairperson. To mention a few, the: Association of Faculties of Pharmacy, Canadian Academy of the History of Pharmacy, Nova Scotia Pharmacaceutical Society, New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society, PEI Pharmacy Board, CPhA, Centennial Committee (which initiated Centennial Scholarships), Admissions Committee, Academic Planning Committee, Human Communication Disorder Committee (which reviewed Dal's role in continuing education), PEBC Examining Committee, PEBC Board and as an examiner for PEBC in Pharmacy Administration. He also established an old-time pharmacy in historic Sherbrooke Village.

In 1970-71, he took a sabbatical year and went to the University of California to observe the Pharm D Program. Since this time he has seen Clinical Pharmacy be introduced in the fourth year curriculum and a Residency Program established here in Nova Scotia but he would still like to see these programs expand more.

Dr. Duff has been a strong supporter of the DSPS. He has only missed one or two Pharmacy Banquets in eighteen years. In his earlier, younger days he attended parties, pub crawls, sociables and other DSPS events. Recently, Dr. Duff was awarded Honorary Life-Time membership to the DSPS for his contributions and in appreciation for all he has done for the students here at the College. Also, the Annual Pharmacy Awards Banquet has been re-named and is now called the Dr. J.G. Duff Annual Awards Banquet to show our appreciation for his support. Dr. Duff has helped make this College what it is today and these small tokens could never repay him enough for all the time and effort that he has given us as students but it is our way to show him that we appreciate him and thank him for everything.

Dr. Duff plans to just relax upon retirement and just "be lazy". He will probably putter around working on the history collection and maybe travel around the Maritimes and the New England States.

We'll miss you at the College Dr. Duff! All the best!!




ANNUAL PHARMACY BALL




President's Message






That concludes the PR activities for 1989-90. It sure was a banner year and I wish every success to the committee next year in all their endeavors.


We were kept pretty busy in November as almost everyone ordered clothing. During the spring clothing order in March, we found out that pharmacy students love NEON.
