MESSAGE From the Director

Dr. R.F. Chandler

Last year at this time I noted the team of the faculty, staff and students of the College continues to work well together. I believe 1994-95 was even a better example! Many students excelled in extracurricular activities, gaining recognition at the national level. The 1994 graduates excelled as a group, having the highest pass rate of all their Canadian peers. It is amazing what can transpire in the face of adversity!

This past year, the students of the College have taken some very positive steps regarding their current and future interests. Within the College, the Student Advisory Council had a very successful year and has initiated committees to examine the course and professorial evaluation process and also to investigate the degree of alcoholic consumption by pharmacy students. The former topic will be a combined faculty and student committee, while the latter will be students only. Both will begin their work in September. The DSPS has successfully lobbied to have representation on a number of College committees, including the strategic planning committee. Scary, isn't it? However, at the end of the day, we should have a clear picture of the College's path.

Once the strategic plan is in place, our curriculum committee will swing into action to review the curriculum in light of our stated objectives and desired outcomes. This will be a large task and there will be considerable opportunity for student input. Put on your thinking hats and volunteer.


By this Fall, I anticipate we will be able to inform you about the introduction of our Drug Information "Hot Line" for the public, and the progress of Dalhousie's Pharmaceutical Care Project. We are also planning to introduce a Community Pharmacy Residency Program for June 1996, subject to obtaining appropriate sites and funding. So much for a quiet summer!

I believe 1994-95 was significant in the history of the College. 




CANDLELIGHTERS



for the stockings. - During Pharmacy Week we held a casino night at the Grawood. Everyone who came out had lots of fun.


- Last, but not least, we held the professor auction in March.

Congratulations to everyone for all of their hard work. This year's show had some of the best props and costumes ever. Congratulations especially to the class of 1995 for their winning performance.












TIME TO CELEBRATE











GRADUATION WEEK






