IOI at a glance

The International Ocean Institute, like the ocean, is dynamic. Since its establishment in Malta in 1972 the organisation has evolved reflecting changing issues and perspectives, but always adhering to its fundamental principles of peaceful management and conservation of oceans and their resources for the benefit of all.

President Joseph Warioba notes that during the 1970's IOI functioned as a think tank. During the 1980's great emphasis was placed on training and the number of alumni around the globe grew to over two thousand. During the 1990's the number of operational centers grew from two (Malta and Canada) to ten, and these new centers brought into play an additional dimension which focuses on institutional restructuring and regional capacity building.

Today IOI is led by Dr Gunnar Kullenberg a marine scientist of international reputation and former Executive Secretary of the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO in Paris. "IOI is no longer a centralised institution but a network of ten autonomous operational centers" notes Dr. Kullenberg. " I feel that the implications for the organisation have been positive as the expanding network has enriched IOI's perspectives by providing grassroots inputs that have tended to balance international concerns with local and national priorities."


The present newsletter is an attempt to keep members of the network in touch with each other while keeping costs of communication as low as possible.

Established In 1980 by Dr. Elisabeth Mann Borgese this center is located on the campus of Dalhousie University. Major activities include the annual ten week summer training program now in its 19th year. Course director for 1999 will be Dr. Noel Brown, Volume 15 of the Ocean Yearbook is being edited in cooperation with Dalhousie Law School and proceedings of the 1998 Pacem in Maribus Conference entitled : The Crisis of Knowledge: New Directions for Learning and Informed Decision-making for Oceans and Coasts will be published later this year in cooperation with the Centre for Foreign Policy Studies at Dalhousie. Under the chairmanship of Hon. Allan J. MacEachen, former Minister of External Affairs of the Government of Canada, a recently established Advisory Council will take an active role in focusing the attention of Canadians on issues of ocean governance.

Established in 1994 by a memorandum of understanding between the State Oceanic Administration of China and IOI this center has been very active. It has conducted four training programs bringing together sixty participants from twenty developing countries in Asia to examine such topics as Deep Seabed Mining and

Coastal Zone Management. In cooperation with 101 Japan, staff have carried out research on the impact of megacities on coastal areas. A two-day alumni workshop held in October 1998 brought together forty participants to plan future courses and publications.

Established in 1994 this center is located on the campus of the Universidad Nacional in Heredia, an institution with a long history of service and outreach to the people of Costa Rica. The center has experimented with training programs of both long and short duration. and it has hosted hearings for the World Commission and published course materials in Spanish for regional distribution. Staff are involved in the design and formulation of a Coastal Zone Management Plan for Costa Rica. In conjunction with this major undertaking, several workshops have been held in the Gulf of Nicoya area. More workshops scheduled to be held during 1999 focusing on issues of coastal zone management in this region. At the present time the center is publishing a brochure on the Caribbean.

Professor Derek Keats and introducing methods of preserving and restoring coastal ecolgy such as afforestation and mangrove regeneration. Efforts to improve the livelihood of the people through self-help and income generation activities are being explored. Based on the progress of the initial undertaking, a second project has been initiated in the state of Gujurat.

In August 1998 with the approval of the IOI Board and the Board of Governors of IIT Madras, the Foundation for Sustainable Development (India) was established. Managed by a Board of Trustees it has two divisions: a Center for Sustainable Development, and the IOI - Operational Center.

Dr. Rajagopalan hopes that this virtual center will play a catalytic role by using extensive networking, modern information technology and communication facilities to bring diverse expertise and knowledge together to solve problems of sustainable development.

Since its establishment in 1996, IOI - South Africa has conducted training courses on Seaweed Mariculture for Community Development, has taken a leadership role in the creation of an IOI website and has provided advice to the Government of Angola on community mariculture initiatives.

In March 1999 the center embarked on a new training initiative, MIDeSS, learn, a web-based integrated Coastal Management Training package. According to Professor Keats, the MIDeSS, learn component will provide web-based learning mate-

rials. The first module of MIDeSS learn to be developed during 1999 will be entitled "An Introduction to Integrated Coastal Management". The target audience includes mid-career decisionmakers who may wish to acquire or refresh a basic understanding of ICM principles, as well as undergraduate or postgraduate students of environmental management, coastal engineering or environmental law. Established in 1994, this center conducted several courses in French on the Management and Development of Small Scale Fisheries in Western Africa and published materials to acompany these courses. Research efforts have included the description and modelling of the coastline of western Africa including Mauritania, Gambia, Ivory Coast and Guinea-Bissau. In 1999 a two week course on Biodiversity of Marine and Coastal Ecosystems will be offered in Dakar.

News from Malta

In June 1998 Dr Krishan Saigal retired as Executive Director following five and one half years of distinguished service. During his term Dr. Saigal oversaw the successful completion of the United Nations Development Project which resulted in the establishment of operational centers in Madras, India; Dakar, Senegal; Heredia, Costa Rica: Suva, Fiji as well as Tianjiin, China and Yokohama, Japan. Two additional centers were established in South Africa in (1996) and Romania in (1997). Dr. Saigal noted that the IOI draws tremendous strengths from the new partner institutions with their considerable intellectual resources and he anticipated the challenge of developing a shared vision to ensure that 101 remains, flexible and responsive to the needs of all members of the network.

Dr. Gunnar Kullenberg who retired from UNESCO in April assumed leadership of IOI in June 1998. Since that time he has been active on many fronts including the representation of IOI at meetings of the United Nations Environment Program, the Fridtiof Nansen Institute in Norway and the National Open Forum in the United Kingdom. Considerable time has been devoted to outreach activities as well as familiarisation with the operational centers Several major project proposals have been presented to foundations and governments for funding.

Dr. Kullenberg and his staff took an active role in the 1998 meetings of the Planning Council and Governing Board held in Halifax, Canada from 25-28 November in conjunction with the 26th Pacem in Maribus Conference.

Highlights of decisions taken by the Board:

- approval of 1999 budget of US\$2.8 million
- approval of plans presented by IOI -South Pacific to host the 1999 Pacem in Maribus Conference in Fiji November 8-12. The theme will be Oceans in the New Millenium: Challenges and Opportunities for the Islands
- review and approval of individual workplans and budgets for nine centers
 outline of strategy for developing a shared vision to facilitate advance planning.

- preparation of a book of articles by alumni
- establishment of a public lecture series
- · preparation of a history of IO!
- preparation of a bibliography of IOI publications
- preparation of a Global Ocean Agenda

IOI - South Pacific was established in 1993 and operates under a Memorandum of Understanding with both the Government of Fiji and the University of the South Pacific. As a member of the IOI "family" of ten centers it serves principally the South Pacific region.

Two special seminars for leaders in government were conducted in Fiji in 1993 and in Papua New Guinea in 1996 and similar seminars are under consideration by the governments of Solomon Islands and Samoa. IOI-South Pacific's training program is merging with the broader training efforts of the Marine Studies Program.

The center plays a growing role in the areas of advocacy and marine awareness. Five village workshops have been held, resulting in a heightened marine awareness, which in turn, has reduced conflict in the divetourism industry and accelerated plans to develop Marine Conservation Areas in Fiji and to develop a village coastal monitoring program in Samoa.

According to Professor South, 1999 will be an exceptionally busy year with continutation of their marine awareness workshops in Fiji, the Introduction of a new certificate course is climate change, as well as a course on sponge identification and a workshop on seagrasses. Since its establishment in 1993 the IOI Operational Center in India has become a self - sustaining center with an established reputation in the region for high quality training, community development and publications.

IOI-India has trained and sensitised over 700 policy makers, civil servants, teachers and researchers in areas such as Coastal Zone Management, Deep Seabed Mining and Environmental Policy. The center has compiled data bases on individuals and institutions in the region concerned with ocean and coastal affairs and is in the process of establishing a library and documentation center.

In 1997 with funding from GTZ of Germany, the center initiated a two-year Ecovillages Project in cooperation with a local non governmental organisation, the ANAWIM Trust. In twenty coastal villages in the Tuticorin District of Tamil Nadu inhabited by dalits (depressed groups) center staff work to create awareness of ways of preserving the natural environment



Established in 1980 by Professor Elisabeth Mann Borgese, this centre is located at Dalhousie University. Major activities include the annual ten week training programme, now in its 19th year. This year's Course Director was Dr. Noel Brown, former head of UNEP in New York, and the programme was attended by 18 participants from 17 countries. During the course, a five-day training module was conducted on the Enhanced Role of Risk Management in Integrated Coastal Area Management. This module was produced as part of a larger, ongoing project to enhance the role of Risk Management in Coastal area Management, the next phase of which will include organising a workshop at the Bermuda Biological Station in February 2000. The training materials for the module will be presented there, as well as a background paper produced by IOI - Canada to complement case-studies

prepared by the other IOI centres.

Another major project is the UNEP/GPA News Forum, which is a dynamic, interactive news, information, and discussion service within the clearing-house mechanism of the Global Programme of Action for the Protection of the Marine Environment from Land-based Activities. IOI - Canada is currently executing this project. Staff from Halifax attended the launch at the Special Session of the UN General Assembly on Small Island Developing States, held in New York in September 1999. At the launch, both an Internet site and a hard-copy version were presented, providing delegates with a preview of the services and functions which this new initiative will be offering. The Internet site for the News Forum is http://gpanews.unep.org and readers are strongly encouraged to visit the site and participate in discussions by submitting articles and feedback.

Other ongoing activities include the editing of Ocean Yearbook, Volume 15 of which is currently being worked on in co-operation with the Dalhousie Law School. In addition, the recently established Advisory Council will be taking an active role in focusing the attention of Canadians on issues of ocean governance, under the Chairmanship of Hon. Allan J. MacEachen, former Minister of External Affairs of the Government of Canada.

PIM at a glance FORMAT FOR LATES

From November 8th to 12th, over 150 international and regional experts on the oceans will converge at the University of the South Pacific to attend an important conference on ocean governance and marine issues. The International Ocean Institute - South Pacific (IOI-SP) and the University of the South Pacific (USP) will host the twenty-seventh Pacem in Maribus Conference (PIM XXVII) at the Marine Studies Complex on the campus of USP in Suva, Fiji. The Rt. Hon. Ratu Sir Kamisese Mara, President of the Republic of Fiji will officially open the Conference November 8th. The theme of the conference is Oceans in the New Millenium: Challenges and Opportunities for Islands. Four plenary addresses and a series of panels have been designed to develop resolutions of relevance to small island developing states.

Previous PIM Conferences are considered milestone events in fostering understanding of threats to the world's oceans as well as the potential of ocean resources to sustain humankind. "PIM XXVII will provide a forum where the challenges of ocean space can be further considered in their interconnectedness and treated as a whole", notes Dr. Esther Williams, Chair of the PIM Secretariat. Special speakers during the conference include Mr. Tamarii Tutangata from Samoa who will deliver the first keynote address "UNCED + 5: A Vision of the Future for Islands" while H.E. Tuiloma Neroni Slade will address the second plenary "Developments since UNCED and Barbados" on Tuesday morning. That evening, Professor Guido de Marco, President of Malta will deliver a public lecture. For more details contact http://www.usp.ac.filioi.



Network News

Several projects launched this year will involve most of our centers, notes Dr Gunnar Kullenberg, Executive Director. In May 1999 an agreement was signed by IOI and the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP)/Global Program of Action for the production of /a News Forum, a dynamic and interactive news information and discussion service. Since then, IOI-Canada has taken a lead role in the design and implementation of the project and Ms. Ying Watt has been responsible for much of the preparatory work which inleuded soliciting written articles on marine pollution from various centers for inclusion in future issues. The GPA Clearing-House and News Forum is now online. Check out the online edition at " http://www.gpa.unep.org".

Another new project on Risk Assessment is underway in cooperation with Swiss Reinsurance Company of Zurich. At the present time, one training module has been tested, during the 1999 course in Halifax. Additional case studies and background materials will be produced by operational centers for presentation at the Bermuda Biological Station in February 2000.

A recent grant of one million Swiss francs to the IOI has launched a program on Women and the Sea. These funds will be used to enhance participation of women in all IOI activities.

The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) confirmed in June 1999 its ongoing support to IOI by announcing a grant of CA\$ 594,000, to cover the period April 1999 to March 2002.

IOI headquarters hosted meetings of the Executive Committee of the Board, and Directors of Operational Centers from 1-6 June 1999.

The meetings included a review of the activities of all centers; an assessment of finances; and planning for major activities to be undetaken in 2000 and 2001.

The meetings agreed on the following actions:

- launching of an IOI Youth Program, possibly in cooperation with the Hellenic Marine Environment Protection Association (HELMEPA).
- preparation of a book on IOI Alumni
- preparation of poster presentations by all centers at 1999 PIM Conference
- launching of a dynamic marketing campaign
- preparation of an overview of coastal zone areas where IOI centers are active
- preparation of a history of IOI
- preparation of a bibliography of IOI publications



Tribute to Arvid Pardo

Arvid Pardo, the father of the contemporary Law of the Sea, the inspirer of Pacem in Maribus and the International Ocean Institute, died on July 19, 1999 in Seattle, Washington, after a long illness. He was 85 years of age.


Most of his creative work was accomplished by 1974, when he was forced to leave the Foreign Service of his home country, Malta. Most of his ideas from this era can be found in *The Common Heritage of Mankind*, published by the Malta University Press in 1974.

After 1974, Arvid Pardo joined the faculty of the University of Southern California in Los Angeles where he taught international relations and law of the sea until his retirement in 1984.


Although deeply disappointed with the results and the aftermath of UNCLOS III, he remained a faithful participant and wise counsellor of Pacem in Maribus and all other activities of the International Ocean Institute. We owe him a profound debt which we can repay only by trying to continue, develop and propagate his great ideas.

Though little known to the world at large, Arvid Pardo was one of the great men of the twentieth century who has contributed decisively to shaping the world of the twenty-first. He had an encylopaedic mind and, like most men of genius, a complex temperament, phlegmatic and intensely productive at the same time, committed and detached; idealistic and realistic; revolutionary and conservative; religious and cynical. His disappearance marks the end of an era.

Darlene started this fax but has now had to go, so I've inherited it. Ying has also passed on some comments, and left for the day, so I hope I can finish without misrepresenting anyone! I'm slightly concerned about the legibility of some of the comments which we've added to the original, so I'll also go through and see if anything needs spelling out further...

Comments from Ying: (1) UNEP/GPA News Forum needs to be italicised; (2) there isn't consistency in spacing between IOI and Operational Centre name, i.e IOI-Canada or IOI - Canada; (iii) there's also inconsistency in the use of numbering, e.g. IOI - Canada section refers to 18 participants, whereas IOI - China section spells out "one hundred"; (iv) the official IOI portfolio uses "centres" rather than "centers". She would also like you to drop the reference to her on p.2 so that it reads: "Since then, IOI - Canada has taken a lead role in the design and

implementation of the project. Ongoing work in the Operational Centres includes soliciting news articles on the implementation of the GPA." In addition, she said it should state that the contract was signed by IOI and the UNEP/GPA Coordination Office (spelling it out in full since it's the first time it's mentioned).

It's sometimes hard to tell whether there's a problem with double-spacing or whether it's just the effect of the justification. A search for double spacing would be quicker than wading through all the Xs we've added! It might also be worth doing one for space colon.

Maybe we could keep coming up with things if we kept looking at it, but I think that covers most of it - and no doubt there's far more than you wanted! Apologies for creating extra work for you not the ideal way to spend a Thanksgiving Weekend, particularly as you must already have put a lot of time and effort into this. But it's nice that we've got a new issue of Across the Oceans, so I hope you feel the headache is worth it...

Network News

Several projects launched this year will involve most of our centers, notes Dr Gunnar Kullenberg, Executive Director. In May 1999 an agreement was signed by IOI and the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) Global Program of Action Coordination Office to develop a News Forum, a dynamic and interactive news information and discussion service. Since then, IOI-Canada has taken a lead role in the design and implementation of the project. Work is ongoing in other operational centers including the soliciting of news articles on the implementation of the GPA. The GPA Clearing-House and News Forum is now online Check out the online edition at: http://gpa.unep.org

Another new project on Risk Assessment is underway in cooperation with Swiss Reinsurance Company of Zurich. At the present time, one training module has been tested during the 1999 course in Halifax. Additional case studies and background materials will be produced by operational centers for presentation at the Bermuda Biological Station in February 2000.

A recent grant of one million Swiss francs to the IOI has launched a program on Women and the Sea. These funds will be used to enhance participation of women in all IOI activities.

After 1974, Arvid Pardo joined the faculty of the University of Southern California in Los Angeles where he taught international relations and law of the sea until his retirement in 1984.

Although deeply disappointed with the results and the aftermath of UNCLOS III, he remained a faithful participant and wise counsellor of Pacem in Maribus and all other activities of the International Ocean Institute. We owe him a profound debt which we can repay only by trying to continue, develop and propagate his great ideas.

Though little known to the world at large, Arvid Pardo was one of the great men of the twentieth century who has contributed decisively to shaping the world of the twenty-first. He had an encylopaedic mind and, like most men of genius, a complex temperament, phlegmatic and intensely productive at the same time, committed and detached; idealistic and realistic; revolutionary and conservative; religious and cynical. His disappearance marks the end of an era.


Total Income for 1998 \$US 1,365,860



Grants & Donations 48%


In Kind Contributions 52%

The International Ocean Institute - South Pacific (IOI-SP) and the University of the South Pacific (USP) will host the twenty-seventh Pacem in Maribus Conference (PIM XXVII) at the Marine Studies Complex on the campus of USP in Suva. Fiji. The Rt. Hon. Ratu Sir Kamisese Mara. President of the Republic of Fiji will officially open the Conference November 8th. The theme of the conference is Oceans in the New Millenium: Challenges and Opportunities for Islands. Four plenary addresses and a series of panels have been designed to develop resolutions of relevance to small island developing states.

Previous PIM Conferences are considered milestone events in fostering understanding of threats to the world's oceans as well as the potential of ocean resources to sustain humankind. Several projects launched this year will involve most of our centers notes Dr Gunnar Kullenberg, Executive Director. In May 1999 an agreement was signed by IOI and the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) Global Program of Action for the production of a News Forum, a dynamic and interactive news information and discussion service. Since then, IOI-Canada has taken a lead role in the design and implementation of the project and Ms. Ying Watt has been responsible for much of the preparatory work which inleuded soliciting written articles on marine pollution from various centers for inclusion in future issues. Another new project on Risk Assessment is underway in cooperation with Swiss Reinsurance Company of Zurich. At the present time, one training module has been tested during the 1999 course in Halifax. A recent grant of one million Swiss francs to the IOI has launched a program on Women and the Sea . These funds will be used to enhance participation of women in all IOI activities.

The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) confirmed in June 1999 its ongoing support to IOI by announcing a grant of CA\$ 594,000. to cover the period April 1999 to March 2002.

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
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

We have several suggestions for the overall document – most of which are intended to make the style of the document more consistent.


- ► The IOI logo is shadowed on some pages and not on others. You can either add the shadow on pages 1, 2 and 3 or remove it from pages 4 – 8.
- The lines between the columns do not extend far enough on the top on pages 2, 5, 6 and 7.
- The column margins vary a bit from page to page, especially on page 4 where there is no margin on the right of the first column and none on the left of the second column.

- I've filled in the missing information in places where there were "?s" and checked the contact information for the centres. I have indicated the information that we have in our office that is different from yours. It is difficult to keep the list up to date since the centres don't always notify us of changes. If you know your information is more accurate please let us know.
- The margins around the gray boxes vary from page to page, especially on page 4 where there is no left margin at all. Can you lengthen and narrow the box to increase the margin?

New Project

Establishing IOI as a virtual university is extremely ambitious, challenging, and innovative according to Professor Elisabeth Mann Borgese, who originally introduced the idea to the Novemeber 1999 meeting of the Governing Board. A report will be presented to the June 2000 meeting of the Executive Committee outlining how to implement such a project which may have enormous impact on IOI's education and training activities in all eleven operational centers. Members of the working group include Professor Borgese, Dr.Yankov, Professor Fuse and directors of operational centers in India, South Africa and Fiji.

This initiative responds to a number of challenges and new opportunities such as:

- the interdisciplinary character of contemporary knowledge which transcends the departmental divisions of traditional universities
- the globalization of the communications revolution
- the financial constraints on students especially in developing countries
- the financial constraints on academic institutions around the world resulting in downsizing and privatization of universities

The report will outline how IOI can continue to respond to training and education needs of people, especially in developing countries who are working in ocean sectors.

Dr. Gunnar Kullenberg and staff in Malta play a pivotal part in the effective functioning of the expanding network of operational centers. As Secretary of the Governing Board Dr. Kullenberg reports-the following decisions from the 1999 annual meeting in Fiji:

- approved 2000 budget of US\$ three million
- reviewed workplans from 11 operational centers
- introduced new programs to focus on women and youth
- approved the Danielle St. Jorre Scholarship
- endorsed the proposal to establish IOI as a Virtual University
- endorsed projects to honour Arvid Pardo.

In addition to the preparation for and participation in the Fiji meetings and PIM conference, the Executive Director represented IOI at the Workshop on Coastal Megacities in Hangzhou, China in September; a seminar on Shipping and Pollution in Malacca in October 1999 and he visited IOI Operational Centers in Japan and China. In November he visited UNEP's Regional Office in Bangok and IMO in London in December.

During the coming year IOI will continue to work with institutions and individuals who share our mission and aspirations notes Dr. Kullenberg. A new memorandum of understanding has been signed to continue IOI's role in the creation of UNEP News Forum, an online website which was launched in September 1999. Visit the site at: http:/ gpanews.unep.org. Phase two of a project on risk assessment in cooperation with Swiss Reinsurance Company of Zurich is scheduled to get underway later this year. A workshop on Risk Assessment and Disaster Mitigation was held at the Bermuda Biological Station February

14-15 2000. The workshop provided an opportunity for experts from the insurance industry to meet marine scientists to discuss risk management issues of common interest in order to identify solutions and increase awareness as well as to prepare material for training modules directed at specific target groups. Visit IOI's website www.ioinst.org. for a summary of the workshop. While both of these projects have been under the leadership of IOI - Canada, they have involved other centers as well, notes Dr. Kullenberg. IOI has recently signed a partnership agreement with UNESCO to help promote 2000 as the International Year for the Culture of Peace.

Network wide projects focusing on women and youth will eventually involve all our centers notes Dr. Kullenberg. This year approximately US\$ 150,000 from the Women & the Sea donation will provide support directly to women who are working at grass roots levels in poor and disadvantaged coastal communities. For example, in Costa Rica IOI is working with displaced women in the Gulf of Nicoya area, whereas in India funds have been designated to install toilets in several coastal villages in the Tuticorn district of Tamil Nadu. In Kenya IOI is working with women to promote mariculture of seaweed near Mombasa and in Southern Africa IOI has already been instrumental in the formation of a seaweed mariculture company operated by women in St. Helena's Bay area. In Fiji, a three year project focusing on women and fisheries will conduct special training courses as well as a regional conference on the role of women in the marine sector. In Canada, scholarships will be provided to women who wish to attend the annual summer program at Dalhousie University. In Senegal the IOI is workingto improve conditions of women in Kayar who work in seafood processing.

Law of the Sea, Agenda 21 and its Implementation, a ten week training program for 18 participants will be conducted from May 29 to August 14. In its 20th year, the course will be directed by Dr. Noel Brown, former head of UNEP's Regional Office in New York. Guest lecturers will include Ambassador Allan Beesley of Canada and Ambassador Neroni Slade from Samoa.

Building on a 1997 seminar organized in cooperation with IUCN for the benefit of delegates to the International Seabed Authority in Kingston, Jamaica,, 101 - Canada sponsored a seminar March 24-26 attended by thirty four delegates. The purpose of the workshop was not to discuss manganese nodules but rather to inform delegates of new emerging resources such as polymetallic crusts and sulphides, methane hydrates and genetic resources co-habiting in these areas of the deep seabed. At present, these new scientific and technological developments are taking place outside and quite independently of the International Seabed Authority.



Entries should be submitted to IOI headquarters by end of June 2000. The award will consist of publication of the study, and a prize of five thousand dollars.


Danielle de St. Jorre Scholarhip

New Project

Establishing IOI as a virtual university is extremely ambitious, challenging and innovative according to Professor Elisabeth Mann Borgese, who originally introduced the idea to the Novemeber 1999 meeting of the Governing Board. 



New Project

Establishing IOI as a virtual university is extremely ambitious, challenging and innovative according to Professor Elisabeth Mann Borgese, who originally introduced the idea to the November 1999 meeting of the Governing Board. A report will be presented to the June 2000 meeting of the Executive Committee outlining how to implement such a project which may have enormous impact on IOI's education and training activities in all eleven operational centers. Members of the working group include Professor Borgese, Dr.Yankov, Professor Fuse and directors of operational centers in India, South Africa and Fiji.

This initiative responds to a number of challenges and new opportunities such as:

- the interdisciplinary character of contemporary knowledge which transcends the departmental divisions of traditional universities
- the globalization of the communications revolution;
- the financial constraints on students especially in developing countries;
- the financial constraints on academic institutions around the world resulting in downsizing and privatization of universities

The report will outline how IOI can continue to respond to training and education needs of people, especially in developing countries who are working in ocean sectors.

Dr. Gunnar Kullenberg and staff in Malta play a pivotal part in the effective functioning of the expanding network of operational centers. As Secretary of the Governing Board Dr. Kullenberg reports the following decisions from the 1999 annual meeting in Fiji:

approved 2000 budget of US\$ three million;

reviewed workplans from 11 operational centers;

 introduced new programs to focus on women and youth;

 approved the Danielle St. Jorre Scholarship

endorsed the proposal to establish IOI as a Virtual University;

 endorsed projects to honour Arvid Pardo.

In addition to the preparation for and participation in the Fiji meetings and PIM conference, the Executive Director represented IOI at the Workshop on Coastal Megacities in Hangzhou, China in September; a seminar on Shipping and Pollution in Malacca in October 1999 and he visited IOI Operational Centers in Japan and China. In November he visited UNEP's Regional Office in Bangok and IMO in London in December.

During the coming year IOI will continue to work with institutions and individuals who share our mission and aspirations notes Dr. Kullenberg. A new memorandum of understanding X has been signed to continue IOI's role in the creation of UNEP News Forum, an online website which was launched in September 1999. Visit the site at: http:// gpanews.unep.org. Phase two of a project on risk assessment in cooperation with Swiss Reinsurance X Company of Zurich is scheduled to get underway later this year. A workshop on Risk Assessment and Disaster Mitigation was held at the Bermuda Biological Station, February for Research

14-15, 2000. The workshop provided an opportunity for experts from the insurance industry to meet marine scientists to discuss risk management issues of common interest in order to identify solutions and increase awareness as well as to prepare material for training modules directed at specific target groups. Visit IOI's website www.ioinst.org. for a summary of the workshop. While both of these projects have been under the leadership of IOI - Canada, they have involved other centers as well, notes Dr. Kullenberg. IOI has recently signed a partnership agreement with UNESCO to help promote 2000 as the International Year for the Culture of Peace.

Network wide projects focusing on women and youth will eventually involve all our centers notes Dr. Kullenberg. This year approximately US\$ 150,000 from the Women & the Sea donation will provide support directly to women who are working at grass roots levels in poor and disadvantaged coastal communities. For example, in Costa Rica IOI is working with displaced women in the Gulf of Nicoya area, whereas in India Xfunds have been designated to install y toilets in several coastal villages in the Tuticorn district of Tamil Nadu. In Kenya IOI is working with women to promote mariculture of seaweed near Mombasa and in Southern Africa IOI has already been instrumental in the formation of a seaweed mariculture company operated by women in St. Helena's Bay area. In Fiji, a three year project focusing on women and fisheries will conduct special training courses as well as a regional conference on the role of women in the marine sector. In Canada, scholarships will be provided to women who wish to attend the annual summer program at Dalhousie University. In Senegal the IOI is working to improve conditions of women in Kayar who work in seafood processing.

Law of the Sea, Agenda 21 and its Implementation, a ten week training program for 18 participants will be conducted from May 29 to August 14. In its 20th year, the course will be directed by Dr. Noel Brown, former head of UNEP's Regional Office in New York. 
Since 1998, IOI functions as a division of the Foundation for Sustainable Develpment (Inida) located on the campus of IIT in Madras. The Eco-Village Project, funded since 1997 by GTZ (Germany) was carried out in forty disadvantaged coastal villages in Tamil Nadu. The project focuses on women, since they are under greater pressure. While IOI provides all the supervision, monitoring, informational and technical support, another local ngo (Aswain Trust) actually carries out the work in the villages. Activities have included formation of self help groups with over 1100 members; planting of more than 4000 saplings; distribution of over 200 fuel efficent stoves; and building of four rainwater harvesting tanks. With further funding from JFGE (Japan) much of the earlier activities will continue while additional activities will include village level mass awareness programs, cleaning campaigns, planting of community gardens on unused government land and creation of a cultural troupe consisting mainly of village women to create awareness through song and street plays about water conservation. Vermiculture has been introduced in two villages and the production of spirulina continues in several

rial. The focus of this research is the local community and its knowledge syste with reference to plant genetic resources. A field area in the Eastern Ghats of Tamil Nadu has been chosen for primary data collection. Three issues of the project newsletter "People, Plants and Resources" have been published and are available from this center.

A six month project funded by the World bank will document, collate and critically review the available studies on the private health sector in India. In addition, a new project with the support of the Boston MIT branch of ASHA (an organization of Indians in the USA) is hoping to bring fundamental changes to the lives of 70 of the most deserving children in the coastal villages by providing for health and education needs as well as talent promotion and computer awareness.

This center hopess to co-sponsor a workshop with the Center for Scientific Research in Auroville, India which will explore such topics as afforestation, cost-effective shelters biogas, wind and solar technology and affordable ways to recycle waste water.

Past recipients of the award have included Katoh Shidzue, who pioneered the way for women to enter politics, did much to raise their social status and was instrumental in inviting Margaret Sanger to Japan to teach Japanese women family planning; Ogata Sadako, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees; and Muhammad Yunus, founder of the Grameen (Bangladesh) for helping the poorest of the poor to regain self confidence and rebuild their family and life.

Ozaki Yukio (1858-1954) is respected as a man of principle whose life was given to the cause of democracy and popular government. He shared Professor Borgese's passion for world federation.

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
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

THE FIJI DECLARATION ON ISLANDS IN THE NEW MILLENNIUM

The 187 participants from 30 countries gathered in Suva, Fiji on November 8 – 12th, 1999 to celebrate Pacem in Maribus XXVII, have agreed on the following conclusions and recommendations.

CONCLUSIONS

Peoples of the Pacific Islands are custodians of some thirty-three million square kilometers of the Pacific Ocean, approximately one twelfth of the Earth's ocean space. Yet the twenty-two countries and territories, with a total population of almost seven million occupy less than 5,000 square kilometers of this vast space. The Pacific Island peoples, whose intricate knowledge of navigation and of their ocean and coastal environments is woven into the very fabric of their culture and language, have settled the Pacific Islands over the last three and and thousand years. At no time in the past have they faced greater challenges and opportunities than those prevalent on the eve of the third millennium.

The theme for this Conference, *PACEM IN MARIBUS XXVII* was—*Oceans in the New Millennium: Challenges and Opportunities for the Islands.* The Conference examined challenges and opportunities for the world's island states since the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED; 1992) and the Barbados Declaration (1994), both of which have enormous implications for the small island developing states (SIDS) world-wide, and specifically for the SIDS of the Pacific. At the dawn of the new millennium SIDS are faced with many challenges and opportunities; challenges, some of which are beyond their control, and opportunities which may give hope for their future. Burgeoning human population, pollution of inshore waters, overfishing, unregulated coastal development, climate change and potential sea-level rise threaten the peoples' livelihoods and, indeed, the very survival of their fragile island states.

Boundary Issues in the South Pacific | Bold

For the island states, their EEZs represent their most significant sources of future wealth and security. As Parties to UNCLOS, they have an obligation to survey their EEZs. Those states with EEZ boundaries that still need to be delimitated should enter into negotiations with their neighbouring states as soon as practicable with a view to reaching agreement on finalised boundaries. The EEZ regimes under UNCLOS also form the framework for negotiation of agreements on the management and conservation of South Pacific tuna stocks, which supply 50 per cent of the world's canned tuna market. Pacific Island states have the right to participate in the harvest of the resources and to expect other participants to ensure that the total harvest is sustainable, and that stocks are protected. Island states have expressed concern over the transboundary shipment of hazardous, toxic or high level radioactive waste.

(Revitalisation of the Regional Seas Programme)

There is a need to revitalise the Regional Seas Programme in line with major changes in the UN system and to ensure its responsiveness to regional priorities. Current efforts in this direction by UNEP under the leadership of its Executive Director, Dr. Toepfer, are most appreciated. The sectoral approach needs to be changed to a cross-sectoral approach that integrates land, water, and ecosystem management, and the overriding concept of sustainable development needs to be incorporated. The focus needs to be placed on individual states in adopting policy, institutional, and legal reforms necessary to implement the sectoral, integrated approach. For the island states, there is also a need to develop regional marine technology ventures where appropriate technology development and transfer can be facilitated. Human capacity development and institution building must underpin any such technology transfer. The Pacific Island states have demonstrated a high degree of success in regional cooperation in the higher education sector. The University of the South Pacific, which manifests this regional cooperation, provides a ready base as well as excellent prospects for a regional centre for marine scientific and technological research and development, as mandated under UNCLOS.

Traditional Marine Tenure and the Empowerment of Resource Owners Coastal resources in most Island states are under various forms of traditional stewardship. With the advent of the cash economy and the imposition of inappropriate 'modern' resource management systems, there is an urgent need to develop co-management mechanisms in which the traditional owners, especially women, in partnership with other major social development factors must play a key role in the sustainable management of their resources.

International Seabed Authority and Deep Sea Mining in the South Pacific

Deep sea mining has the potential to be a major issue for SIDS, and a number of the
South Pacific states have valuable mineral deposits within their territorial waters and
EEZs. Island states could play a major role in the development of mechanisms whereby
their people will benefit from the long-term benefits of deep-sea mining within their
EEZs. Most SIDS lack the capacity to engage in seabed mining individually. One of the
major responsibilities of the International Seabed Authority is to see to it that developing
countries, including SIDS, are enabled to participate in these activities and share the

benefits. In particular it is very important that regional organisations play a coordinating role in offshore mineral development. Although Pacific Island states have mineral potential, they lack offshore mineral policy and legislation which should be implemented. The importance of marine scientific research in the knowledge gathered so far and the part that it will play in the future should be highlighted.

The Oceanic Environment

Ocean observation systems are important in the vast ocean areas surrounding SIDS. These ocean systems drive the world's climate, and in turn the SIDS are highly vulnerable to the long-term effects of climate change and seal level rise. The frequency of cyclones and El Ninõ-Southern Oscillation are changing, and Ocean Observation Systems as a means of improving our understanding of the world's climate are important. While SIDS have little capacity for participation in ocean observation systems it must be recognised that they have the right to participate. There is a need to find mechanisms whereby they can participate and benefit from them and the results must be deposited in the region.

Regional Security

SIDS have little capacity for surveillance and enforcement of their rules and regulations in their vast EEZs and continental shelves. This problem can only be solved through enhanced cooperative monitoring, surveillance, and control.

Disaster Preparedness

SIDS are particularly vulnerable to natural and human induced disasters. Risk management and disaster preparedness and mitigation are integral in integrated ocean and coastal management. They should be pursued both on a regional, national and community basis.

Marine Biodiversity and Bioprospecting

SIDS are custodians of some of the world's most important biodiversity in their marine ecosystems. Their obligations towards the protection of this biodiversity are a priority under the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity. In exploiting their tuna resource, island states need to ensure conservation of marine biodiversity by issuing licenses for equipment that avoids death of by-catch species. Since most of the coral reefs are under the stewardship of the people there is an onus placed upon them to ensure their protection for future generations. Bioprospecting of tropical marine organisms is a fast growing trend, with developed states seeking discoveries of biologically active compounds from marine organisms of SIDS. The island peoples are seeking mechanisms whereby they can protect their intellectual property rights, so they can benefit from them in a sustainable manner.

RECOMMENDATIONS

PIM XXVII recognises the pivotal role played by the SIDS in their individual and collective roles in the sustainable development of their coastal and ocean resources. It is **recommended** that:

- 1. SIDS should strengthen their collaboration in the development of regional and national strategies necessary for the implementation of the post-UNCED Agreements and Conventions to which they are Parties, and to the principles contained in the Barbados Programme of Action.
- 2. Human resources development in the marine sector continues to be a priority for the foreseeable future. Global, regional and national organisations should continue to develop appropriate training with the goal of rendering SIDS self-sufficient in human resources in the marine sector. The experience of IOI and in particular the results of the capacity building and training programmes carried out by IOI operational centres, may be appropriate in the implementation of these recommendations.
- 3. Marine scientific research should be pursued in a cooperative mode, and efforts in basic education on the marine environment should be strengthened.

For the Pacific SIDS it is recommended that:

- 4. They intensify coordinated regional and national marine awareness activities that involve all components of society.
- 5. The South Pacific Forum, through the Council of Regional Organisations of the Pacific (CROP) Marine Sector Working Group (MSWG) and the IOI-South Pacific Operational Centre develop an Oceans Policy for the Pacific Islands, which can be adapted to ocean policy development at the national level.

Recognising that their EEZs represent a significant source of future wealth and security of SIDS, it is **recommended** that:

- 6. SIDS which have the potential to claim extended continental shelf beyond the 200 miles should, bearing in mind the ten-year period established by UNCLOS, undertake the lodging of claims for these boundaries. Coastal states should move forward rapidly with the delineation of the baselines from which the various jurisdictional zones under UNCLOS are measured and deposit the appropriate charts and list of coordinates with the United Nations. Technical assistance should be sought from developed states to complete the necessary surveys within the given time frame.
- 7. Individual states be responsible for promoting the mapping of the boundaries of their EEZs.
- 8. A precautionary approach be taken to the management of deep-water fisheries, including conservation of marine biodiversity through routine utilisation of techniques that avoid by-catch losses and the incorporation of these techniques into license agreements with distant fishing nations.
- 9. Through the South Pacific Forum Fisheries Agency SIDS cooperate in enhancing mechanisms for joint surveillance and enforcement.

For the Pacific SIDS it is recommended that:

10. The Pacific SIDS establish procedures for the expeditious implementation of the consent regime for marine scientific research in accordance with the UNCLOS

provisions, and adopt international or regional models (e.g. the UN model guidelines on marine scientific research, and the SOPAC guidelines in the Soons report). The regime should take into account the interests of the coastal state in having its nationals participate in the research and obtaining research data and samples in conducting marine scientific activities in the EEZ and on the continental shelf of that state.

Recognising that there is a need to revitalise the Regional Seas Programme in line with major changes in the UN system, it is **recommended** that for the Pacific SIDS:

- 11. The South Pacific Regional Environment Programme's role be strengthened to facilitate increased participation in the Regional Seas Programme to promote regional cross-sectoral approaches to ocean and coastal management, and regional implementation of the Global Programme of Action, based on local and national actions. The role should also include assistance to each island state in adopting policy, institutional and legal reforms to implement the new cross-sectoral approaches to land, water, and ecosystem management.
- 12. The Pacific SIDS establish a mechanism for the development of an appropriate marine technology centre, dedicated to relevant technology transfer from the developed to the developing world, addressing the needs for implementation of international agreements.

PIM XXVII confirms that there is an urgent need to develop co-management mechanisms in which the traditional owners in partnership with other major social development factors can play a key role in the sustainable management of their resources. It recommends that:

- 13. Cultural and traditional aspects be incorporated into the techniques used to manage and protect marine resources, and these techniques be built into baseline surveys.
- 14. Existing and historical information from local fishers, who live and work around shallow-water areas be documented and assembled for use by scientists and management and regional agencies assume responsibility for assembling and disseminating this information.
- 15. New management strategies be developed which draw upon the foundations of traditional use and practices and incorporate the understanding and procedures developed through relevant science and technology, to address stresses on coastal ecosystems. These strategies should consider, *inter alia*
- ♦ Pollution from sewage, fertilisers, biocides, toxic wastes, oil spills, solid wastes, freshwater runoff and other land-based sources of pollution
- ♦ Increased human population resulting in greater demands on marine resources
- Siltation due to soil erosion from inappropriately conducted land use practices (agriculture, forestry, mining, road-building, site clearance)
- Over-exploitation of coral reef resources (for example commercially valuable species such as bêche-de-mer, giant clams, trochus, certain fish and shellfish, live coral and

ornamental fish harvesting for the aquarium and tourist trade, mining coral heads for construction, subsistence fishing pressure)

- Destructive fishing and collecting methods (poisons, explosives)
- ♦ Land reclamation (including mangrove and reef flat destruction), inappropriate coastal protection works, and unsound mariculture practices
- ♦ Coastal and marine development projects progressing without environmental impact assessment (EIA) or with inadequate EIAs
- Channel blasting and dredging activities
- Mining of beach and reef materials
- Coastal erosion and accretion
- Tourism activities and related developments
- Military testing, training and dumping (including nuclear testing and munitions disposal)
- ♦ Catastrophic events such as tropical cyclones, volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, tsunamis, coral bleaching, crown-of-thorns starfish infestations, severe El Niño-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) events, and possible climate change and sea-level rise.
- 16. Co-management systems include insurance companies through their experts in risk management and disaster preparedness and mitigation.
- 17. All traditional resource owners and users, including women and young persons, should be involved in the planning, decision-making and implementation of appropriate co-management regimes in the coastal environment.

PIM XXVII recognises that deep sea mining has the potential to be a major issue for the SIDS, and recognises the responsibility of the International Seabed Authority to enhance the participation of developing countries, including SIDS, in activities relating to seabed mining and to assure them of their equitable share of the benefits, and **recommends** that:

- 18. Measures be taken to avoid impacts of offshore mining on the marine environment
- 19. Recognising the unique nature of the biota associated with active hydrothermal zones, activities of marine scientific research and industry should ensure that there is an adequate understanding of the communities and the impacts of any associated mineral exploration and exploitation.
- 20. The collection of baseline environmental data be a condition of any exploration licence
- 21. Coastal states adopt a proactive approach to all significant decision making activities related to environmental concerns respecting offshore mineral exploration and exploitation.
- 22. SIDS consider taking regional action to ensure that they obtain equitable benefits from foreign access to minerals in their EEZ.
- 23. Comprehensive offshore mineral policy and legislation should be developed by states.
- 24. The Seabed Authority should be encouraged to keep up with scientific discoveries and technological developments and adjust the scope of its activities to a changing reality.

PIM XXVII recognises that ocean observation systems are important in the vast ocean areas surrounding SIDS. A Pacific Global Ocean Observing System (PacificGOOS) was approved by the UNESCO/IOC Assembly in 1997, and by the South Pacific Applied Geoscience Commission's Governing Council in 1997. Important beneficiaries of PacificGOOS are fisheries, coastal management, and weather and climate forecasts. SIDS have little capacity for participation in ocean observation systems, and need to find mechanisms whereby they can participate and benefit from them. It is recommended that:

- 25. An inventory be made of GOOS related data being collected in the region by national and regional organisations, and by states and organisations outside the region, to facilitate development of a GOOS strategy.
- 26. Priority be given to increase observation activities aimed at improved weather and climate forecasting, sustainable and financially beneficial fisheries management, sustainable coastal management and at reducing risks from extreme climate events.
- 27. Awareness building and training programs be established to support PacificGOOS covering monitoring, development and use of end products, data management and modelling using existing arrangements where possible, such as existing regional organisations, the National Tidal Facility training activities and the proposed Asia Pacific Network workshop on developing climate indicators for extreme events.

PIM XXVII recognises that SIDS are custodians of some of the world's most important marine biodiversity. The island peoples are seeking mechanisms whereby the can protect their intellectual property rights, and whereby they can benefit from them in a sustainable manner. It is **recommended** that:

- 28. In accordance with the UN Convention on Biological Diversity, SIDS with the assistance of relevant regional organisations, should develop national regimes governing access to marine genetic resources, in order to prevent appropriation of their knowledge and genetic resources.
- 29. The biotic resources in the coastal zones of SIDS, including their EEZs, be documented.
- 30. Human resources development in marine biodiversity and marine bioprospecting be a priority for SIDS. It should focus on training in marine systematics so that people will better understand the nature of their genetic resources and be able to better develop measures for their conservation and sustainable use.
- 31. Priority be given to documenting rapidly disappearing traditional knowledge of marine biodiversity.
- 32. Pacific Island states need to implement their National Environment Management Strategies developed in preparation for UNCED.
- 33. There is a need for a regional policy on Marine Biodiversity Research and Bioprospecting.
- 34. The establishment of Marine Protected Areas must be a priority for all SIDS in order to conserve coastal biodiversity.

PIM XXVII emphasises that;

35. In all these action areas existing regional cooperation mechanisms be used in harmony with local and national authorities and NGOs. International NGOs such as the IOI may be used as facilitators or independent advisors when required and appropriate.



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Dr. Gunnar Kullenberg and the staff in Malta play a pivotal part in the effective functioning of the expanding network of operational centers. As Secretary of the Governing Board Dr. Kullenberg reports-the following decisions from the 1999 annual meeting in Fiji:

- approved 2000 budget of US\$ three million;
- reviewed the workplans from the 11 operational centers:
- introduced new programs to focus on women and youth;
- approved the Danielle St. Jorre Scholarship;
- endorsed the proposal to establish IOI as a Virtual University; and
- endorsed projects to honour Arvid Pardo.

In addition to the preparation for and participation in the Fiji meetings and PIM conference, the Executive Director represented IOI at a workshop on Coastal Megacities in Hangzhou, China in September and a seminar on Shipping and Pollution in Malacca in October 1999. He visited the IOI Operational Centers in Japan and China. In November he visited UNEP's Regional Office in Bangkok and in December he visited IMO in London.

During the coming year, IOI will continue to work with institutions and individuals who share our mission and aspirations notes Dr. Kullenberg. A new memorandum of understanding has been signed to continue IOI's role in the development of UNEP News Forum, an online news and information service that was launched in September 1999. Visit the site at: http://gpanews.unep.org. Phase two of a project on risk assessment in cooperation with Swiss Reinsurance Company of Zurich is scheduled to get underway later this year. Phase one of this project culminated with a workshop

on Risk Assessment and Disaster Mitigation held at the Bermuda Biological Station for Research on February 14-15 2000. The workshop provided an opportunity for experts from the insurance industry to meet marine scientists to discuss risk management issues of common interest in order to identify solutions and increase awareness as well as to prepare material for training modules directed at specific target groups. Visit IOI's website www.ioinst.org. for a summary of the workshop. While both of these projects have been under the leadership of IOI -Canada, they have involved other centers as well, notes Dr. Kullenberg. 101 has recently signed a partnership agreement with UNESCO to help promote the year 2000 as the International Year for the Culture of Peace.

Network wide projects focusing on women and youth will eventually involve all our centers notes Dr. Kullenberg. This year approximately US\$ 150,000 from the Women & the Sea donation will provide support directly to women who are working at grass roots levels in poor and disadvantaged coastal communities. For example, in Costa Rica working with displaced women in the Gulf of Nicoya area, whereas in India funds have been designated to install toilet facilities in several coastal villages in the Tuticom district of Tamil Nadu. In Kenya IOI is working with women to promote mariculture of seaweed near Mombasa and in Southern Africa IOI has already been instrumental in the formation of a seaweed mariculture company operated by women in St. Helena's Bay area. In Fiji, a three year project focusing on women and fisheries will conduct special training courses as well as a regional conference on the role of women in the marine sector. In Canada, scholarships will be provided to women who wish to attend the annual summer training program at Dalhousie University. In Senegal the IOI is working to improve conditions of women in Kayar who work in seafood processing.

News from Operational Centers

Black Sea

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Proceedings of the September 1999 Black Sea Leadership Seminar, edited by Professor Bologa and R.H. Charlier, are now available from this cen-In cooperation with MEDCOAST/ METU Turkey, the 5th International Workshop on the Mediterranean and the Black Sea will be held in July. Contact Dr. Bologa for more details.

Canada

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Law of the Sea, Agenda 21 and its Implementation, a ten week training program for 18 participants, will be conducted from May 29 to August 4. In its 20th year, the course will be directed by Dr. Noel Brown, former head of UNEP's Regional Office in New York, Guest lecturers will include Ambassador Neroni Slade from Samoa.

Building on a 1998 seminar organized in cooperation with IUCN for the benefit of delegates to the International Seabed Authority in Kingston, Jamaica, IOI - Canada sponsored a seminar March 24-26, 2000 attended by thirty-four delegates. The purpose of the workshop was not to discuss manganese nodules but rather to inform delegates of new emerging resources such as polymetallic crusts and sulphides, methane hydrates and ge-

netic resources co-habiting in these areas of the deep seabed. At present, these new scientific and technological developments are taking place outside, and quite independently, of the International Seabed Authority.

IOI - Canada's Advisory Board, chaired by the Hon. Allan J. MacEachen met on March 14 when approval was given for merger discussions between IOI - Canada and the Oceans Institute of Canada The meeting established a working group to plan a workshop for senior Canadian government officials in departments concerned with oceans, such as the Department of Fisheries and Oceans and the Department of the Environment.

Following an agreement, signed in January by IDRC (Canada) and this center, staff are working in Spanish speaking areas of the Caribbean to heighten awareness of best practices in coastal zone management. Later this year, the center will hold a workshop on disaster mitigation in the Gulf of Nicoya region.

Eastern Africa

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This new member of the IOI family was established in late 1999 after a memorandum of understanding was signed by IOI and the Kenya Marine and Fisheries Research Institute. An Advisory Board has been formed which includes Dr. Nyawira Muthiga, Kenya Wildlife Services; Dr. J. Kazungu, Chief of Research at KMFRI; Professor Ntiba, Lake Victoria Fisheries Organization; and Dr. Julius Francis, Institute of Marine Science in Zanzibar.

An initial program of action has been developed with special focus on long-term

mangrove conservation. Cooperation with the other regional organization is being established as well as closer ties with other IOI centers in Africa. According to Dr. Kairu, there is considerable scope for education and training in the region served by the host institute. A project proposal on distance learning modules on marine environmental issues has been prepared in cooperation with IOI - Southern Africa.

India

Director: Dr. R. Rajagopalan

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Since 1998, IOI functions as a division of the Foundation for Sustainable Develpment Inida located on the campus of IIT in Chennai. The Eco-Village Project, funded since 1997 by GTZ (Germany), was carried out in forty disadvantaged coastal villages in Tamil Nadu. The project focuses on women, since they are under greater pressure. While IOI provides all the supervision, monitoring, informational and another local NGO technical support, (Aswain Trust) actually carries out the work in the villages. Activities have included the formation of self help groups with over 1100 members; the planting of more than 4000 saplings; the distribution of over 200 fuel efficent stoves; and the building of four rainwater harvesting tanks. With further funding from JFGE (Japan), much of the earlier activities will continue. Additional activities will include awareness programs at the village level, cleaning campaigns, the planting of community gardens on unused government land, and the creation of a cultural troupe consisting mainly of village women to create awareness of conservation through song and water street plays. Vermiculture has been introduced in two villages and the production of Spirulina continues in several villages.

An eighteen month project with the Shastri Institute of Canada wraps up in

July. Project activities included fieldwork for collection of primary data backed up by secondary research from published material. The focus of this research is the local community and its knowledge system with reference to plant genetic resources. A field area in the Eastem Ghats of Tamil Nadu has been chosen for primary data collection. Three issues of the project newsletter "People, Plants and Resources" have been published and are available from this center.

A six month project funded by the World Bank will document, collate and critically review the available studies on the private health sector in India. In addition, a new project with the support of the Boston MIT branch of ASHA (an organization of Indians in the USA), is hoping to bring fundamental changes to the lives of 70 of the most deserving children in the coastal villages by providing health and education needs as well as promoting talents and computer awareness.

This center hopes to co-sponsor a workshop with the Center for Scientific Research in Auroville, India which will explore such topics as afforestation, cost-effective shelters biogas, wind and solar technology and affordable ways to recycle waste-water.

According to the selection committee Professor Borgese was chosen "in recognition of her tireless efforts and inspiring leadership in the vital cause of protecting the world's oceans from pollution, over-exploitation and the dangers of international rivalry for marine resources"

The award is given to an individual who has performed outstanding work on behalf of humankind in keeping with the philosophy of Ozaki Yukio, one of Japan's most distinguished statesmen. who held that the land, the sea and the air are the common heritage of all nations. Ozaki Yukio (1858-1954) is respected as a man of principle whose life was given to the cause of democracy and popular government. He shared Professor Borgese's passion for world federation. Past recipients of the award have included Katoh Shidzue, who pioneered the way for women to enter politics, did much to raise their social status, and was instrumental in inviting Margaret Sanger to Japan to teach Japanese women family planning; Ogata Sadako, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees: and Muhammad Yunus. Grameen founder of the (Bangladesh) for helping the poorest of the poor to regain self confidence and rebuild their families and lives.

Seaweed Mariculture

The seaweed mariculture programs were the first IOI - Southern Africa sponsored activities. A series of courses on Seaweed Mariculture for Community Development have been well received and the December 1999 course brought together over twenty people from the coastal communities of sub-Saharan Africa. Results generated by ongoing mariculture research are not only for publication, according to Derek, but will enhance IOI's community development projects.

Seaweed Biodiversity

Investigations of possible biomedical activities of certain red alga found along the coast are ongoing as are new studies on crustose coralline algal biodiversity and systematics especially along the eastern and southern coastlines.

Sustainable Livelihoods

A long term research project involving literature search and questionnaire design has been ongoing in the St. Helena's Bay area.

Computer Networks in Education

In March the center initiated a new distance learning project for coastal managers. SA-ISISleam, is a learning resource that provides web-based learning materials and courseware. Courses are developed within the framework of the recent legislation on higher education, and the intention is to make them available for university credit as well as lifelong learning programs. The first module of SA-ISISleam is a course entitled Introduction to Integrated Coastal Management and is being offered from July 24 to October 30, 2000. The center has recently completed the development of a website for the

Coastal Management Office of the South African Department of Environmental Affairs and Tourism. In December 1999 the South African Cabinet approved the White Paper for Sustainable Coastal Development which marks the first national policy for coastal management in the country. The website is a component of this new policy, a copy of which is available from the website.

Aside from the information about the Coastal Management Office, the site also contains information about management and decision-support tools, as well as CoastCARE, an initiative of the Coastal Management Office designed to encourage education on coastal issues. CoastCARE has produced a number of colorful and informative brochures, pamphlets and booklets addressing coastal issues. The site also contains a "What's new" section that highlights new national iniatives in the area of coastal and environmental management. There is a Focus On section dealing with specific ongoing activities such as the Blue Flag campaign. The international Blue Flag campaign is an incentive scheme that encourages local coastal authorities to to manage their beaches in an environmentally friendly manner. "Did you know?" is an area of the website containing brief facts that are illustrated and linked by animation of coastal creatures. Of particular interest is a set of online tide tables.

Arvid Pardo Award

The Arvid Pardo Award for Research on the Concept of the Common Heritage was announced in Malta in January 2000.

This award was created by the Institute in 1992 and first awarded in 1997. Through this award IOI wishes to pay tribute to Arvid Pardo, the father of the contemporary Law of the Sea, the inspirer of the Pacem in Maribus Conferences and the International Ocean Institute.



Dr. Gunnar Kullenberg and the staff in Malta play a pivotal part in the effective functioning of the expanding network of operational centers. As Secretary of the Governing Board Dr. Kullenberg reports the following decisions from the 1999 annual meeting in Fiji:

- approved 2000 budget of US\$ three million;
- reviewed the workplans from the 11 operational centers;
- introduced new programs to focus on women and youth;
- approved the Danielle St. Jorre Scholarship;
- endorsed the proposal to establish IQI as a Virtual University; and
- endorsed projects to honour Arvid Pardo.

In addition to the preparation for and participation in the Fiji meetings and PIM conference, the Executive Director represented IOI at a workshop on Coastal Megacities in Hangzhou, China in September and a seminar on Shipping and Pollution in Malacca in October 1999. He visited the IOI Operational Centers in Japan and China. In November he visited UNEP's Regional Office in Bangkok and in December he visited IMO in London.

During the coming year, IOI will continue to work with institutions and individuals who share our mission and aspirations notes Dr. Kullenberg. A new memorandum of understanding has been signed to continue IOI's role in the development of UNEP News Forum, an online news and information service that was launched in September 1999. Visit the site at: http://gpanews.unep.org. Phase two of a project on risk assessment in cooperation with Swiss Reinsurance Company of Zurich is scheduled to get underway later this year. Phase one of this project culminated with a workshop

on Risk Assessment and Disaster Mitigation held at the Bermuda Biological Station for Research on February 14-15 2000. The workshop provided an opportunity for experts from the insurance industry to meet marine scientists to discuss risk management issues of common interest in order to identify solutions and increase awareness, as well as to prepare material for training modules directed at specific target groups. While both of these projects have been under the leadership of IOI -Canada, they have involved other centers as well, notes Dr. Kullenberg. IOI has recently signed a partnership agreement with UNESCO to help promote the year 2000 as the International Year for the Culture of Peace.

Network wide projects focusing on women and youth will eventually involve all our centers notes Dr. Kullenberg. This year approximately US\$ 150,000 from the Women & the Sea donation will provide support directly to women who are working at grass roots levels in poor and disadvantaged coastal communities. The United Nation Law of the Sea, Agenda 21 and its Implementation, a ten week training program for 18 participants, was inaugurated on May 29. In its 20th year, the course is directed by Dr. Noel Brown, former head of UNEP's Regional Office in New York. Guest lecturers will include Ambassador Neroni Slade from Samoa.

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



In its 20th year, the course is directed by Dr. Noel Brown, former head of UNEP's Regional Office in New York. Guest lecturers will include Ambassador Neroni Slade from Samoa.

Building on a 1998 seminar organized in cooperation with IUCN for the benefit of delegates to the International Seabed Authority in Kingston, Jamaica, IOI – Canada sponsored a seminar March 24 – 26, 2000 attended by thirty-four delegates. The purpose of the workshop was not to discuss manganese nodules but rather to inform delegates of new emerging resources such as polymetallic crusts and sulphides, methane hydrates and genetic resources co-habiting in these areas

of the deep seabed. At present, these new scientific and technological developments are taking place outside, and quite independently of, the International Seabed Authority.

IOI – Canada's Advisory Board, chaired by the Hon. Allan J. MacEachen, met on March 10 and June 20. The meetings approved merger discussions between IOI – Canada and the Oceans Institute of Canada. A committee was established to plan a workshop for senior Canadian government officials in departments concerned with oceans, such as the Department of Fisheries and Oceans and the Department of the Environment.

A series of courses on Seaweed Mariculture for Community Development have been well received and the December 1999 course brought together twenty people from the coastal communities of sub-Saharan Africa. Results generated by ongoing mariculture research are not only for publication, according to Derek, but will enhance IOI's community development projects.

Entries should be submitted to IOI Headquarters by the end of September 2000. The award will consist of the publication of the study, and a prize of five thousand dollars.


Danielle de St. Jorre Scholarship



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

In addition, a new project with the support of the Boston MIT branch of ASHA (an organization of Indians in the USA), is hoping to bring fundamental changes to the lives of 70 of the most deserving children in the coastal villages by providing health and education needs as well as promoting talents and computer awareness.

This center hopes to co-sponsor a workshop with the Center for Scientific Research in Auroville, India which will explore such topics as afforestation, cost-effective shelters biogas, wind and solar technology and affordable ways to recycle waste-water.

The award is given to an individual who has performed outstanding work on behalf of humankind in keeping with the philosophy of Ozaki Yukio, one of Japan's most distinguished statesmen, who held that the land, the sea and the air are the common heritage of all nations. Ozaki Yukio (1858 - 1954) is respected as a man of principle whose life was given to the cause of democracy and popular government. He shared Professor Borgese's passion for world federation. Past recipients of the award are Katoh Shidzue, who pioneered the way for women to enter politics, did much to raise their social status, and was instrumental in inviting Margaret Sanger to Japan to teach Japanese women family planning; Ogata Sadako, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees; and Muhammad Yunus, founder of the Grameen Bank, for helping the poorest of the poor to regain self confidence and rebuild their lives.

News from Operational Centers

The seaweed mariculture programs were the first IOI – Southern Africa sponsored activities. A series of courses on Seaweed Mariculture for Community Development have been well received and the December 1999 course brought together twenty people from the coastal communities of sub-Saharan Africa. Results generated by ongoing mariculture research are not only for publication, according to Derek, but will enhance IOI's community development projects.

Seaweed Biodiversity

Investigations of possible biomedical activities of certain red algae found along the coast are ongoing, as are new studies on crustose coralline algal biodiversity and systematics especially along the eastern and southern coastlines.

Sustainable Livelihoods

A long term research project involving literature searches and questionnaire design has been ongoing in the St. Helena's Bay area.

Computer Networks in Education

In March the center initiated a new distance learning project for coastal managers. SA-ISISlearn, is a learning resource that provides web-based learning materials and courses which are developed within the framework of the recent legislation on higher education. These courses are intended for university students and the general public. The first module of SA-ISISlearn is a course entitled Introduction to Integrated Coastal Management which is offered from July 24 to October 30, 2000. IOI - SA Online

Staff have recently developed a website for the Coastal Management Office of the South African Department of Environmental Affairs and Tourism. In December 1999 the South African Cabinet approved the White Paper for Sustainable Development which marks the first national policy for coastal man-

agement in the country. The website is a component of this new policy, a copy of which is available from the website.

In addition to the information about the Coastal Management Office, the site provides helpful tips on management and decision-support tools, as well as Coast-CARE, a public awareness program. CoastCARE has produced a number of colorful and informative brochures and booklets which address coastal issues. A "What's New" section highlights new national initiatives in coastal and environmental management. The "Focus On" section deals with specific activities, such as the Blue Flag campaign, an incentive scheme that encourages local coastal authorities to manage their beaches in an environmentally friendly way. The "Did you know" section contains brief facts and frequently asked questions that are illustrated and animated.

Entries should be submitted to IOI Headquarters by the end of September 2000. The award will consist of the publication of the study, and a prize of five thousand dollars.


Danielle de St. Jorre Scholarship



IOI Virtual University

At their December 1st meeting in Hamburg, the Governing Board endorsed the report of the working group, thus formally establishing IOI-VU. Members of the working group include Dr. Kullenberg, Professor Borgese, Dr. Yankov, Professor Fuse and directors of the operational centers in India. South Africa and Fiji. Highlights of the fifty page document include plans for the development of curriculum, with special emphasis placed on the preparation of several core courses to be designed and adapted by existing operational centers. Canada will lead the development of the first core course on "Ocean Governance Issues"; while South Africa will take the lead in developing a second course on "Integrated Coastal Management"; and India will lead a third course on "Coastal Community Development". Other core courses will be undertaken by China and Costa Rica towards the end of this year.

Dr. Kullenberg has accepted the position of Interim Rector, effective June 2001 and it is hoped the first students will register by January 2002. "The coming months provide great challenges and opportunities for IOI to establish an internationally recognized, interdisciplinary program of study which will not only serve to facilitate the integration of ocean knowledge, but will provide access to students from anywhere in the world," notes Dr. Kullenberg.


New People

As Secretary of the Governing Board Dr. Kullenberg reports that the following decisions were taken by the 38th annual meeting held December 1 & 2 in Hamburg, Germany:

- approved 2001 budget of US\$ 2.7 million.
- reviewed the workplans submitted by eleven operational centers and two affiliates.
- acknowledged the establishment of new centers in Nigeria and Thailand and an affiliate in Turkestan.
- appointed Vladimir Ryabinin as Resident Director of IOI in Malta effective June 01 2001.
- extended the post of Gunnar Kullenberg as Executive Director with special responsibility for IOI-VU effective June 2001-June 2003.
- reviewed and endorsed the report of the working group to establish IOI Virtual University.
- accepted the revised statutes of the Arvid Pardo Award.

During the coming year, IOI will continue to work with institutions and individuals who share our mission and aspirations, notes Dr. Kullenberg. We are grateful for support and advice of our partners in the Virtual University - the United Nations University, the World Maritime University, the UN Peace University and the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO. Our network-wide projects continue to grow and include activities in the area of Risk Management as well as an on-line News Forum and diverse activities which focus on women and children in the coastal areas.

A two-day meeting of the Planning Council reviewed the budgets and work-plans of centers and affiliates.

Coral Reef Initiative

Robin South represented the IOI at the International Coral Reef Initiative, (ICRI) Council meeting held in Noumea, New Caledonia in May 2000 and a subsequent meeting, the 9th International Coral Reef Symposium held in Bali, Indonesia, October 22-27, 2000.

Robin reports that the ICRI was launched by the USA at the Small Island Developing States (SIDS) Conference held in Barbados in 1994. The Council. which is the ICRI governing body, was established in 1995 and has endorsed and adopted the Global Coral Reef Monitoring Network originally established by UNEP and IOC and co-ordinated by the Australian Institute of Marine Science in Townsville. IOI - Pacific Islands is one of the "nodes" established by the Global Coral Reef Monitoring Network. The ICRI Secretariat will be located in Manila. Philippines for 2001-2003 and the next meeting will be in Cebu in 2001.

The membership of the ICRI CPC (52 were present in Bali, notes Robin) includes governments (USA, Sweden, France, Australia, Japan, Philippines); ngo's (WWF, IUCN, ICLARM); UN agencies (UNEP, UNDP) and donors (such as World Bank, Australia, France).

Given the fact that seven centers and affiliates are located in coral reef areas, it was Professor South's wish that IOI continue to participate in ICRI - CPC meetings. Accordingly, when invited to join, IOI accepted with appreciation.

This will build further on our desire to work with other organizations notes Dr. Kullenberg. As a member, IOI will participate in the increasingly important ICRI process which involves 1500 delegates from over 100 countries. What do you think? Want to know more? The United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea: Its Implementation and Agenda 21, a ten-week training program directed by Dr. Noel Brown, former head of UNEP's Regional Office in New York, begins May 28. Building on previous leadership seminars for the delegates to the International Seabed Authority in Kingston, Jamaica, IOI - Canada will sponsor a week-long seminar in March, and, will launch a new course on Risk Management co-sponsored by Petrobras, in Brazil. The annual seminar on Law of the Sea at the World Maritime University in Malmo, Sweden is scheduled for August.

"Building on the ten-day July 2000 visit of three Costa Rican fishers to Himi City, I look forward to welcoming our Japanese visitors to Venado Island in order to discuss future exchanges between fishing communities of Japan and Costa Rica", notes Professor Gutiérrez.

Given the current difficulties experienced by local fishing communities in the Gulf of Nicoya area, IOI - Costa Rica is working mainly in this region and is using different approaches. Programs seek to raise basic levels of education. while at the same time, attempting to strengthen local organizations thereby enhancing livelihoods. 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The first phase of the Himi Project, a combined fishing village revitalization and sustainable fishing practices training project, was implemented in July 2000 when four Costa Ricans visited Himi City to learn about the Eechu fixed net fishing. "This exchange has multiple objectives", notes Ms. Otsuka. "We want to introduce our Costa Rican partners to Himi's traditional and environmentally sustainable fixed net fishing methods, and at the same time, we want to spark interest in traditional fishing methods among the youth of Himi City."

In April 2001, IOI - Japan will launch a series of lectures on Oceans for the citizens of Yokohama City. These public events will build on the momentum established by the wide release of Dr. Fuse's book in September 2000. Dr. Fuse and Dr. Hou Wenfeng are collaborating on a joint research project to examine "Environmental Quality of the Yellow Sea and the East China Sea."

Seaweed Mariculture

The seaweed mariculture program continues as one of our flagship programs, notes Derek. *Maribus Industries* has been established as a registered company and hopefully current research into the red seaweed *Gracilaria* and the kelps *Macrosystis angustifolia*, *Laminaria pallida* and *Ecklonia maxima* will provide future commercial opportunities.

Seaweed Biodiversity

Investigations of possible biomedical activities of certain red algae found along the coast are ongoing, as are new studies on crustose coralline, algal biodiversity, and systematics especially along the eastern and southern coastlines. Research continues to focus on two aspects of seaweed biodiversity: discov-

ery of new economic uses for seaweeds and their sustainable exploitation; and attempting to understand the systematics, evolution and ecology of the numerically abundant but poorly-understood crustose coralline algae.

Sustainable Livelihoods

Sustainable livelihoods research is expected to continue despite the termination of the fellowships of several of the leaders of this project. Recent cooperation with IOI - Eastern Africa brings a a new dimension to this ongoing project. Led by J. Wakibia, a PhD student, it is hoped that ongoing work will help establish viable seaweed farming in Kenya.

Computer Networks in Education

This ongoing and highly successful activity continues to receive substantial funding from the National Research Foundation for the period 2001-2002. There is considerable work underway involving the use of computer networks in teaching and learning. A proposal has been developed with the Coastal Management Office for a web-based clearing house for environmental materials. IOI -SA will play a key role in the implementation of the IOI - Virtual University. Early in 2001, representatives from five IOI centers will attend a week-long workshop focusing on online learning to prepare them for the task of designing courses for online delivery.

IOI-SA Online Services

IOI-SA Online Services was established in September 1999 as a means of using the existing skills base in website development to generate funds for IOI-SA. The project has a development platform located at http://protea.botany.uwc.ac.za/. Since its inception, it has been operating at full capacity with one full-time employee. Eventually, it is hoped that a portion of surpluses created will be used to build a reserve fund to finance overall IOI activities

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Excerpts from PIM 2000

The following excerpts are from remarks made by Elisabeth Mann Borgese to delegates to the 2000 PIM Conference in Hamburg, Germany.

...I think we all here share the feeling, real or unreal, that, during the past decades many fundamental changes have taken place, many new problems have arisen, most of them anthropogenic, and we have killed many forests to produce the paper on which to spill gallons of ink, to print out the laws, rules, regulations, codes, declarations and conventions to solve the problems we have created. We all share the feeling that the time has come to put more effort into implementing and enforcing this legislative inheritance....

...What we, the outgoing generation, can do is to project a picture or model that appears to emerge from the rules and regulations and the vast literature surrounding them, which our generation has put into place. This picture will also reflect the major events and trends of the past century....So let us start with the general trends we can distill from the events of the twentieth century....

- * the rise of environmental consciousness
- * transformation of the scientific paradigm
- * explosive technological development
- * transition to service economy
- decolonization and emphasis on human rights
- end of centrally planned economies
- growing chasm between few rich and many poor
- * globalization of dehumanizing trends
- transformation of the concept of "sovereignty"

...The next two years offer rather extraordinary opportunities to advance new, concrete proposals and to get them into the fora of *Realpolitik*....

- (2) in 2002 "Rio +10" will provide an Assessment of 10 years of activities since the 1992
