As the Dalhousie community becomes more aware of the obstacles presented to physically challenged students and staff, the DSU and the Dalhousie Advocates for the physically challenged are planning a "campus tour" to further illustrate improvements to our campus, as well as challenges we still face. 

them know.




Graca Machel

Student Advocacy Service

STUDENT ADVOCACY SERVICE

The Student Advocacy Service provides assistance to students who may become involved in an appeal within Dalhousie University. This assistance ranges from advice on appeal to representing the student at the appeal hearing.

Appeals include but are not limited to:

...appeal of a letter grade, method of cource evaluation, etc(Academic appeals)

...appeal of a transcript notation, payment of fees, etc.(Regulatory appeal)

...defence of an allegation of plagiarism, cheating, etc(Academic offence)

Every student at Dalhousie University has the right to seek assistance or representation by an advocate if that student so wishes.

The student service is provided by the Student Union of Dalhousie and is available at no cost to the student. The service is staffed by volunteer student advocates from Dalhousie University.




