An open letter to all women who have been released from the Forces or who are in the Forces and are worried about it.

We are all aware that there have been a great number of Lesbian women across the country who have been released from the Canadian Forces. In the past few years the number has increased significantly.

The effects on me personally and on those to whom I have had the opportunity of talking, have been psychologically devastating, not to mention creating an economical hardship until we are able to draw ourselves together again. In talking to others it has become clear to me how vital it is for us to be able to do just that ... talk to one another about our experiences, angers and feelings.

The process of basic training and life in the Forces leaves one lost and vulnerable when released. The effects of interrogat--ion and trying to hide our life-style goes deeper than we realise, and sometimes it takes years to work through.

Buffalo, NY. Buffalo's Common Council defied the Mayor and approved protection to gay persons who are city employees. The action came when the council voted 9-2 in support of an amendment adding sexual orientation to the protected characteristics of race, colour, national origin, sex, disability or marital status.

Mayor James Griffiths vetoed the change but the Council over--rode it the next day. The Ordinance also protects the rights of individuals working for businesses that have City contracts. continued overleaf.....

BOSTON, MA. The Boston City Council has passed a broad human rights ordinance that includes protections for Lesbians and Gay Men. It is expected that Mayor Ray Flynn, who has stated his support for the measure, will sign the bill.

The bill protects people from discrimination on the basis of many categories including sex, race, marital status, handicap, sexual orientation, ex-offender status and religion.

The new Human Rights Ordinance protects against discrimination in a variety of areas, including employment, public accomodation, insurance, bonding and credit.

HOUSTON, TX. Houston's City Council narrowly approved an amend--ment extending civil service protection to gay persons. The Council voted 8 -7 in favour of a resolution prohibiting the city from discriminating against anyone on the basis of sexual orient--ation in its affirmative action programmes.
