



ALUMNI NEWS CHANGED TO QUARTERLY

With this issue, the Alumni News, official publication of the Dalhousie Alumni Association, reaches its readers as a completely revised eight page quarterly instead of the twice yearly booklet form of the past. The change in format was adopted by the Alumni Executive at their November meeting following a report presented by Alumni Director and Editor, Bruce G. Irwin.

In the report, Mr. Irwin revealed that investigation directed to a random sampling of the alumni showed that they found the booklet form unattractive, too bulky, and the news often out-of-date when it was published twice yearly. They expressed a preference for a publication which was not only attractive, but one capable of being read fairly rapidly. To satisfy their wishes, the present format was proposed.

The new format is another step forward in the programme of the Executive of increased service to the many thousands of Dalhousie Alumni. There are many evident changes in the new issue, especially in lay-out, additional special features, and a more effective use of photographs, but still more columns of special interest to the alumni are planned for future issues. Suggestions, comments, and criticisms will be welcomed by the Editor as the aim of the Association is to serve the alumni and this can be best accomplished if the alumni make known their wishes.

Another important service offered by the new issue will be the column devoted to news from the branches of the Alumni Association, to which Branch Secretaries are invited to contribute regular bulletins. Additional space will also be available, free of charge, for the branches to advertise their forthcoming events.

He felt that language and logic served this purpose by forcing a student to come to grips with a problem. He also said that the power of discernment acquired at university enabled the student to later separate the right from wrong and the good from the bad.

The banquet was organized by Alumni Director, Bruce Irwin, and was capably chaired by Ken Matthews. Special out of town guests were Alumni President, Arthur J. Meagher and Alumnae President, Mrs. H. T. Creighton of Halifax.

SHAW'S LETTER

"Dear Sirs:

I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the coaching staff and the Dalhousie Football Team to thank you and all those who contributed to the Football Fund.

We feel that this fund was largely responsible for our improved performance this year. Our Tiger Team was able to advance to the Purdy Cup Finals and was only defeated by St. Francis Xavier, who went on to win the Atlantic Bowl Game against O.A.C. from Guelph.

For the first time since Canadian Football came to Dalhousie, we were able to bring in 10 out-of-town students early in

September for practice and conditioning. We were also able to give a training supper to those who would have had to miss their supper because of football practice, and as a result our attendance jumped from an average of 18 the previous year, to 30 this year.

Because of the large numbers showing up for practice, we started the season in much better condition than we have in the past. This in turn reduced the number of injuries which enabled us to field a strong team throughout the entire season.

Another important benefit was the obvious increase in team morale. The response to this fund proved to the team that there are a large number of Dalhousians who are interested in football and willing to support it.

All these factors combined gave us a team this year that had the will to win, enthusiasm, and team spirit that showed they were worthy representatives of Dalhousie.

THE MEN'S RESIDENCE

The new Men's Residence presently under construction in the northeast corner of Studley Campus is extremely well designed and planned. When completed this summer, it will be one of the finest university residences in the country. The building consists of a two storey centre section and two four storey wings with the exterior finish in stone to match the other buildings on the campus.

Student accommodation consists of 154 private rooms plus 4 monitor's bed-sitting rooms which are contained within the two wings. Each of the bedrooms will be tastefully decorated and furnished with a large closet and shoe rack, bed, bookcase and radio headboard, combination dresser and desk, desk lamp, desk chair, lounge chair, bulletin board, rugs, drapes, linen, and a return buzzer answering service for telephone calls.

The halls will be done in a wall fabric of champagne and antique white with black and white terrazzo stair wells. The floors will be finished in different shades of brown, beige, mahogany, green, and terra cotta.

The centre section of the residence will be accessible from two levels, the ground floor directly from the campus, and the first floor through the north wing directly off Coburg Road.

The ground floor level will contain a library, lounge and snack bar, recreation room, a private dining room to seat 50, a chapel to seat 80, a music room, laundry rooms with

automatic equipment, plus bedrooms in each of the two wings.

The first floor will have a mail box for each student, a visitor's sitting room, a suite for the Warden or Dean, a suite for the caretaker, and the dining room and kitchen in the centre section. The kitchen has been scientifically designed with receiving rooms for food deliveries, an elevator down to the storage area which will have separate refrigerators for meat, vegetables, and dairy products. In the kitchen there are separate areas for vegetable preparation, pastry cooking, vegetable cooking, which is complete with a large air vent.

Meals will be served from the kitchen in cafeteria style in the following order: dessert, salad, bread, hot food, milk, beverage, silverware, and finally the cashier. There will also be a separate dining room for the kitchen staff.

With the construction of the new residence, Dalhousie University overcomes a serious drawback of the past. It is felt that a men's residence is an important part of university life, and the vocal point of college activities. University authorities say that Dalhousie has lost many out-of-town students over the years because of the lack of a good residence.

When completed, the residence will have cost something in excess of \$1,500,000. The Dalhousie Alumni Association has pledged \$100,000 toward the cost of the residence, and is raising this sum through contributions to the Alumni Fund.

ALUMNAE TEA AND SALE

The Dalhousie Alumnae Association held their annual Tea and Sale at Shirreff Hall on the afternoon of November 13th. Mrs. H. T. Creighton, B.A. '27, M.A. '57, president of the association has reported that the tea was the most successful one to date, with over \$650 realized from the proceeds.

**DEAN C. L. BENNET
CONTRIBUTES TO NEW
CANADIAN BOOK**

"The Face of Canada", a new book published by Clarke Irwin and Company Ltd., is presently on sale, and Dalhousie University is honoured that C. L. Bennet, Vice-President of the University and Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, is one of the contributors to the book.

"The Face of Canada" was written by five authors recognized as authorities on each of the diverse regions of Canada. The book is designed for those who wish to know Canada better and presents a comprehensive picture of this nation—its cities, its industries, its physical features, its natural resources and the widely differing lives, occupations, and customs of its people. In addition the book has 32 pages of illustrations.

Mr. Bennet takes the reader on a guided tour of the four Atlantic Provinces, starting with Newfoundland and working westward to New Brunswick. In each province he discusses the geographical make up of the country, the historical background, and traces the development of the people in each region, bringing in their occupations, customs, and culture.

The other contributors to "The Face of Canada" are Gerrard Filion, editor of Montreal's famed "Le Devoir", Gregory Clark, well known Toronto author and Journalist, Marjorie Wilkins Campbell, author of "The Saskatchewan", and Roderick Haig-Brown, internationally known sportsman and author of several books.

**G. V. DOUGLAS
MEMORIAL FUND**

Former students and friends of the late Professor Douglas have instituted a programme to provide a scholarship or prize in his memory.

Contributions to date have amounted to approximately \$1,500.00, and a few more are still expected. The income from this will provide a prize of about \$75.00 per annum.

The committee has been unable to locate a considerable number of former students. It would be appreciated if Alumni would pass the news of the fund to any former students or friends who may not have been reached.

CLIPPINGS

Dr. Ernest W. Guptill, Head of the Department of Physics at Dalhousie, has been appointed a member of the planning committee of the International Union of Pure and Applied Physics.

Dr. Carlo G. I. Friedlaender, Carnegie Professor of Geology at Dalhousie University, has been elected a Fellow of the Geological Association of Canada.

Dr. John G. Aldous, Professor of Pharmacology, has discovered two new poisonous materials in a living cell. Dr. Aldous made the discovery at the Institute of Animal Physiology near Cambridge, England, while on sabbatical leave to continue the research programme he had begun at Dalhousie.

All four Dalhousie candidates for the Certification in Psychiatry of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons in Canada were successful. The Psychiatrists originally received their training at Dalhousie University.

The four are; Dr. A. Shane, a member of the staff of the Nova Scotia Hospital; Dr. Doris Hirsch, of the Child Guidance Clinic in Halifax, and a member of the University Department staff; Dr. Noel Murphy, a member of the staff of the Provincial Hospital, Lancaster, N. B.; and Dr. H. Bevan-Jones, of the R.C.A.M.C. and currently in command of the station hospital, Camp Gagetown, N. B.

Dalhousie will offer for the first time this year courses leading to degrees of Doctor of Philosophy in Physics, Chemistry, and Oceanography. These are in addition to the course already offered in Biological Sciences and mean a considerable extension of the Dept. of Graduate studies.
