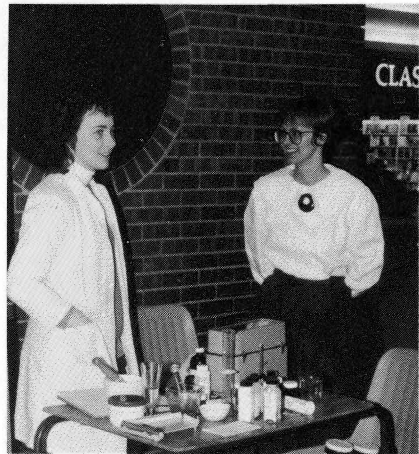
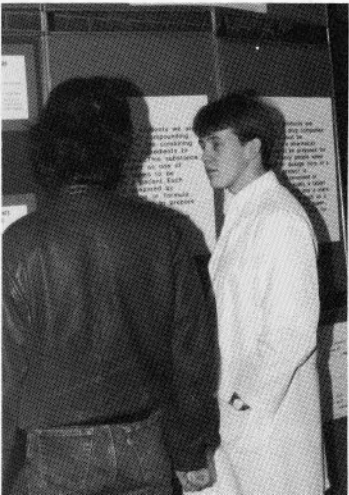
PUBLIC RELATIONS

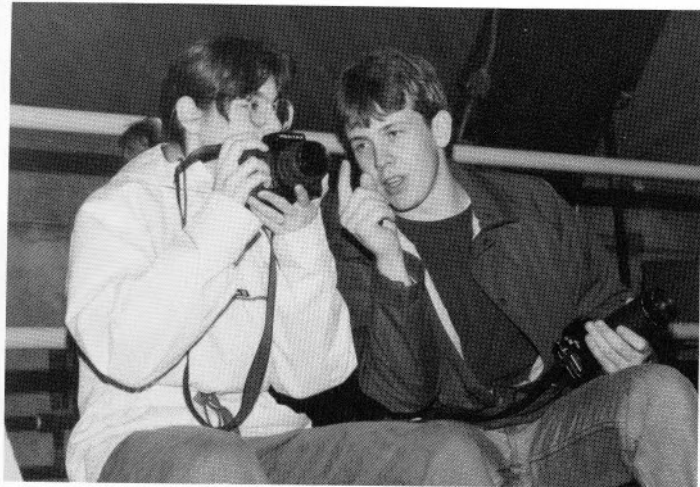


GRAD EXECUTIVE
