I heard you on CBC this morning talking about the great trees of the South Shore. Along my shore here at Lawrencetown Beach, the spruce are stunted and ragged and I wonder if tall trees ever stood here. Alas, I find even my humble, gnarled spruce trees beautiful in their own way so I can't complain.

Last fall, while marketing THE DREAMERS, I had several queries from booksellers and interested readers as to whether or not you had any children's books on the market. Now, as I approach my projects for the new year, I was wondering if you would consider allowing me to turn your story, "Brooms For Sale" into a book of children's literature. It's a wonderful story that I think would be widely appreciated.

I asked Are Gjesdal, the Norwegian painter who lives on Devil's Island (also the artist for the cover of your book), if he would be willing to illustrate the book. He said that he would be interested and I'd be willing to commission him to do the work. Not only is Are a fine artist, but he is a resourceful, spirited soul who lives with his wife on only a few thousand dollars a year so I am always anxious to help feed such an artist.

Presumably, this would be a short book, finely written and illustrated, published in a large format for parents to read to their kids or for older children (Grade 4 and 5?) to read themselves. My offer to you would continue to be 10% royalties on a first press run of about 1000.

As you'll recall, I mentioned to you that I'd like to publish a children's book of your story, "Brooms for Sale." I think it would go over well and I'd like to have it illustrated by the Norwegian artist Are Gjesdal who did the painting on the cover of THE DREAMERS.

I think we might have to change the title so that it would appeal more readily to a young audience but otherwise the story would remain perfectly intact. The book would probably sell for about \$5 or \$6. I'd try to keep the cost to the buyer low. The illustrations on the inside would of necessity be line drawings but I would have Are do a full colour cover. Since I haven't published a kids' book before I asked other publishers how the royalty arrangement is handled between artist and author. Several suggested that each receive 5% of the list price of the book.

You've been very generous with Pottersfield and it would be your reputation that would make the book successful, so I'd like to offer 8% to you and 2% to Are. The first press run would again be 1000 books and any press run thereafter would carry the same royalty. The copyright remains in your name. If that arrangement seems in any way unfair to you, I will be willing to offer you the full 10% royalty and try to make alternate arrangements with the artist.

It was very good to visit with you. I hope you are enjoying winter. I attended the launching the Joyce Barkhouse's biography of you... the event was a great success and we all felt you were there (in spirit) with us. I look forward to hearing from you abouty "Brooms For Sale." Thanks again.

Regarding your letter of March 1, 1987 about my story "Brooms for Sale". I don't like settling for a royalty of less than 10% on any book of mine but in this case I agree to 8%. The copyright to remain in my name. You may change the title if you wish.

In your footnote you ask about other out-of-print or unpublished material. You may be interested in a small book of mine called "Footsteps on Old Floors". It contained six true stories, all of which had to do with Nova Scotia in part or in whole. Each involved some mystery which had never been revealed fully before.

The titles were: Adventures of HMS Blonde, The Murders aboard the Herbert Fuller, Grey Owl, Mary Celeste, The Lost gold at Kejimkujik, and Sadie Davenport.

In 1968 my U.S. publisher (Doubleday) printed a single issue of 10,000 copies, of which about 3500 were sold in the U.S. and the rest in Canada. In 1971 they melted the plates without notifying me or their Canadian branch in Toronto, which was left with many orders that it could not fill. At the same time Doubleday formally relinquished the rights.

A year or two ago James Lorimer wrote me expressing an interest in reprinting the book, but he went no further.

There is a copy of Footsteps on Old Floors in the Dalhousie collection of my papers. You may be interested.
