REDEDICATION OF THE FORREST BUILDING

FORREST BUILDING

This building was constructed in 1887. Designed by J.G. Dumaresq, it was built by A.E. Milliken and Co. on a site obtained as part of the arrangements under which the original Dalhousie College building, on Duke Street at the north end of the Grand Parade where City Hall now stands, was sold to the City. The cornerstone was laid on April 27, 1887 by the Honourable Sir William Young, former Chief Justice of Nova Scotia who had served as Chairman of the Board of Governors of the University from 1848-1885. An early great benefactor of Dalhousie, his major contribution made this building possible.


The building was occupied in the fall of 1887 as the second home of Dalhousie College and University. It originally housed the entire university as it then was and over the years it has served departments and schools in virtually every faculty of Dalhousie. The building was named in 1919 after Dr. John Forrest, third President of Dalhousie University.

The Dalhousie Gazette, November 4, 1887, referring to the new building, said

"Every student must feel very sensibly the vast change effected in our condition within six months. Ugh! those old musty walls that left a stain on the clothes of the followers of Minerva! the strong savour of ancient days that pervaded the entire building! But now an air of comfort breathes through each handsome room of our new home, and might inspire with some degree of ambition the most unwilling student. . . . ""With regard to the new site, we understand that even its most bitter opposers are reconciled to the selection by the superior advantages of its central position. Distant enough from the noisy traders' seats to escape the din that formerly proved a serious hindrance to good work; near enough for any sake of convenience, what more could we desire? Let every true Dalhousian, then, hail with joy the new era that has dawned upon his Alma Mater."

In 1984 the Forrest Building was completely refurbished to accommodate the Schools of Nursing, Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy, in the Faculty of Health Professions. This restoration was made possible by the support of the Government and the people of Nova Scotia.

























































Last Ittill and Testament
