

### March for Education

Over 100 concerned students from Acadia and Dalhousie gathered in front of the SUB last Thursday (Oct.27) before moving the demonstration to Province House. The "March for Education" was organized by the Dalhousie Student Union to protest the government's lack of financial committment to Post Secondary Education. It is commonly felt that this underfunding is the root of the proverbial evil-resulting in decrepit buildings, mal-equipped labs and classes, cutbacks in library services, faculty & staff labour disputes and other threats to the quality of education.

Marchers were joined by Ray Larkin, NDP candidate for the Halifax riding and Miguele Figeuroa, the riding's candidate for the Communist Party of Canada. At Province House, demonstrators were addressed by David Williams, President of the DFA; George Evans, President of the DSA; Royden Trainer, interm Chair of SUNS; Chris Van Buskirk, President of Acadia's Student Union; Alexa McDonough, leader of the provincial New Democratic Party; and John Meachern, provincial Liberal Education Critic.

DSU organizers were disappointed by the smaller-than-expected turnout, but maintain that "there was a high level of support among those we did have, the crowd was terrific!" The Student Union is also dissatisfied with the government's response to the march. Demonstrators had to rally in the streets because they were not permitted on the grounds of Province House. It is believed that this not only endangered the student's safety, but violated their constitutional right to assemble. Also, despite repeated previous invitations and on-site chants of "We want John", the provincial government never addressed or acknowledged the crowd(other than lauphing through the windows). The DSU feels that this is unacceptable treatment, especially from John Buchanan who is acting Minister of Higher Education & Job Training.

All-in-all, organizers are pleased with the March. Student participation was encouraging as was the high level of media coverage, community interest & political support.

#### STUDENT ADVOCACY SERVICE

The Student Advocacy Service provides assistance to students who may become involved in an appeal within Dalhousie University. This assistance ranges from advice on appeal to representing the student at the appeal hearing. Appeals include but are not limited to:

...appeal of a letter grade, method of cource evaluation, etc(Academic appeals)

... appeal of a transcript notation, payment of fees, etc. (Regulatory appeal)

... defence of an allegation of plagiarism, cheating, etc(Academic offence)

Every student at Dalhousie University has the right to seek assistance or representation by an advocate if that student so wishes.

The student service is provided by the Student Union of Dalhousie and is available at no cost to the student. The service is staffed by volunteer student advocates from Dalhousie University.

# Strike Update

The following questions and answers are intended to give students a better idea of the situation they may find themselves in in the event of a strike at Dalhousie.

It is hoped that a strike would last no longer than two weeks, but if it should last longer, it would be difficult to make up academic loss to students. At this point it would be difficult to predict how making up for these losses would be handled. Much would depend on the actual length of the strike and the academic programs involved. Still, Students should understand that the University will do everything possible to ensure that students suffer as little academic harm as possible.

#### CLASSES

Q: If a strike occurs, will classes be cancelled by the University?

A: No. Some faculty will not teach their classes, but others will. Part-time faculty and others who are not members of the DFA are expected to conduct their classes at the regularly scheduled place and time.

Q: Some faculty have said that they will hold classes at home or at some other off-campus location, should I attend?

A: This is a matter of personal choice, and students are under no obligation to attend such classes.

Q: What if I miss cource material or a test or assignments because I do not attend such classes, or because I do not attend classes that continue to be held on campus as a result of my personal convictions regarding the crossing of a picket line?

A: No academic penalty will be imposed, but normal academic requirements will have to be fulfilled at a later date. Students will have an opportunity to take tests and hand in assignments after the strike ends.

Q: Does this mean I do not have to hand in assignments during a strike?

A: You can if you wish, but you do not have to.

#### REGISTRAR'S OFFICE

Q: Will the Registrar's Office be open during a DFA strike?

A: Yes. All the regular services of the office will be maintained.

#### TUITION

Q: If I decide to withdraw from the University, will I be able to obtain a refund of my tuition fees?

refund Normal A: Yes. policy will applu. Ordinarily, on Nov 14 the amount of the refund would drop from 70% to 50%, but if a strike begins before then, this date will be deferred by the number of days a strike lasts, so that students will not be at any disadvantage.

Q: Would the same principle apply if I decide to

drop a class?

A: Yes.

Q: I may miss some lectures or laboratories as result of a strike? Will I receive a refund of a portion of my fees as a result?

A: No. The University will do everything possible to provide the full academic programme for which students enrolled.
