The San Diego Law Review thanks you for your excellent contribution to the Law of the Sea Symposium in the past. We feel honored to have been able to publish your work.



Dear Mrs. Borgese:

I hope you are making satisfactory progress on the article you are writing for possible publication in our Law of the Sea Symposium XI. Please let me know when you expect your article to be completed.

The San Diego Law Review prefers articles to be submitted in the following format:

1. Double-spaced or triple-spaced
2. 8-1/2 x 11 paper
3. Footnotes in Harvard Blue Book form
4. Footnotes at end of paper
5. Margins: 1 inch on sides
1-1/2 inches top and bottom

Please include with the manuscript an abstract of the article containing approximately 100 words.

I am enclosing two items which I hope will be of assistance to you. The first is a set of photocopies of pages 67-79 of the Harvard Blue Book. These pages relate to the citation of International Materials. I am sending them just in case you don't have available a copy of the Harvard Blue Book. We have found in the past that most errors made by our writers involved the citation of International Materials.

The second item I have enclosed is a "Guide to the Blue Book". This "Guide" was prepared for the use of our student writers, but I felt you might find it helpful as well.

When citing a source, please give us all the information you can about that source even if you are uncertain of the correct order or form of the information. If we have all the needed information, it will assist us in editing the footnotes.




