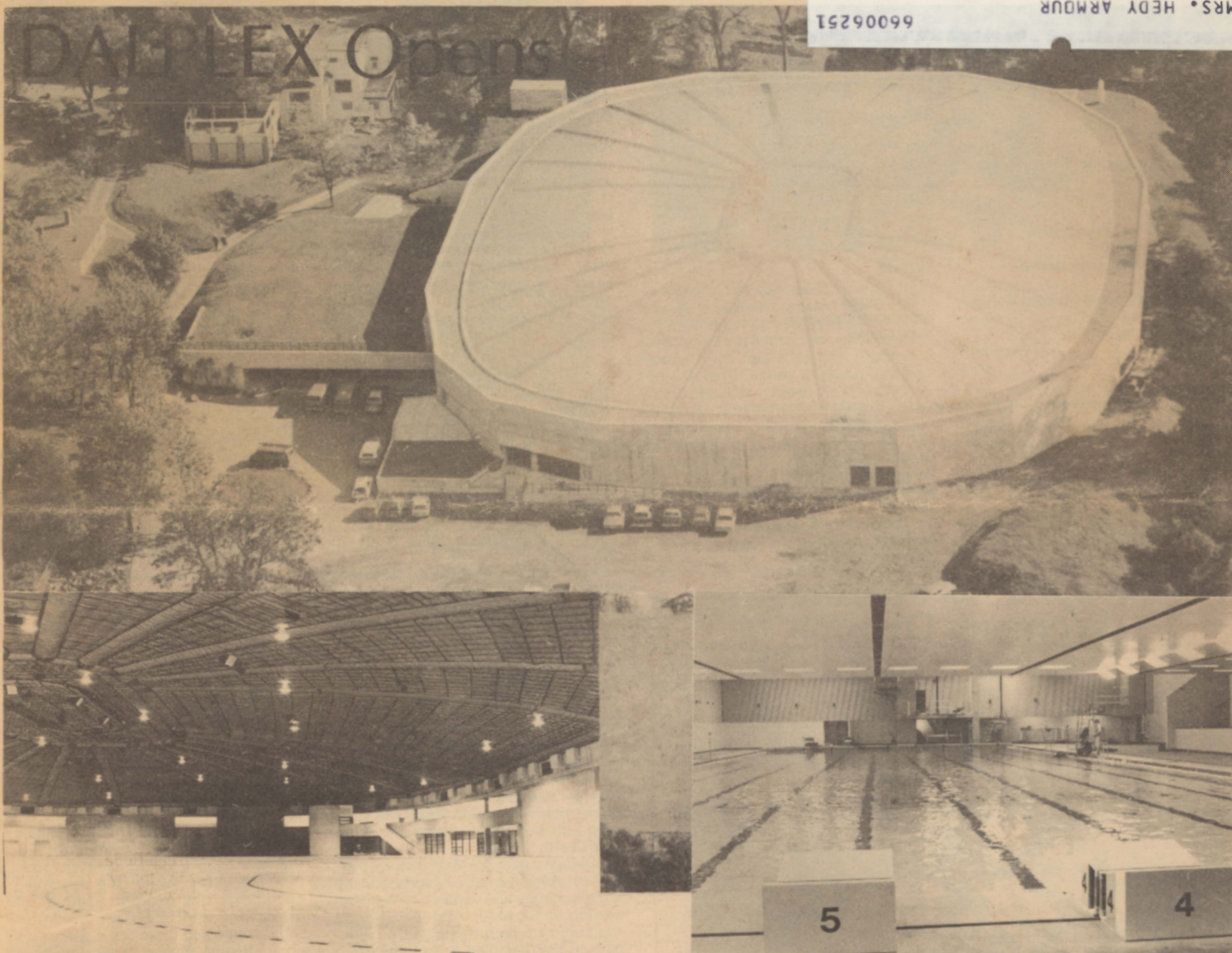

Over 12,000 people went through the revolving doors of DALPLEX the opening weekend of October 19 to the 21, to see the new \$10.5 million sportsplex.

The opening ceremonies took place in conjunction with the University's fall convocation. Over 300 graduates received degrees during the exercises, which took place in one half of the field house, while 1400 people looked on. The guests were seated in the portable bleachers arranged in a semi-circle.

After the graduation ceremonies, University President Dr. Henry D. Hicks unveiled a large photograph of the engraved plaque, which is in place at the main entrance to the sportsplex, officially opening DALPLEX.

Three years after the first sod was turned, the sportsplex, at last complete, will serve not only Dal students, but the whole community.

The centre has been designed with the emphasis on participation, although spectator events will be part of the program.

The DALPLEX theme is "accessibility". The facilities in the building will be accessible to the membership; equipment will be available for use by members; and the expertise of an excellent teaching staff will also be accessible.

It is predicted that the centre will cater to the needs of 1400 people per day. Although DALPLEX will be a teaching facility, alumni and local groups will have access to the centre for almost a third of the time it's open.

The sportsplex is the only one of its kind in the Maritimes, covering an area of 300 feet by 240 feet with four acres of floor and pool space on three levels.

The lowest level houses the 50m Olympic-standard swimming pool. Programs have been arranged for the

membership and the general public in learn-to-swim, life-saving, and infant water orientation. In addition, the lower level also houses four racquetball / handball courts and four squash courts. Above are classrooms, laboratories, offices, equipment distribution, changing rooms, team rooms, trainers' and treatment rooms and a lounge.

The main floor is the fieldhouse—an unbroken flat surface where innumerable combinations of activities can take place simultaneously:

Basketball games on three permanent courts, with space for two more courts that can be outlined by modern taping methods; or Volleyball games, also on five permanent courts, with space for more taped; or Tennis games on three permanent courts, with space for three taped; or

Badminton on 12 permanent courts, with space for five taped.

The main floor may also be used for golf practice and archery.

Running around the inside perimeter of the fieldhouse wall, above the main floor level, is a 250-metre track.

There will be limited spectator space in the building, with 1500 seats available for field house events and about 500 seats available at the pool. Most of the Dalhousie Tigers' varsity games in the applicable sports will be played at the DALPLEX.

MacLean appointed

president of

Mount A

Dr. Guy Robertson MacLean, vice-president (academic and research) since 1974, has been appointed President and Vice-Chancellor of Mount Allison University.

Dr. MacLean, who will become the ninth president of the 140-year-old university, will begin a six-year term on July 1 next year, succeeding Dr. W. S. H. Crawford, who has been president since 1975.

Very Rev. Angus J. MacQueen, Chancellor of Mount Allison, who was also chairman of the presidential search committee, said he was delighted with the committee's choice, which had also been endorsed unanimously by the Board of Regents.

"The fact that there were 126 candidates for the presidency reflects well on Mount Allison," said Dr. MacQueen.

The search committee did not know if it would be possible to find a Maritimer, who was a churchman, a scholar with administrative experience, with a knowledge of Mount Allison, its special traditions and constituency and one who also had a youthful enthusiasm for a most difficult job.

"We can look forward to strong leadership in the 1980's, which will be a challenging period for all universities. Mount Allison is in a good position, better than many, to face this future."

Dr. MacLean was born in Sydney, Nova Scotia, and attended Sydney Academy before entering Dalhousie, from which he was graduated with his BA and MA. At Dalhousie he won a Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford where he earned an honours BA and an MA in History. He obtained his PhD at Duke University, North Carolina, where he was a fellow of the Centre for Commonwealth Studies.

At Dalhousie Dr. MacLean was active in extracurricular affairs, playing hockey, rugby and varsity football and serving on the student council. During the summers he qualified as a lieutenant in the Canadian Army, and was a student minister of the United Church in Saskatchewan serving three churches. In his final year at Dalhousie, he received the Graeme Fraser and the Malcolm Honour awards, both awarded by students.

At Oxford, Dr. MacLean was a member of the varsity ice hockey team and his college's rugby and touring cricket teams, in addition to being elected president of the college dining society.

Since 1957 Dr. MacLean has lectured in history at Dalhousie. He has also taught at the Nova Scotia Technical College and the University of Alberta.

Dr. MacLean has served in a number of administrative positions, including Dean of Men at the University of King's College, Dean of Men (residence) at



Dalhousie, acting chairman of the Department of History, assistant dean and Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, Dean of Arts and Science and, for the past five years, Vice-President, academic and research.

As vice-president, Dr. MacLean has been responsible for the Faculties of Administrative Studies, Arts and Science, Graduate Studies and Law. During his term external research grants doubled to over eight million dollars annually.

Dr. MacLean has been active with many organizations. He is a member of the national executive council of the Canadian Historical Association; the board of directors of the Donner Canadian Foundation and the William H. Donner Foundation, New York; the Board of Governors, College of Cape Breton; the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission; the executive committee of the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada; the board of directors of Opera East; the board of directors of Dalhousie Alumni Association; president of the Nova Scotia Soccer Association; the board of directors of Sport Nova Scotia (he was the 1977 nominee for the award, Outstanding Sports Executive in Nova Scotia); president of Soccer Nova Scotia; branch chairman, the Canadian Institute of International Affairs; chairman of the Canada Council doctoral fellowship panel; the Nova Scotia Rhodes Scholar selection committee; The Canadian national committee of the New College, Oxford, 600th anniversary appeal; the IODE Overseas Scholarship selection committee; Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation fellowship panel; the academic council of the Atlantic Institute of Education; and the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada's committee on centres of excellence.

Dr. MacLean has published widely. He edited O.D. Skelton's *The Life of A. T. Galt*, and, while his primary research interest lies in European history, he has also published articles in the fields of Canadian history, military history and international affairs.

Research in progress includes a book-length study of Allied military and intelligence operations in Axis-occupied Yugoslavia during Second World War.

Dr. MacLean, who is married to the former Judith Hunter of Calgary, will move to Sackville with his family (the couple have a son and a daughter) next summer.

His formal installation will take place at Mount Allison's fall convocation.

Alumni in Great Britain attend Dalhousie dinner



The Royal Commonwealth Society Headquarters, London, England was the scene of a reception and dinner, on June 14, 1979, for Dalhousie Alumni residing in Great Britain.

Dr. Henry D. Hicks, President of Dalhousie University, Mrs. Hicks, the Right Honourable Earl of Dalhousie, and Lorne Green, First Secretary at the Canadian High Commission were among the honoured guests. The Lord of Dalhousie, the 16th Earl, also holds the title of the 4th Baron Ramsay. It was his predecessor, George Ramsay, the 9th Earl, who founded Dalhousie University in 1818 when he was

Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia.

The dinner, organized by the Dalhousie Society of Great Britain, was officially hosted by Mr. and Mrs. Geoffrey Sellers of Esher. Mrs. Sellers, the former Mary Boswell of Halifax and an arts graduate of Dalhousie, has been active in the re-organization of the Dalhousie Club in the United Kingdom. She was elected President of the Society.

During the evening, the film "There Stands Dalhousie" was shown and was well received by all. This dinner was the first reunion of its kind in over nine years in England and was most

successful, so successful in fact that another is planned for next year.

While in London, Dr. and Mrs. Hicks were guests at a luncheon given by the Honourable Paul Martin, Canadian High Commissioner to Great Britain, for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother. The Queen Mother is an honorary graduate of Dalhousie, and was awarded an LLD on the occasion of the opening, in July 1967, of the Sir Charles Tupper Medical Building, Nova Scotia's Centennial Project.

Dr. and Mrs. Hicks also had tea with the Chancellor of Dalhousie Univer-

sity, Lady Beaverbrook, at the Beaverbrook estate, "Cherkley in Leatherhead", Surrey, England.

Alumni award for excellence in teaching

For the past year the Dalhousie Alumni Association Board of Directors has been finalizing plans to establish an award for excellence in teaching. The purpose of the award is to recognize faculty members whose knowledge of their subject and their ability to share that knowledge and motivate their students is outstanding.

The award will be offered for the first time in 1980, and will include a certificate of excellence, \$100 and a plaque to be placed in a prominent position in the university.

ELIGIBILITY

Candidates for the award must be full-time members of the Dalhousie University teaching faculty who have completed three years of full-time teaching at Dalhousie.

NOMINATIONS

Candidates may be nominated by alumni and/or students. Each nomination must be supported by 4 signatures plus the nominator's. Nominations must also include reasons for making the nomination.

Nominations will be requested in the fall issues of the University News, Dalhousie Gazette, Alumni News, Medal, and Ansul, providing alumni and students the opportunity of nominating candidates.

Nominations must be submitted by **February 15** to the Director of Alumni Affairs, Dalhousie University. The Director will then consolidate the

nominations and refer the list to the Teaching Award Committee.

Teaching Award Committee

The Teaching Award Committee will consist of two academic staff members appointed by Senate and three student members appointed by the Dalhousie Student Committee and two alumni appointed by the Alumni Association.

The Committee shall be chaired by the Academic Vice-President of Dalhousie University or his delegate.

Procedures:

The Committee shall review the qualifications of each nominee against a list of criteria and shall identify those candidates who deserve final consideration.

Classes of each nominee, on the list of finalists, will be audited by one or more members of the committee. The committee shall then review the qualifications of each finalist and shall recommend one candidate for the award from among them.

The name of the award recipient together with a supporting resume, will be forwarded to the Director of Alumni Affairs.

The name of the award recipient will be announced in the early spring issue of the aforementioned publications.

Presentation

The award shall be presented to the recipient by the President of the Alumni Association or, in his absence, an appointed delegate, in May.

The Alumni Association is offering an award for excellence in teaching:

You are invited to:

1. Nominate a candidate of your choice;
2. Submit four other names of students, or alumni who support your choice;
3. Explain why your nominee should be considered;
4. Return your nomination to the Alumni Office, Student Union Building, on or before FEBRUARY 15, 1980.

All nominations will be reviewed by an eight-member selection committee made up of representatives from the university Senate, the student body and the alumni.

Association hosts first Leadership Conference

Over 60 student leaders attended the Alumni Association's first Student Leadership Conference on Saturday, October 27 at Dalhousie University.

The purpose of the Conference was to familiarize student leaders with the system of university and student government and in general university and student operations.

The sessions started with registration at 9:30 followed by a welcome from **Mary Dingee**, B. Com '77 (member of the Board of Directors) and a keynote address by **John Graham**, General Manager of the Student Union Building.

In his address, Graham told the assembly that over the past nine years the make-up and number of student groups have changed significantly. In 1970 there were 95 associations, in 1979 there are less than half that number. Graham went on to say that the groups of the '70's were more politically oriented. Now, in 1979, the groups tend to be more activity orientated. The extracurricular role, however, of university associations has remained somewhat the same—to

round out a student's "educational experience". Graham then used a hypothetical association to exemplify the kinds of problems a society may have—administrative, financial, social, legal, etc.

The group then broke up and went on to the mini sessions. The sessions were designed specifically for Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, Promotion/Programming people, and dealt with administration, banking bookkeeping advertising, social events, financial assistance and student facilities. The last two sessions, S.U.B. Operations and Legal Aspects were scheduled so that all the student leaders could attend.

Three LLD's at fall convocation

Dalhousie University awarded three honorary degrees at fall Convocation on October 19.

In conjunction with the 10th anniversary of the University's School of Library Service, an honorary degree was awarded to **Joyce Lilieth Robinson**, a distinguished Jamaican librarian. The School of Library Service has had strong ties with Jamaica since 1944 when Nova Scotian, Nora Bates gave the island her advice on establishing a library service.

Mrs. Robinson is executive director of the JAMAL Foundation; a group devoted to eradicating illiteracy in Jamaica.

An honorary doctor of laws degree was conferred upon **Dr. Hugh Noble**,

sports administrator and innovator.

Dr. Noble, former director of inspection services for the province of Nova Scotia, was honored for "many contributions to the development of and devotion to the cause of health through sport".

Dr. Maurice Van Vliet, president of the 1978 Commonwealth Games and dean of physical education at the University of Alberta, was also made an honorary doctor of law.

Dr. Van Vliet was recognized for "his many contributions in providing opportunities for the people of Canada to develop the potential of their bodies, to maintain their health and to experience the joy of sport".

Col. Balcolm honoured by Halifax

Colonel Samuel Rosborough Balcolm (DP '11, LLD '69) was honoured by the City of Halifax last month when they officially dedicated Balcolm Square, a triangular piece of land on the corner of Robie Street and Coburg Road in Halifax.

The ceremony was attended by the Mayor of Halifax, members of Parliament, members of the Legislative Assembly and other guests. A reception followed the dedication ceremony.

Col. Balcolm was born in Port Dufferin in 1888. He represented Halifax as a Liberal M.P. from 1950 to 1957.

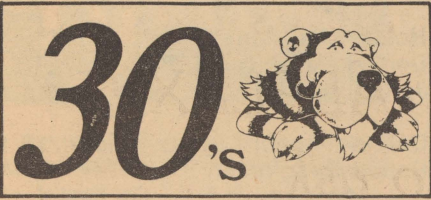
Col. Balcolm served on the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University for 30 years.

Col. Balcolm has had both a distinguished professional and public career. He retired in 1975 as President of Balcolm-Chittick Ltd., a drug store chain and at one time served as President of the Canadian and Nova Scotian Pharmaceutical Associations.

Col. Balcolm was appointed Chief Administrator of the Province in 1975. During his career he became known as a successful merchant and a distinguished soldier and member of the community.

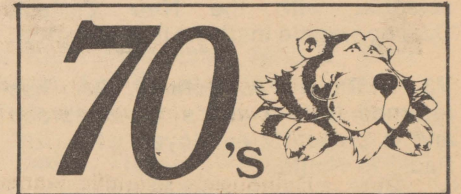

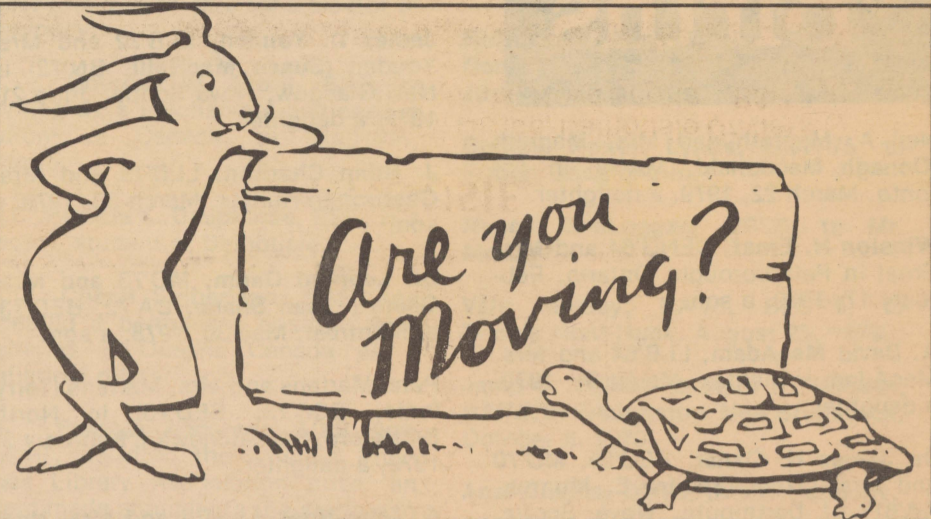
